## EX-SWEETHEART ADmits KILLING DENVER OFFICER

Narrative of Love and Sudden  
Death Unfolded by Bride  
Of Two Weeks

### SHOT DETECTIVE TWO

Slaying Olmheux Colored

DENVER, Colo., June 7 (AP)—A story of love and sudden death was written into the police records today with the purported confession of Mrs. Phyllis Newton, 32, that she shot and killed Denver City Detective J. S. Turner.

Four hours after the detective's body was found in a lonely lane near Arvada, Colo., in a murder case today, Mrs. Newton, a bride of two weeks, admitted the killing in a dramatic recital to Turner's fellow officers.

Shot Turner  
The finding of Turner's body late yesterday afternoon ended a search which had been pressed for him since he disappeared last night Monday afternoon, the first day of his annual vacation. Turner was shot twice, once through the arm and once through the head.

Back of the shooting was a head of seven years of love and friendship between the detective and the woman.

"We had seen each other, more or less, for the past seven years," officers quoted Mrs. Newton as saying.

Married Two Weeks  
She was married to Turner last week. I had told Mr. Turner, last week we drove together out to Arvada and had some beer. Then he had called me to the whisky in the automobile and they had several drinks out of it."

## EXPERTS WONDER AT REAL REASON

### Doubt Hoffman's Remark That Max Isn't Hard Enough; Suspect Ballyhoo

NEW YORK, June 7 (AP)—Maxie Baer's managerial request for a week's postponement of his projected rematch with Primo Carnera—because Baer's advisers don't think he is tough enough—has received with some skepticism in boxing circles today.

Observers agreed the confusion of the head-speaking California lover that he is not hard enough handles Primo sounds funny—or joking.

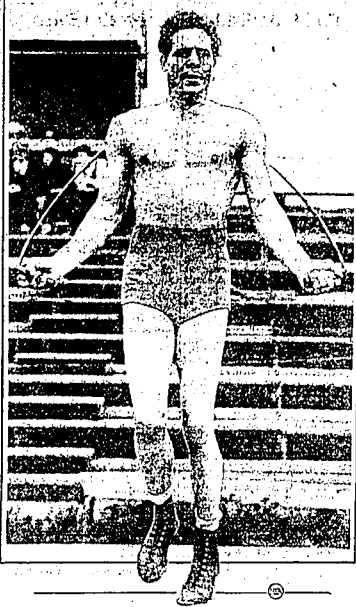

## NEW U. S. DUCK STAMP IN FORCE

### Sportsmen Must Buy Federal Emblem for Hunting of Waterfowl

WASHINGTON (AP)—Everyone wishing to hunt migratory waterfowl hereafter will be required to carry a \$1 federal hunting stamp affixed to his state license, or to a certificate furnished by his postmaster.

Stamps will be sold at post offices in all towns of more than 2,500 population. Revenue derived from their sale is expected to total \$600,000 or \$1,000,000 annually and will be used to lease, or purchase "inviolate" refuges for duck, geese and other waterfowl.

Collectors of birds for scientific purposes also will be required to have the stamps.

Other brilliant men devise ways of enabling man to increase immeasurably his capacity to produce useful things. As a result, a few men get very rich, while a great depression sweeps down on the land and millions of men are unable to get jobs of any description.

Still other brilliant men make it possible for voices and music to be sent hundreds of miles through the air; and we get, accordingly, a mass of trivialities, banalities, and stupidities thrown at our firebrades every night in a volume to make the angels weep.

TYING UP RECOVERY. The importance to our national recovery of straightening out the tangle which still enmeshes a great many bank depositors is forcibly illustrated by a recent statement from J. F. T. O'Connor, comptroller of the currency, who reveals that nearly a billion dollars in deposits is still frozen in closed national banks.

This money is tied up in 1,529 banks; so far, less than a million of it has been released to depositors. A billion dollars could buy a lot of goods and hire a lot of men. If some equitable and not-too-expensive way could only be found to release it, the whole recovery program would get an immense stimulus.
