NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 5 (AP)—Convicts who seized a prison guard and barricaded themselves in a building in the state prison here shortly after midnight surrendered today to authorities threatening tear gas.

W. C. Smith, the guard who was held, hostage, was released unharmed, prison authorities announced. The mutiny, officials said, was engineered by three desperate life term convicts.

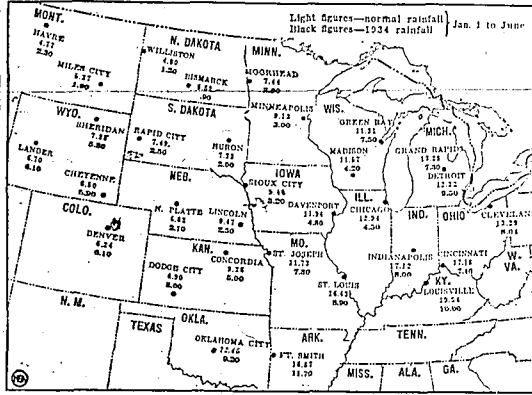
After receipt of the note, the officers rushed to the block and found everything quiet and orderly. With the exception of Taylor and Bennett, all other prisoners were locked in cells.

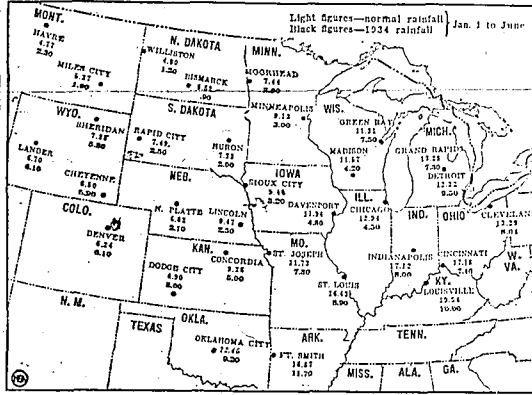

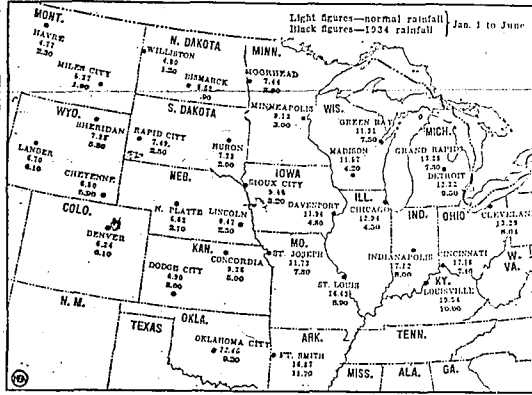

The best automobiles in the world are rendered as dangerous as cannons when they have behind their steering wheels, incompetent or intoxicated drivers.

This section has had many such object lessons—costly to the extent that they have taken precious human lives. The public can be as circumspect as it knows how to be; cars can be tested and o. k.'d and given a clean bill of health, but the public is powerless against the drunken driver. His activities must be curbed.

The Evening Times knows it is speaking the mind of the community in general when it says to law enforcement officers and committing magistrates in particular, that they will be upheld in imposing stiff sentences upon those convicted of driving while intoxicated.

A fine of \$50 or so will not turn the trick. What is necessary, in addition, to impress upon the public at large that drunken driving will not be countenanced, is to impose a jail sentence, say, 20 to 30 days, and then forbid the guilty person to operate an automobile for a period of from six months to a year.

Then there will not be so many accidents; persons who insist upon over-imbibing, will learn to stay away from the driving wheel, and liquor will not have to bear the criticism to which it now is subjected.

The Safety Lane here this week ought to result in a lot of good, for anything which contributes to more care on the streets and highways is to be commended. In the same category comes the penalties for drunken driving, which constitutes a grave menace to all.

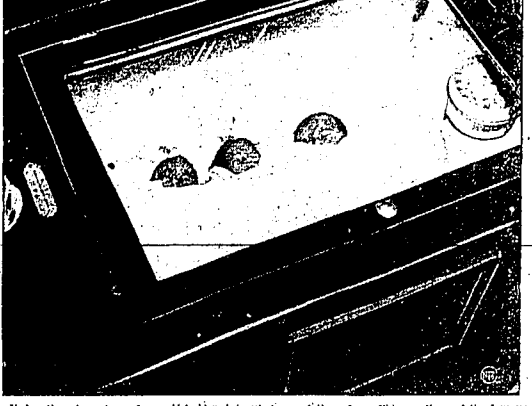
