Speaker of House Ombudsmen Delay by Agriculture Department
URGES AAA AMENDMENTS

WASHINGTON, May 20 (UP)—A three-point program for relief of hog producers was proposed by Representative Rainey today. Rainey today in an interview with the United Press in which he said direct loans to the agriculture department and asserted that "the time has come for quieting the pigs."

4. Reciprocal tariff agreements under which surplus hogs may be sold abroad.

Unless congress enacts at this session amendments to the agricultural adjustment act, Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace "will licensing power to the agriculture department and will be in a position to do anything he wishes to do."

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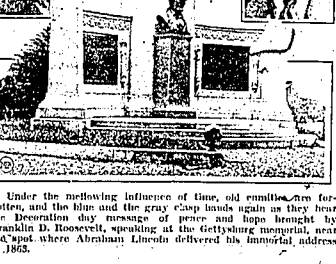

(Continued from Page One) they are impractical because of lack of injunction power," Rainey said, "It is absolutely impossible for farmers to keep on selling hogs at a loss. Unemployment is the result of the farmers' will to be a bad fix."

The Will Help "Of course the processing tax will result in considerable money going out to hog growers in the near future," the speaker claims that all farmers who have been marketing hogs for the last two years will get in each case an additional sum equal to one third as much as the price they received for a hog, less the cost of operating the law.

Must Limit Weights "The agriculture department absolutely ignores the important fact that weights of hogs should be limited to a maximum of 170 pounds if it is fat and large hogs are not wanted anywhere except in Germany."

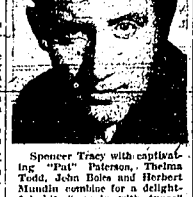

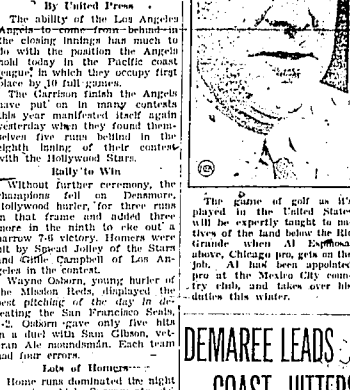

CHINESE PREFER CHEWING SEEDS

Yankee Gum Gets Foothold But Vast Majority Stick To Old Favorite

PEIJING, China (AP)—Last year China imported \$900,000 worth of chewing gum. This amount is estimated to be about 700,000 strips of gum or about that many chests. The traditional Chinese equivalent of gum is the watermelon rind which has been consumed each year throughout the width and breadth of this vast land.

Not Much Progress

While western movies and airplanes and bombs have made deep inroads into Chinese social customs, the chewing gum idea apparently has not made much progress, except possibly in the metropolises of Shanghai which is reported to absorb about half the total gum imports.

For Chinese pass a day without cravering a few black seed seeds between their teeth and it is estimated that every Chinese citizen of at least ten years of age, if an arbitrary population of 400,000,000 is accepted it will be found that gum has a long way to go.

Except for Shanghai the only other places in which chewing gum has been able to get a foothold are Peking, Tientsin and a few other cities. In Peking, the watermelon seed remains first in the affections of all Chinese as a tasty pastime.

In some cases, said the forest service, maps will be made from the photographs. According to T. W. Norcross, chief engineer, cameramen flying 20,000 feet can take minutely exact pictures of virtually inaccessible mountain and swamp regions.

It is planned to photograph from the air certain national forest and other areas in which the forest service is carrying on work in connection with a timber survey of the United States and the studies of the use of sub-marginal lands.
