NOTED CATHOLIC EDUCATOR DIES

Rev. Charles L. O'Donnell, Notre Dame University, Head, Becomes

SOUTH BEND, Ind., June 4 (U.P.)—The Rev. Charles L. O'Donnell, C. S. C., president of Notre Dame University, died suddenly of a cerebral hemorrhage at his home in South Bend, Ind., at the age of 40 years.

He was 40 years old. A streptococcus infection of the lungs and throat was the cause of death.

Hope for recovery was abandoned months ago, but he failed to rally from an infection.

Second Term
Father O'Donnell's second term as president of Notre Dame was to have expired next month.

His ordination as a Catholic priest was on June 24, 1910, in the cathedral of Washington, D. C., where he was elected to the presidency in 1928.

His honor as Chevalier of the Crown of Italy was conferred upon him in 1931 by King Victor Emmanuel III, making him one of the few men in the United States to receive the honor.

Under his leadership the faculty of Notre Dame was increased from 174 in 1925 to 208 in 1934 and he argued spiritedly and successfully against any reduction in professors' salaries.

BOISE, June 4 (U.P.)—Sheriff Edith Colquhoun, who found an incriminating building piece of paper in a jail prisoner's bunk a few days ago, was somewhat startled when the state chemist told him it carried a formula for thermite, a mixture of iron and aluminum, ignited by a magnesium ribbon, that would chew through all bars like a push-button through watermelon, the chemist said.

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Members might resign. Mendieta was prepared to offer his own resignation unless he was given full support.

The crisis is a direct inheritance of the revolt of army officials men which placed General San Martin temporarily in the presidency. Fulgencio Batista, army stenographer who became colonel and chief of staff, was able for months to hold his men in check. But for weeks Batista has been ill and able to attend only a few duties. As a result the army has thrust its hand into political matters.
