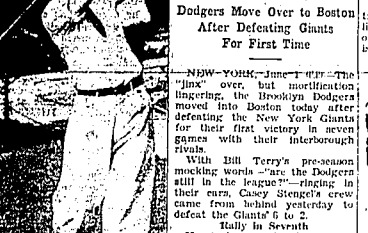

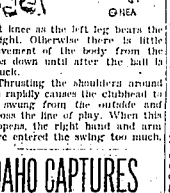

STATE PLANNING COMMISSION

Planning commissions, such as those inaugurated several weeks ago by the City of Twin Falls, and this week by the state, evidence an awakening of latent resources which is certain to prove of inestimable benefit.

Political units, through the planning boards, are doing what private enterprise has always done. A look is taken into the future; needs are surveyed; plans are correlated; and a semblance of order is sought in preparation for future building.

Idaho is getting down to business. It is bringing some of its latent into use in planning for development, and in attempting to capitalize on its manifold resources.

The state needs more people, lower taxes, cheaper transportation and simpler government from top to bottom.

That is the program which the planning commission should undertake. The resources of irrigation water, mines, timber, agriculture and water power can be made to attract a greater population, through development. A non-partisan demand for cheaper government in state, counties and municipalities, in keeping with a population of a half million people, will tend to gear development and investment through lower taxation; and an unending fight for lower freight rates, greater development of truck transportation, stimulation of the building of market roads, water ways and other such arteries, will cut down the cost of getting the state's products to consuming centers.

The planning idea must not be allowed to die. It must be stimulated and pushed to success. Idaho has a bright destiny if those who are guiding it are able to vision the future, not next year, but five, ten, twenty-five years from now.

A practice has grown up during the past two years among several counties, they are striving where they have been publishing outstanding sales of Idaho timber. The originator of this practice is among marketing agencies bidding keenly for the grower's business. They are striving for broad publicity by quoting these top sales.
