Physician Who Treated Bandit Draws Similar Sentence At St. Paul

NURSE GIVEN ACQUITTAL

Outlaw's Half-Indian Friend Finds Uncle Sam Can Buy Stern Parent

ST. PAUL, May 23 (AP)—Evelyn Frenchette, part-Indian sweetheart of John Dillinger, was found guilty today by a jury in federal court on charges of harboring the Hooper outlaw.

Clayton E. May, Minneapolis also was found guilty of conspiracy to harbor Dillinger. He received the outlaw for several wounds a few days after Dillinger shot his way out of a federal ambush here.

Mrs. Augusta Salt, nurse for Dr. May, was sentenced not guilty. The case was heard by Judge Gunnar H. Stroyer, who immediately sentenced Dr. May and Miss Frenchette to two-year prison sentences and fines of \$1,000 each.

The prison terms were the maximum allowed under the law, although the two were liable to fines of \$10,000 each.

The jury received the case yesterday. Dr. May admitted treating the wounded Dillinger, who hid in Mrs. Salt's home for three days. Both contended, however, that they hid the outlaw because of fear for their lives.

Indian Ward

Miss Frenchette, 26-year-old half-Indian ward of the government, found guilty of harboring a stern parent, as well as a protective one, six months after her arrest with Dillinger.

Madly in love with the outlaw, according to her story, she was arrested in Chicago by police while trying to aid him in reassembling his gang. Two weeks earlier, she had fled with Dillinger to St. Paul gun battle.

PLANNING BOARD GATHERS MONDAY

Public, Civic Groups Urged To Present Projects at State Session

BOISE, May 21 (Special)—Attention of all counties, city, civic organizations, industrial, commercial and social groups, and local business men is being directed to the conference of the state planning board to be held in Boise, May 28 and 29, at the University of Idaho, D. Wood, Boise, secretary of the board.

Seventeen planning divisions will come up for discussion at that time, namely: public works, land resources, recreation, cooperatives, transportation, water and power resources, industry and commerce, community and city planning, public welfare and education.
