

INFANTS IN SOCIAL PROGRESS

The fact that modern civilization has two faces, one of which has been modeled with much more skill than the other comes close to being the basic point of all our troubles.

These two faces are the material realm of science,

invention, and technical progress, on the one side, and the social realm of human relations, emotions,

and the social realm of human relations, emotions, and mass thinking, on the other.

The former is very far advanced; the latter is a constant reminder that we are relatively only a few generations out of barbarism.

A striking illustration of this was furnished not long ago by Dr. William E. Wickenden, president of the Gase-School of Applied Science.

Suppose, says Dr. Wickenden, that you translate the history of the human race, covering approximatelyise million years, into the terms of a man's lifetime. Suppose that the race, in other words, is a man 50 years old. How long has the race been civilized?

"In terms of personal adjustment rather than race adjustment," he answers, "it is as if civilization had begon only 19 days ago, as if a cumulative science went back only to midnight, and a habit of deliberate invention only to this, morning, and the age of went-back only to midnight, and a habit of deliberate liveration only to this morning, and the age of electric power had begun about the time we reached our offices this morning."

En other words, we have been out of the wilderness only a very short time, and our acquisition of those complex tools by which modern society is maintained dates back only an hour or so.

That being the case, it is small wonder that we live not yet discovered how to extract the utmost the hundring which our in-

the not yet discovered how to extract the utmost, futuran values from the machines which our in-multy has devised. We have done marvelously the the job of inventing things, but we have made gridly, any progress at the job of learning how to them after we have them invented.

That is why we have then invented.

That is why we have starvation in the midst of thenty; why we suffer because we have too much offeverything, and not because we have too little. Our task now is to educate-ourselves up to the twel of our scientists and our technicians. Until we do so, their achievements will do us nearly as much firm as good. arm as good.

FUTURE LOOMS BRIGHT

Sometime during the next 25 years the American college will enter a new phase in which it enrollment will be vastly increased and its methods of teaching will be revolutionized.

This is the prediction of Walter Dill Scott, president of Northwestern University.

No one, be believes, will remain out of college simply because he cannot pay tuition; on the other hand, no one will attend simply because he can pay.

Anyone who has the ability to profit by a college education will become a student; and the colleges will have far greater resources than they have now, so that they will be able to give more attention to the individual student than they do now.

All this, says Dr. Scott, will reflect changes in the national life. Leisure will be more abundant, money will be more plentiful, the national culture will be more closely integrated.

As a result, we shall have mass-education on a greater scale than fanything hitherto dreamed of, and the college will play a larger part in the manifold life than ever before.

Now this prediction is interesting, not only because it is just one more proof that far-sighted timen can see a great development and enrichment of

inen can see a great development and enrichment of mational life just ahead of us.

During the last few years we have fallen into a green ment attitude. Somehow we seem to have got the notion that our great days are all behind us, that the depression has dissipated and vitiated the boundless energy of America, and that the most we an hope for, hereafter, is to keep our hands just
