**DARROW AND IRA CHIEFTAIN MOVE TO HEAL BREACH**

Ready to Call Halt in Verbal Warfare Over Recovery Criticisms  
**PAIR TAKES AUTO RIDE**  
 Flery Leaders Will Attempt to Join Hands Toward Improvement

WASHINGTON, May 24 (UP)—Charles Darrow and Gen. Hugh S. Johnson yesterday ready to call a halt in their two-fisted battle of adjectives and attempts to apply their common sense toward the betterment of the NRA.

This was one of several movements leading toward a general overhauling of the NRA under the inspiration of the ever-widening debate stirred up by the critical review of Darrow's recovery report and on the operation of the NRA.

Darrow and Johnson spent 40 minutes together last evening discussing about the city in the recovery of the NRA. Johnson's overture toward peace were believed made. It is known that Darrow does not assume that possible benefits of his critical analysis should be lost in controversy. Johnson has been willing to inaugurate NRA reforms on the basis of specific evidence in the past.

Darrow was worried over the possible placing of his supplementary report suggesting that the NRA be replaced by Social Security. Johnson's attitude toward the board's main plan will be ignored.

"That greater attention will be paid to the position of the small business man and consumer appeared certain."  
 Darrow said he would like it known that he will take the interests of these two groups into account in his report.

Continual review of the report was the intention of the NRA labor advisory board whose members met yesterday in Chicago at a session headed by Darrow in his study of the board's findings.

The woman and the wounded Weston proceeded to St. George, Utah, near the Nevada border, where she sought medical supplies. She then fled to a small town where Weston died. She buried him in a shallow grave on the Arizona side.

She was arrested in Arizona at the ranch of a brother.

## Brand Whitlock, Minister to Belgium During War Era, Passes in France.

CANNES, France, May 24 (AP)—Brand Whitlock, war-time minister to Belgium at the time of the German occupation, and famous United States diplomat, died today.

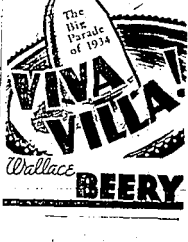
Whitlock's services to Belgium during and after the war were such that the nation paid him the highest honors in its power. He received the most coveted decorations Belgium bestows and was made honorary citizen of its leading cities.

He was received and thanked by the Belgian parliament in special session in 1918 for his services to the nation, and his bust was placed in the senate.

Whitlock died at the Sunnybrook hospital after an operation. He had lived on the Riviera since his retirement from diplomacy, writing books.

### SOCIALIST URGES BETTER SCHOOLS

Says Party Is Best-Equipped To Uphold Standards of Free Education

The Socialist party is the best equipped political movement today to meet the issue of how to preserve and improve our public schools, said Lena Morrow Lewis, in a public address here last night.

"Its advocacy of production for use and service, and not profit for the few, will give a foundation for a school equipment of the highest possible order, and the continued in her outline of methods for the education of youth.

The meetings were held in the district court rooms. H. H. Freedholm, Twin Falls, a member of the state executive committee of the Socialist party, presided.

Lower Standards

"The tragedy of the present depression is not the number of unemployed but rather the lowering of the standards of life and even more the lowering of the standards of social institutions, especially the public schools," said the lecturer.

"The law of capitalist development required the constant improvement of the machine so as to reduce the number of human laborers required to operate the machine. Under capitalism the products are produced to sell for profit and every invention or improvement of the machine that eliminates the human worker helps to cut down the cost of production and thereby increases the profit.

"Changes in the machine and new inventions are only possible among trained minds, men who have the ability to observe the facts of life and think effectively toward a better goal. Hence from the standpoint of the interest and development of the machine age, education becomes the right of the common people.

Labor Started Move

"We owe our public schools to organized labor. The Mechanics Union of Philadelphia in 1828 formed a political party of the workers and adopted a platform the principal plank being a demand for free public schools for the children to be maintained at the expense of the state. These schools were bitterly opposed by the well-to-do and rich. A string of slams was attached to those who were pupils in these institutions.

"Today our citizens are proud to attend the public schools, some even going to the length of framing their high school diplomas."

### ROSS ASKS FOR POPPY TRIBUTE

Idaho Governor Urges State Residents to Assist in Sale of Emblem

HOISE, May 24 (Special)—Governor C. Ben Ross in proclaiming Saturday "Poppy day" for Idaho urged every citizen wear a poppy and pay tribute to the nation's soldier dead.

The proclamation follows: "Whereas, it has become an established custom in those countries which constituted the allied and associated powers in the World war, to co-operate internationally in commemorating through the symbol of the poppy, worn on a day conducive with their national tradition, the sacrifices of those who offered their lives in the cause of justice and honor; and

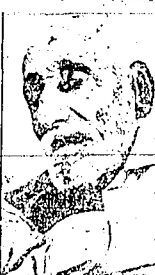

#### Many Nations Seeking Balance Of Budgets By Usage Of Legal Gambling

**LONDON**—A number of hard-up European governments are hoping to balance their top-heavy budgets through the medium of legalized lotteries. The victim of sudden fortune, by the simple expedient of buying an inexpensive ticket, loses millions of dollars each year from the pockets of rich and poor alike. And in many instances these national exchequers are benefited.


**Principal Lotteries**  
The principal countries where lotteries are permitted in Europe include France, Italy, Spain, and the Irish Free State. The last of which, in its racing acceptance, has the largest and most widely known of all.

The rules of conducting lotteries vary in each country as do the stated purposes for which they are run. The Irish Free State Hospitals benefit under the sweepstakes which are run in connection with three outstanding British horse races. The Red Cross and the University City in Spain also allowed certain extra drawings. Italy profits, while France and Italy allocate their shares to governmental departments as they think fit.

**Digital Lottery**  
The biggest ticket of all is the Irish Sweepstake. It runs three times a year, on the occasions of the English Grand National, Epsom Derby and Newcastle Handicap. It receives subscriptions from more than 100,000,000. Since 1926, when it was started under the organization of the Irish Hospital Trustees, the total proceeds have been paid more than \$100,000,000.

### Here's List of Food For Persons with Indigestion

Editor, Journal of the American Medical Association.  
You might keep the following list of foods handy for reference, if you are susceptible to attacks of indigestion. They come from one of the largest clinics in the United States.

**Orange Juice.** Get a pint of 111 (avoid the fiber in the compartments), cantaloupe and melons are inadvisable. Coffee, if desired, is allowed in moderation. It is some times causes flatulence.

**Eggs and Bacon.** Two or three eggs with ham or bacon (avoid the tougher part of the bacon), white bread, toast or waffles with butter, any amount, such as farina, cornmeal, cream, rice, oatmeal, or rolled-oats (in the natural case) are allowed by eating for breakfast. Avoid all cereals, including oatmeal, cornflakes and cereals. It is not allowed.

**Bread and Butter.** Breadcrumbs and toast are not allowed. Bran in particular has a laxative effect. It is permitted, but not the coarser whole wheat bread.

**Suggestions for lunch and dinner.** In fruit cocktails avoid the pieces of orange, and avoid fruit. Avoid all meats, fish or chicken, turkey or game, excepting duck (avoid the fibrous parts and gristle).
