### 15,000 PICKETS FORCE CITY INTO STATE OF SIEGE

**Club-Swinging Strikers Aim At Halting Food Supply In Minneapolis**  
**MARTIAL LAW Pondered**  
War Clouds Gather in Steel Trade as Workers Ask Outside Union

**MINNEAPOLIS, May 22 (AP)**—A wild disorder broke out at the produce market today when nearly 4,000 striking trade union men, led by 1,500 police amid the screeching of ambulances and rioting crowds of shoppers caught in the melee.  
All available police squad cars were tied into the market district to combat the violent outbreak. Riot was finally restored.  
The outbreak was a sudden development in the unhealthy situation in the market district this morning. A sudden charge by pickets led 25 deputies through a crowd of strikers from a truck. One special police was seriously injured. All were taken to a hospital.

**By United Press**  
A new wave of industrial warfare is under way in the steel industry today, with thousands of strikers blocking the city's food supply. With police and special officers massed at points of violence was feared.  
Lenders of the steel industry were held in certain standing recognition of an outside union demand by employees. Refusal will mean a strike by the industry. It was believed.  
A dock strike by all Pacific coast shipping companies is now being threatened.

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### ROOSEVELT PLANS U.S. RATIO BOOST

### HOLDEN ENTERS G. O. P. CAMPAIGN

#### Idaho Falls Attorney Seeking Republican Nomination For Governor

J. Wesley Holden, Idaho Falls attorney, today announced his intention to enter the campaign for the nomination as United States senator against John Thomas, Republican incumbent, in the primary election for governor on the Republican ticket.

Opposing him will be Frank L. Stephan, Twin Falls, and J. L. Paul, Blackfoot, whose formal announcement of candidacy have already been made.

Holden, in his brief statement, said:

**Uplifts Constitution**

"I will support and advocate the earliest and best business and judicial policies and principles of the party of Abraham Lincoln, which are necessary or proper, in my application of those principles without doing violence to our national constitution, in fact, by giving force to the letter and spirit of that constitution."

"For retention of the American system after cutting away the rank abuses that have grown up under it and which are the true cancer of our present depression, I favor particularly the money, banking and credit situation."

**Against Sales Tax**

"I shall continue to oppose the principle in which I believe and to encourage the state government to meet its needs by other means than a sales tax, which is a burden on small business under the state income tax legislation, the game and law enforcement departments out of pocket and placing them under a heavy burden. I also favor the free and unlimited college of silver."

"I am convinced we must divorce our party from the economic and financial influences that have dominated it in the past in order that it may again become the guarantor of a government of the people, by the people, and for the people."

"I shall make my position on all public questions perfectly clear as the campaign progresses."


