URGES RECONSIDERATION

WASHINGTON, May 28 (UP)—President Roosevelt, in a special message to congress, has requested early reconsideration of a 3 per cent per pound processing tax on coconut oil imported from the Philippines.

"Pointing out that the tax was included in the recently signed revenue bill contrary to guarantee incorporated in the Philippine independence act," Mr. Roosevelt said.

"Violates Act," Mr. Roosevelt said, "is withdrawal of an offer made by congress to the people of the Philippine Islands."

"Second, enforcement of this provision at this time would produce a serious condition among many thousands of families in the Philippines."

"Third, no effort has been made to work out some form of compromise which could be less unjust to the Philippine people and at the same time attain, even if more slowly, the object of helping the better and animal part industry of the United States."

MOTOR TROUBLE FORCES FRENCH AVIATORS DOWN

Land at Long Island Port After Fast Ocean Hop

BOTH ARE DISAPPOINTED

Intended to Topple Mark by Flying To 'Frisco

FLOYD BENNETT FIELD, NEW YORK, May 28 (UP)—The silver monoplane Joseph L. Birk, bound from Paris for California, completed a speedy crossing of the north Atlantic today, but was forced to land at this Long Island airport—some 2,600 miles short of its ambitious goal.

The monoplane, bearing Lieut. Paul Cohen and Lieut. Maurice Ross, landed at Floyd Bennett field after a flight through fog off the Newfoundland coast of 38 hours and 27 minutes. The only other westward flight from Paris to New York was the epic aerial journey of the Douglas aircraft, the Maurice Bellone, in 1930, which crossed in 37 hours and 15 minutes.

Motor Trouble
The fliers had been forced to reduce their speed as they came down the New England coast because of motor trouble. They also had cut off radio communication and had neither been sighted nor reported directly after leaving Maine.

After several days waiting at the field barely had time to get into the air to greet the fliers. Without a moment's delay, the silver ship was over the airport and circling, with her big fuel tanks empty, and she landed from them as the fliers lightened their load before touching the ground.

Police Escort
A motorcycle escort of police was lined up at the edge of the field, about 500 yards from the plane.
