Roosevelt Expected to Issue Embargo Proclamation at Capital Today

HAS CONGRESS APPROVAL

Washington Decides Against Awaiting Similar Move By Other Nations

By HOBART K. MONTFEE (Copyright, 1934, United Press) WASHINGTON, May 26 (U.P.)—The United States has today independently in an effort to halt supplies of arms for Bolivia and Paraguay without waiting for similar action by the League of Nations or other governments. It was acting in authoritative circles today.

A proclamation by President Roosevelt forbidding sales in this country of munitions to the governments fighting over the Gran Chaco territory, was expected today or Monday.

Proclamation Today The United Press learned upon reliable authority that the first draft of this proclamation has been prepared in the state department and is awaiting the president's approval, or possible revision. It may be submitted to him today.

The President has indicated that he will follow the suggestions of the state department in application of the prohibition against munitions sales.

Proclamation for preventing such sales is already in existence. It covers sales of these contraband arms to Bolivia and Paraguay, American countries. It requires any person desiring to sell arms to obtain a license from the state department. A presidential proclamation prohibits the sale of arms to Bolivia and Paraguay and Bolivia could make effective merely by refusing purchases of arms to obtain similar licenses before exporting to these two countries.

A resolution granting the president the authority to forbid such "no question" purchases of arms now awaits the president's signature.

The president has already declared an arms embargo against the two countries, and Canada intends to follow.

The League of Nations council has called an extraordinary meeting to discuss the situation.

The council is expected to issue a resolution authorizing the United States to take such action as it may deem necessary to prevent the sale of arms to Bolivia and Paraguay.

PARAGUAY GIRDS AGAINST ATTACK

Blaken Armies Reform Lines as Bolivia Plans New Offensive

(Copyright, 1934, United Press) BUENOS AIRES, May 26 (U.P.)—Paraguay's blaken armies reforming their lines today, and prepared to resist an expected Bolivian advance with the fortitude of a bear.

After seven days of the fiercest fighting in the two years of the bitter jungle war, dispatches from the captain of the warring nations revealed the following situation:

1—After days of offensive and counter offensive in the Gran Chaco region, the Bolivian army moved westward of Bolivian, the Paraguayan army yesterday engaged an attack. They were halted.

2—As the Paraguayan sought to retake their lines today, they were repulsed by a shock force of 12,000 men against the main body, hoping to cause a tactical breakthrough. Fighting they were halted.

3—Today both armies were commencing operations in the Bolivian stronghold of Bolivian, key to the rich oil fields which helped to sustain the war.

Casualties estimated continued unrelenting. Bolivia unofficially estimated 6,000 wounded, 2,000 killed, 6,000 wounded, 2,000 captured. Paraguay said Bolivian losses exceeded 3,000 killed and wounded.

CHAMBER DRAWS TEN-YEAR PLANS

Plans Submission of Broad Program to State Board Session in Boise

In line with the campaign for national state and community planning, Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce board of directors has outlined a tentative 10-year program for this city, which will be presented at sessions of the state planning commission in Boise early next week.

Other projects listed are: Water Chamber: Industries—Securing contracts for surplus fruits, vegetables, pork and beans, packing, meat and poultry processing, placing Twin Falls on par with other cities in the state.

WASHINGTON, May 26 (U.P.)—The "arbitration" bill which encourages friendly settlement of labor disputes, was predicted today by Chairman Philip H. Wadsworth of the senate committee on education and labor.

The committee has hurriedly gotten the bill into shape in the face of widespread industrial disruption.

"I think this bill will be enacted into law at the present session of congress," Wadsworth said.

The bill outlaws company-dominated unions and sets up a board empowered to:

1. Force employers to deal with representatives of the majority of their employees.

2. Determine what organization represents the majority of employees and to call and supervise elections.

3. Arbitrate any industrial dispute upon unanimous request of interested industry.

The board's powers are limited to industries engaged in interstate commerce and employing 10 or more persons.

Wadsworth's committee planned to report on the bill in a report favorably to the senate. A majority favor approval.

Wadsworth gave a one-sentence explanation of the bill. "It gives employees the right to organize freely, without any interference or coercion by their employers, just as under the National Labor Relations Act."

BRITAIN DECIDES TO DEFAULT ON WAR DEBTS PAYMENT

Action Accepts Challenge of Johnson Law Approved By Congress

WILL NOT OFFER TOKEN Similar Move Predicted for Others If No 'Miserable Change' Appears

By FREDERICK BUSH (Copyright, 1934, United Press) LONDON, May 26 (U.P.)—Great Britain has decided to accept the challenge of the Johnson law and default its \$2,670,000 war debt payment due the United States June 15, his official source close to the treasury told the United Press today.

It was regarded as certain that a British default would be followed by other nations that have been paying their war debts to the United States.

The great Britain, naturally hoped that there might be some irregular change in the debt situation.

But the United Press informant said that President Roosevelt, on May 17, told American officials that another default payment would not remove the stigma of default and that after a long period of default, there would be no unexpected negotiations.

Britain already had been against making a token payment and it was said today that no token payment would be made.

1. Discontinue the restriction of naval matters only, with all political matters excluded.

2. Re-examination of regional treaties.

3. Continuation of enlargement of the non-fortified areas mentioned in the Washington treaty.

4. Total abolition of whatever offensive weapons can be developed with.

5. Continuation of enlargement of the non-fortified areas mentioned in the Washington treaty.

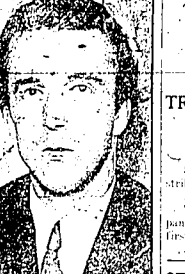
