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NAME DIRECTORS FOR FARM PLANS

Booserell and AAA Chiefs Divide Nation in Nine Regional Areas

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—The administration's program designed to insure a more abundant life for farmers has been advanced further with division of the country into nine regions and the appointment of directors for each.

Development of the agriculture adjustment administration's land use program will include the retirement of areas unsuited for farming and efforts to transfer in habitants to richer regions. The directors also will study methods by which families on "a. a. d." soil may earn a living without leaving their homes.

Benefits offered by subsistence homesteads also will be addressed in the plan to retire sub-marginal land. The regional directors will weed out tracts where farming has reached the point of diminishing returns.

The directors and their headquarters included: Region 8—R. E. Willard, Pullman, Wash.; Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

POISON DISPLAY MEETS PLANNED

Rabbit Elimination Sessions Will Be Held in County This Week

On account of the prevalence of jack-rabbits, said by Harry S. Hale, county extension agent, to be caused by the usual drying up of a series of poisonous alfalfa seed meetings has been arranged, commencing Thursday of this week in Cascade.

"We cannot furnish all the poison this time, but will furnish half and you will have to pay for the other half," Hale says in an announcement directed to ranchers in affected districts. "The cost will not amount to much; only 25c to 50c to the sack of hay. Good, clean, chopped, green alfalfa is best to use this time of year."

He asks those wanting to take advantage of the poison drive to bring alfalfa to one of the demonstrations, which will be held according to the following schedule: Thursday, June 7; Griffith farm, 4 miles south Castleford at 10 a. m.; Hauling Marten farm, Buhl, 11 a. m.; Jens Lassen farm, near Coeur d'Alene church, 1 p. m.; Fred Johnson farm, Ellet, 2 p. m.; J. M. Herzer farm, Ellet, 3 p. m.; W. W. Powell farm, three miles south Berger, 4 p. m.; Berger store.

Friday, June 8: C. M. Gates farm, 7 miles south Berger, 10 a. m.; T. H. H. H. school, 11 a. m.; Hollister canal office, 12 noon; Gerrit Jensen farm, Astoria, 2 p. m.; Hogson, 3 p. m.

ROCK GARDEN IS GOVEY FEATURE

Attractive Arrangement Marks New Gasoline and Oil Establishment

Although it is Twin Falls' newest business institution, the service station of the Govey Gas and Oil company at the corner of Shoshone street and Fourth avenue south, has what is believed to be the largest and most novel rock gardening arrangement of any commercial institution in the city, and the professors look like they have always been there, instead of having been placed only recently.

Located on what has been a vacant corner since establishment of the city, the new plant of the concern opened for business several days ago, with Walter Olson as resident manager. Direction of the station, which is of white stone, with black decorations, was in charge of G. H. (Helm) Johnson, company supervisor. It is number 18 in the system of stations owned by the Govey company, of which S. M. Govey is the head. J. S. Kincaid, Twin Falls contractor, was employed to direct building operations, which are now being completed.

Wholesale and Retail

Rock garden gasoline, Decker Penn oil, and Krivy tires are included by the concern, which will operate a wholesale as well as a retail business. Vertical gasoline tanks, located in the same block, will supply the station through pipelines. The tanks are located on an O. N. L. switch, and are to be painted with aluminum.

The Govey company's station is located on the site of the new Fourth avenue bridge, and is believed to be the first institution attracted to Twin Falls by reason of this new traffic improvement.

AID FOR DROUGHT AREAS OUTLINED

Roosevelt Assures Stricken Regions of Far-Flung Relief Plans

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—President Roosevelt has sent assurance to drought-stricken farmers today that more than a half billion government dollars will be poured into non-flooded areas for relief.

The president mobilized the far-flung relief machinery of the new deal and the experts emerged with a comprehensive relief program to bring cheer, food and work into the areas of the drought and west where for weeks the sun and wind has curled crops and whipped off the top soil.

Here's Program

- 1—\$100,000,000 for additional purchase of beef and dairy cattle from herd of feed.
- 2—\$100,000,000 for processing the beef and other products for food to families on relief.
- 3—\$100,000,000 for livestock feed.
- 4—\$100,000,000 for work programs to circulate immediately ready cash in the rural economy.
- 5—\$50,000,000 for retirement of submarginal lands in areas where rainfall is chronically deficient.
- 6—\$50,000,000 for work camps for young men, similar to the civilian conservation corps.
- 7—\$25,000,000 for seed.

VIOLENCE MARKS STRIKE IN SPAIN

Farm Laborers' Tieup Brings Three Deaths, Endangers Nation's Crops

MADRID, June 6 (AP)—Fatal disorders today marked the outbreak of a national strike of farm laborers as crops all over the country were endangered.

Over strikers and civil guardsmen were killed in a fight at Aloupeh. Fifty percent strikers were trying to intimidate a group of non-strikers. Two guardsmen tried to restore order and were arrested.

Two hundred men and women tried to liberate strikers arrested at Fandaha for similar limitation of men who stayed at their tasks. Guardsmen there were able to keep their prisoners and disperse the crowd, firing into the air.

James Burned

Two farm houses were burned at Jerez. Bomba were exploded in the doorway of San Ambrosio and San Vicente churches and Calaca convent at Sevilla, perhaps in connection with the farm strike.

Verolun of the success of the strike started widely. The government denounced it as revolutionary in aim, asserted that it was a failure and that comparatively few men were out. The powerful Land Workers' Federation, director of the strike, said nearly all its 1,000,000 workers were out.

Whatever the truth, one of Spain's richest crops in many years was endangered by the strike, called to force better working conditions.

Laborers on strike were working all over the country, by per capita their fellows, by force or cajoling, to join them.
