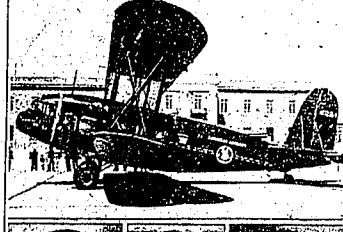

# GERMAN, ITALIAN LEADERS CONFER

Hitler, Duce Meet for First Time in Attempt to Ban Armament Race

VENICE, June 13 (AP)—Prominent Italian Mussolini, aggressor and outspoken ruler of Fascist Italy, appeared today to Nazi Chancellor Hitler for the return of Germany to world peace negotiations in Geneva.

Mussolini based his hopes on bringing Germany back into the European family on his own cherished project of a four-power pact, which could bind Great Britain, France, Italy and Germany to keep the peace for ten years.

Hitler, chancellor of Nazi Germany, and Benito Mussolini, premier of Fascist Italy, met by force of their personalities made dictators of two great world powers, met today for the first time.

Hitler, accompanied by a retinue of 15, arrived by airplane at the Lido airport for a conference with Mussolini announced as an general political problem in an effort to halt an arms race.

Two German airplanes, reported by a dispatch from the Italian royal air force, roared up to the airport and were greeted with a cheer by the Fascist contingent that drowned the noise of the plane's motors.

Mussolini was waiting. As Hitler stepped from the airplane "Il Duce" and "Der Fuehrer"—the two names of Hitler—exchanged greetings amid a sea of arms upraised in the Fascist salute, in which the Nazi salute by adoption.

A hand played Deutschland (Germany), the Italian national anthem.

Mussolini conducted Hitler to a waiting launch and accompanied him across the lagoon to his quarters at the Grand hotel. Thence they and their entourages motored to the historic Villa Piazzani at S. Maria, 16 miles away, for lunch and the first of their talks.

Fascist Italy staged one of its most impressive shows at a meeting of the Nazi and Fascist leaders. During the launch ride to the Grand hotel, both leaders stood up saluting the crowds who cheered them from gondolas, motor boats, yachts, hotels, and houses along the canal.

At the hotel Mussolini left Hitler and they met privately at Villa Piazzani to discuss the pact.

# Prince Otto Waiting in Exile For Call to Austrian Throne

STETTIN, Prussia, June 13 (AP)—The 16-year-old prince, last his Polish exile, for a king emperor—may be pushing here for a throne toward the throne. If Otto, Prince of Hapsburg and Lothringen, pretender to the ancient crown of Austria-Hungary, should be Vienna-bound from his dilapidated castle here, Stoenocherkecht will live in history.

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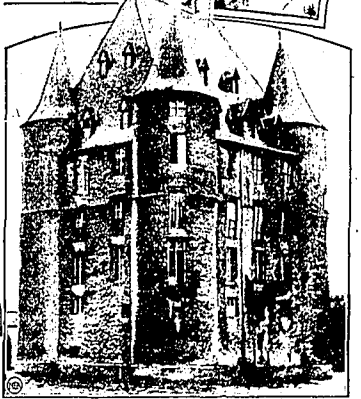
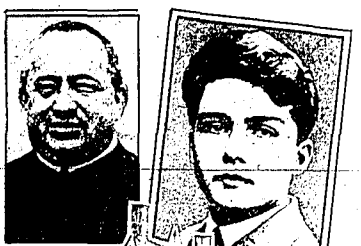

## KIWANIAN'S URGE STUDY ON TAXES

**Committee Advises Convention To Secure Adequate Help For Schools**

TORONTO Ont., June 14 (Special)—The public affairs committee of the United States, making its report today to delegates attending the first convention session of Kiwanis International here, proposed a study of national and local government for the purpose of determining duplication and overlapping of administrative functions, especially taxing bodies, and a more adequate support of schools to secure maintenance of facilities.

### Foreign Minister Tells U. S. Why Finland Pays When Others Default

(Editor's note: Finland, one of all the European war debtors, is the only one prepared to pay the United States in full on the installment due tomorrow. The Hon. A. V. Hackzell, Finnish foreign minister, explains the reasons which dictate her attitude.)

By A. V. HACKZELL, Foreign Minister of Finland (Copyright, 1934, United Press.)

HELSINKI, Finland, June 14 (U. P.)—Finland has decided to pay in full her debt installment to the United States for the same reason which prompted her to pay six months ago, and from all I can see, future payments will be effected likewise.

The fact that Finland again is the only nation in the world paying the United States in full has attracted attention, and we note with satisfaction the favorable impression her attitude has created on the American nation, with which we have such cordial relations.

**Course Is Clear**

Finland's course in this matter is most clear.

We consider the indebtedness primarily a debt of honor and of a character somewhat different from the typical war loans, which vary in other matters by the United States.

Our indebtedness originated in credits granted to Finland by the United States Grain corporation for purchases from 1918 to 1920 of grain and other goods which Finland badly needed in consequence of foreign supplies being curtailed in the later stages of the war.

Finland highly appreciated this relief measure.

Choosing a policy of settling the debt to the United States, we are prompted by the desire to adhere to the 1923 funding agreement until a new mode of redeeming the loan, which was abandoned by President Hoover, obtains the sanction of congress.

# PUBLISHERS RAP CHANGE IN CODE

### Committee Declares Proposed Shift Means Hardships For Newsboys

NEW YORK, June 14 (U. P.)—Changes proposed by NIRA for the new newspaper code met with opposition today from the code committee of the American Newspaper Publishers' association and of regional associations which help to make up the original code.

The committee made public a resolution declaring suggested modification would mean a daily newspaper delivery to subscribers and injuriously affect many thousands of newsboys.

The resolution added that the proposed license badge system for newsboys "wherever tried, has developed into legal medicine devoid of human kindness, causing hundreds of unnecessary arrests."

It declared the system would place hundreds of thousands of boys under direct supervision and control of the federal department of labor, at great cost to taxpayers, without corresponding benefit.

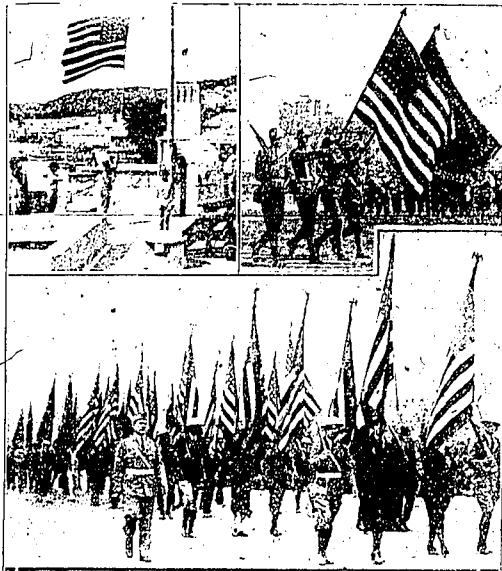

# NANKING INCIDENT FORMALLY ENDED

### Japan Offers Thanks to China For Aid in Location of Missing Consul

NANKING, June 14 (U. P.)—Japan's official thanks to the Chinese National government today for its assistance in finding the missing Japanese consul, Wang Chung-wei, after his disappearance in the Nanking incident which had threatened to disturb Sino-Japanese relations.

Consul General Suna, superior officer of the vice consul, bore this government's thanks to Wang Chung-wei, the Chinese foreign minister.

Meanwhile Dr. T. Matsui examined Kuramoto and decided that he is suffering from "nervous shock." It was indicated that the consular representative will be sent to Shanghai as soon as he recovers from the "shock" of four days spent in a cave among the Ming tombs on Purple Mountain.

Dr. Matsui stated that Kuramoto admitted he went to the cave voluntarily, although he "feared" that he intended to commit suicide. While he was missing, Japanese warships steamed toward Nanking to investigate the Chinese, the necessity of locating the missing representative and Suna notified Wang Chung-wei that China would be held responsible for his safety.

An atmosphere rapidly clouding with anger and distrust cleared rapidly after a coffee found the missing man and police returned him to the consulate here.

As aftermaths of the case which at one time threatened to become as famous as the "Mudon incident," Suna is expected to resign his consular post and Kuramoto probably will be returned to Japan. Suna feels personal responsibility for the accident, but he is in a dejected state reportedly was in a measure to a relief from his superior officer in the consular service.

# "PUPILS" LEARN GRAND LESSONS

If You're Invited to Parties By Kitchener Students—Don't Refuse!

If you're invited to a party at the home of one of the hundreds of local women who attend the second day of the Safeway Stores Homemakers' Bureau three-day course in "Kitchenering" at Highland this afternoon, break any other engagements you may have and attend.

This you may rest assured, is perfectly grand advice. Having noted several of her remarks in the audience, your reporter expects to follow it herself, for she doesn't see how any other housewife present can refrain from having at least one party, and, of course, to "show off." Of course not!

Practical Side, Too  
Not that the afternoon's program is for no matter how frivolous a dish was presented, its frivolousness within the limitations of simplicity of preparation and beyond the limitations of purely "Kitchenering" for the friends, in other words, is good for the family as far as the Homemakers' Bureau is concerned. And making it easy to make in the first place was obviously a primary consideration in the mind of Julia Lee Wright, national director of the Bureau, in planning the program which Marian Rogers Spencer directed today as Mrs. Wright's personal representative.

Starts Off royally  
Mrs. Spencer started things off right royally with the announcement to eat a Mystery Cake, before she revealed the mystery. Of course, it's the business of a reporter to uncover and explain mysteries. But this is one time when we fall down on our knees and we were to tell you, for instance, that there's tomato soup in it, you probably wouldn't believe us, so we might just as well say nothing other than to suggest that, if you want to know, you'll find out something well worth while.

Not content, apparently, with introducing one new thing at a time, Mrs. Spencer killed two birds with one stone and, hand in hand with the Mystery Cake, exposed a brand new way of making butter cakes in general. It proved, as she termed it, "twice as good in half the time."

Next, she introduced a new method of making sponge cake over hot water, promises to join the king of the homemakers' Bureau innovations which have become standard practice in local kitchens over the past year.

After Mrs. Spencer's remarks formed the program, she introduced a ring salad with a crab meat center, pointing out the diversity of tastes permits the substitution of pineapple and Royal Anne cherries for the meat, which give one still greater respect for the inventive genius of the Homemakers' Bureau.

Then, finishing from one surprise to another, she demonstrated something that only a few have heard possible in the shape of a foundation recipe for smooth, creamy sherberts made in a mechanical refrigerator without benefit of cream. The particular sherbert made was pineapple, serving it Long Island style, with maraschino cherries, aroused no end of interested comment.

Biggest Hit  
But perhaps the biggest hit of the day was Goop. The name fits it perfectly. It is Goop. Nothing else can describe it. We tried. We thought of Glimp and Spitch and Frazzle and whole lots of other names, but Goop alone remains descriptive. Served with butter or garlic bread and platter salad, Goop is a meat, in itself. And what a meat. It's made of veal and chicken and spaghetti and seasoning and other nice things, and it's so good to make as the thickest part of a meat dish. It's grand warmed over, too, and one can just about guarantee that a perfectly marvelous reputation awaits the first housewife to serve it locally, as was the second and the third and so on. It's that kind of a dish.

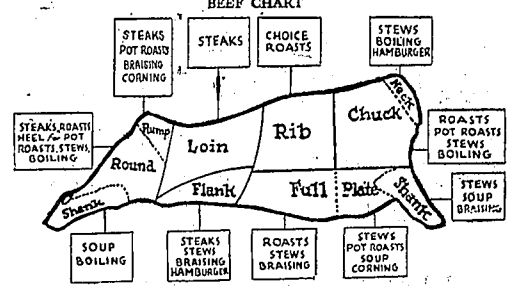
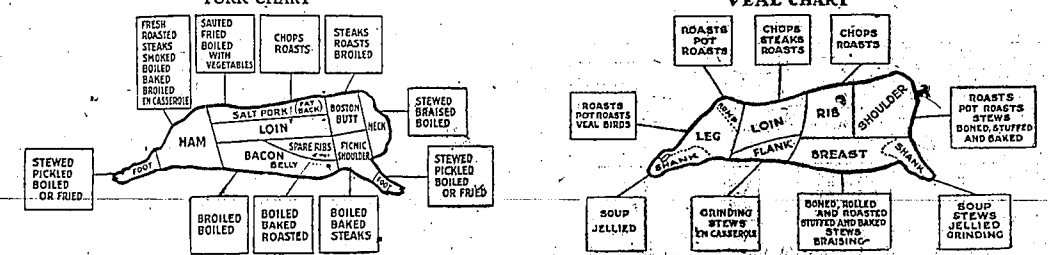
Other Delicious Things  
Even Goop, however, did not bring the day to a close, for other delicious things were still to come, and they held the audience in excited anticipation until the very end. 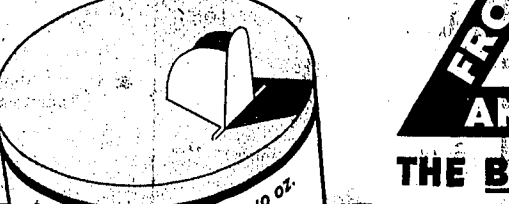

### SALT HAS 1,400 DIFFERENT USES

Those of you who look on salt as something to be used only for seasoning food will be startled to learn that it has no less than 1,400 uses, ranging from melting ice on sidewalks to its place in every medicine cabinet. Dentists recommend salt as a mouth wash (one-half teaspoonful in a glass of warm water) and also for daily use on the toothbrush. They assert that its use as a dentifrice will quickly whiten the dulled teeth and loosen the gums firm, pluck and free from pyorrhea.

Opticians advise the frequent use of a mild salt solution as an eye bath, pointing out that Nature's own eye wash, tears, is nothing more nor less than warm brine. And it is said that rubbing a salt solution into the hair once a week will keep it from falling out.

For tired, aching feet, a salt water bath every night quickens the circulation and brings immediate comfort. Tender feet, apt to form callouses can be hardened by bathing nightly in cold salt water.

Dyspepsia, heartburn and indigestion are often relieved, physicians say, by a cup of hot water in which a small spoonful of salt has been dissolved; while constipation can be banished by drinking upon rising each morning a quart of tepid water containing two level teaspoons of salt.

Salt added to the bath gives the skin a delightful tingle and stimulates the entire body. Or, if preferred, it may be used as a rub.

### Eat with Fingers? Proper, Sometimes

Fingers, of course, were used before forks or spoons were invented. Now there's less for fingers to do at the table. But there are some things properly eaten with the fingers—artichokes, corn on the cob, firm cheese, strawberries (when served with hulls), small, firm sandwiches, julienne strips, potato chips, cherries (with stems), and crisp cakes.

### Food Expert Denies Danger in Use of Aluminum for Kitchen

Frequently Julia Lee Wright, home economics authority, is asked whether there is any danger to health from cooking with aluminum utensils or from scrapping foods closely from them. The answer is an emphatic "no."

There has been considerable propaganda about aluminum, but exhaustive tests have shown that there is no harm from cooking with aluminum utensils. Mrs. Wright points out. In fact, if the housewife neatly and conscientiously occurs her discolored aluminum she is really depriving her family of healthful foods from which have been deposited from foods such as cereals and certain vegetable a previously cooked in the utensil, the bacteria die.

Tomatoes, apricots and other such acid foods will remove the discoloration and thus give the family the benefit of these minerals.

And finally, says Mrs. Wright, many diet kitchen and hospital use aluminum utensils for cooking purposes.

### PINEAPPLE AIDS IN TASTY SALAD

Combinations with Orange or Lemon Cited by Safeway Homemakers

Pineapple is particularly suited to salads. Here are two mild ideas from the Safeway Stores Homemakers' Bureau: PINEAPPLE AND ORANGE SALAD—Peel orange and remove sections free from membrane. If no large cookie cutter is on hand, pare the outside rind off. Place a slice of melon on lettuce and lay a slice of pineapple on top. A mound of cottage cheese placed in the center and served with French dressing is good.

"Its completion will mark the actual end of the course for more than 35 classes which include every possible feature of the homemaker's course. "From the comments we have received from homemakers attending our first two days of 'Kitchenering,' our course this year is one of the finest we have ever presented. For my part I feel that there is more interest in modern cooking than ever before. Homemakers young and old alike, eagerly ply us with literally hundreds of questions."

Plenty of Questions "The question box at the exit of Radisson in demonstrative of the great interest in 'Kitchenering.' At the end of each of the two day sessions here it has been virtually jammed with inquiries. 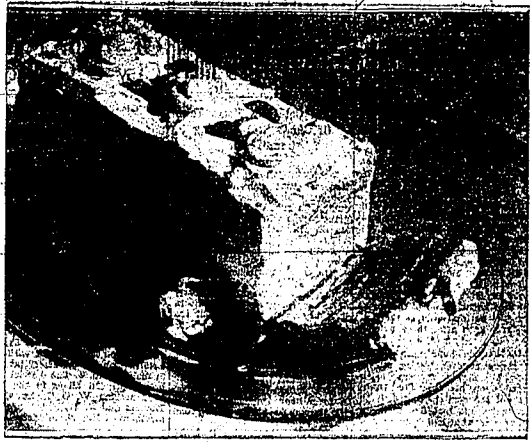

## AN ANSWER TO THAT PARTY PROBLEM



The sandwich loaf, so delicious as it is attractive, and an answer to the hostess who is puzzled by what to serve at bridge parties or luncheons.

## IT TAKES PLACE OF SANDWICHES

Delicious Meat Loaf Presents Answer to Choice of Party Food!

As an substitute for individual sandwiches at home affairs, Mrs. Julia Lee Wright, creator of the Safeway Stores' homemakers' bureau, likes to prepare and serve the sandwich loaf. It has many possible variations from the name easily-made base, and it is attractive as it is delicious. Here is the recipe:

Remove crusts from a sandwich or ordinary loaf of bread, cut loaf in four slices, lengthwise like cake layers. Spread slices with mayonnaise or butter, both sides of each slice, except the top and bottom slices. Place slices together with any desired combination of fillings such as cucumber and celery salad in first and third layers, and salmon salad in the center. Cover the loaf with cream cheese moistened with mayonnaise. Garnish with lettuce cups filled with sprigged olives, radish rings and small sweet pickles. The fillings may be varied and the outside coating of cream cheese may be tinted or combined with other ingredients. This has almost endless possibilities for the housewife who likes to experiment and invent.

## DEEP FAT FRIED FOOD DELICIOUS

Doughnuts, fritters if French fried potatoes—all crusty and brown—low food they appeal and taste best. They can be prepared when fried in deep fat—and don't be scared off by any old "bubbling" oil. In fact, it is impossible, for it is not true, though fried foods do take a little longer to digest. You can make these at home with no trouble at all—just use these few standard rules. First, use suitable fat, preferably vegetable shortening; second, have the proper utensils (third, have the food properly prepared; and last, suit the temperature, the fat and the time of frying to the foods being used. The temperature for frying must be exact and accurate as possible. The use of a deep fat frying thermometer gives exact temperature, but if not obtainable, the old-fashioned test with a cube of bread may be used. A single square of bread should brown in 40 seconds in fat at 300 degrees F (proper temperature for cooked foods) in four seconds in fat at 260 degrees F (proper temperature for uncooked foods).

FITTER BATTER 1 cup flour 1 tsp. baking powder 1/2 tsp. salt 2 tbsp. sugar 1-3 cup milk Egg Flour for rolling Deep fat Pieces of fruit, vegetable or other food Sift flour and measure; sift again with other dry ingredients. Mix the eggs and sugar beaten together. Lightly roll fruit in flour, dip in batter and fry in deep fat (375 degrees F.) until delicately browned. Drain on brown paper. Serve with or without sauce. For vegetable or mixed fritters, omit sugar from batter. Note: For fruit fritters, roll fruit in flour, roll in batter, then in flour so that the batter will adhere.

Try This If Butter Is Hard Spreading When butter is too hard to spread easily, turn a heated bowl or pan upside down over the butter for a few minutes. This softens butter without melting it. Heat the pan or bowl in the oven or by putting boiling water in it.

## When Caps on Jars Refuse to Loosen

To open a jar of fruit or vegetables which has stuck fast, place the jar upside down in a deep saucepan half full of cold water, bring it to a boil and let it boil for a few minutes. The jar will then open easily. Or, try placing a hot stove lid or a warm flat on top of the cover for two minutes.

## HAWAIIAN SALAD

One part thinly sliced crisp cabbage, one cup pineapple cut in slices, one tart red apple, one-fourth cup preserved ginger cut in small pieces.

Wash, core and slice the apple, but do not pare it. Mix ingredients together, and pineapple salad dressing. Serve in lettuce cups with pineapple cream salad dressing.

## FLUFFY OMELET BRINGS PRAISES

It's a Dish Fit for Epicure Taste—And Here's Fine New Recipe

For a fluffy omelet that will win "oh's" and "ah's" from epicures, try this recipe:

Allow two eggs for each person, or three for two, but do not use more than six eggs at a time. Separate the egg whites and yolks carefully. Beat the whites until stiff—then beat the yolks until thick and lemon-colored. Add one tablespoon of milk for each egg, to the yolks, season and stir.

## Method of Keeping Lid on Boiling Pot

To keep lid on a boiling pot, drop a teaspoonful of butter into the water when boiling dry beans or other starchy vegetables to stop unquenching of the lid of the pot jumping off, as it will otherwise do. The butter acts the same as oil on troubled waters and keeps it calm and manageable. If the edges of the saucepan are well buttered, it also helps.

## Cook Vegetables For Color, Homemakers' Bureau Urges

A great deal of experimental work has been done to determine the best methods of cooking the different vegetables to retain the maximum amount of food value and color. Following are some Safeway Stores homemakers' bureau rules to observe in preparation of vegetables:

Vegetables should be cooked until tender but still firm. They should be drained at once, as they become soggy if allowed to remain in the water. All green vegetables should be put into boiling water and the boiling continued in an uncovered utensil until they are tender. All root vegetables are placed in cold water, the pan is covered and the vegetables boiled until tender. Peeling the root vegetables AFTER cooking whenever possible, preserves more flavor. Cook vegetables according to color in order to retain as much of the clear, fresh natural coloring. Green-colored vegetables retain their color best when cooked in plenty of water in an uncovered pan. Spinach, however, requires very little water. Salt has a tendency to preserve the green coloring matter and at the same time improve the flavor. It is generally added at the beginning of the cooking. Many cooks add a bit of soda to keep the vegetables a bright green, which it does, but at the same time the food value is reduced and it becomes a choice of color or food value.

### IRRIGATION LOAN FUNDS FORECAST

Senator Pope Author of Bill To Extend Federal Cash To Districts

By HARSH W. OLINSTEAD  
WASHINGTON, June 13.—An amendment to the emergency farm mortgage act to provide for loans to irrigation companies and newly organized irrigation districts, initiated in the senate by Senator Pope, has now passed both houses of congress. The situation is that after Mr. Pope's bill has passed the senate about a week ago and was referred to a house committee, some representatives bringing a bill of irrigation, decided to hurry the provision. It was written in the form of a section of the loan to irrigation bill which had previously been passed by the senate. The bill now goes to conference to secure an agreement between house and senate. An agreement is expected this week at which time the bill will be made available to poverty stricken irrigation districts. It is understood that Idaho districts will receive a goodly portion. They are, at least, assured of Idaho's careful consideration in the hands of Frank Keenan, who is financial adviser to the drainage, irrigation and levee division of the R. F. C.

On June 12 Senator Pope was in Chicago to deliver the principal address at the reunion of the University of Chicago Law School. The event marked the 25th anniversary of the senator's graduation from that institution. His subject was "Justice in State-manship" and he reviewed the work of the supreme court as it affects the New Deal.

The senator praised very highly the humanitarian and progressive attitude of the court evidenced in the Almirante, the New York moratorium case and the New York milk control case, decided this year. He said the attitude of all statesmen, judicial or otherwise, should be based on bringing benefits to individual human beings rather than sacrificing them in an effort to sustain a principle.

Senators Borah and Pope are completing arrangements for a \$30,000 payment to Mrs. T. C. Coffey and her daughter, made in conformity to the custom of appropriating a year's salary to the widows of congressmen. Mrs. Coffey's husband's untimely death was a terrible shock to the entire family. Mrs. Roosevelt called on Mrs. Coffey to express the regret and sympathy of the President and herself.

## Stratosphere Fliers Hope to Find Key to Science Riddles

(By NEA Service)

The American balloonists who will seek to pierce the stratosphere this summer may be making the "biggest up" record back to America from Russia. It is almost certain that they will add greatly to the meager knowledge of the upper air which man now possesses.

No stratosphere balloon was ever so large as the one just inflated at Akron, O., for Maj. William E. Kepner and Capt. Albert W. Stevens. And none ever carried such a varied assortment of elaborate instruments for recording the conditions it will meet.

The flight, sponsored by the U. S. Army and the National Geographic Society, is aimed at bringing home the first in the form of real information, rather than to seek new stunt records. Scientific Data Sought

A mile from a thrust of piercing higher into the unknown upper air than man has ever gone before. There are definite scientific data to be obtained, and every effort is being made to see that none of it is missed.

Maj. Kepner, the army's best balloonist, will navigate the balloon. This season's crew consists of an experienced observer and one of the best aerial photographers in the world, in addition to the gathering of information.

To help him, many of the instruments are automatic, and self-recording.

Readings Automatic  
On the coming flight, tiny cameras will record readings automatically and periodically, including in the picture the face of a watch, so the record should be perfectly accurate.

Synchronized with these small cameras, a large aerial camera of accurately determined focal length will automatically shoot down the pictures of the stratosphere from the bottom of the gondola.

Air To Be Bottled  
Samples of air will be bottled at various heights, and brought back to earth to be analyzed. Radio communication with the earth will be maintained, giving a chance to study the effect of great heights on radio transmission, and the electrical condition of the atmosphere.

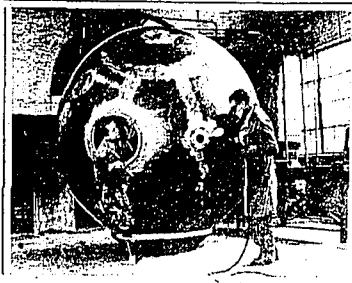
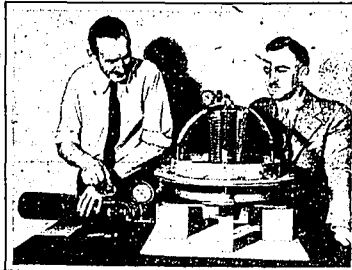
Wind direction and velocity will be studied for their possible effect on earth-surface weather and on future flights through the stratosphere. Measurements will be made of the mysterious "cosmic rays," which are known to be constantly present above the earth, but the nature and effects of which are little known.

Balloon Is Mammoth  
The building of this balloon was a job bigger than even the Goodyear fleet at Akron, which has constructed scores of big balloons, had ever tackled. The bag, which will weigh 2,000 to 3,000 pounds of gas, is so big that no room has the space to permit its being erected out on the floor to patch together its sections with rubber cement.

So the spread of carefully rubberized cotton cloth is piled in long windows of plants, with only the edges exposed for cementing.

Tracking of the balloon westward to the alberta valley in the South Dakota Black Hills, where the start will be made, is a tremendous problem, for the edges must be folded and packed in such way that no rubbing may result.

Scientist Claims Absence of Worry Will Prove Help To Longevity

WASHINGTON (UP)—The aid of the psychologist may be an important one that of the physician, according to a report by Dr. Francis G. Benedict, director of the Carnegie Institution's nutrition laboratory, concerning a study made in collaboration with Dr. Howard P. Hood of the New England Deaconess hospital.

The report, submitted at a recent session of the National Academy of Science, revealed the results of a series of carefully-planned tests given a 91-year-old subject.

A study of the case, it was revealed, indicates that a cheerful and optimistic outlook on life and a relief from excess tension and nerve-wrecking strain may be essential factors in the attainment of an extreme old age with mental and physical powers relatively unimpaired, a condition which comparatively few people achieve.

GERMAN EX-HEAD Kaiser Says Japanese Power In China Will Continue To Expand

LONDON (U.P.)—Former Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany, in exile at Brno, Holland, said today he believes that the sweeping view of world politics that characterized him when he was emperor is still "a place in the sun" for Germany.

A special correspondent of the Daily Mail quoted the former emperor as reviewing the problem of Japan in Asia, India, the League of Nations, the west and coffee situations in Argentina and Brazil, modern youth and Nazism.

Impressed by Japan and Japan seemed to impress him most. "It is useful to think that the German Empire, which in China can be prevented," he was quoted as saying, "Japan is an enemy of Germany, but it is an ally of the British."

But he emphasized that he looked on the world entirely from the standpoint of a private gentleman. He was vigorously and frankly, the Daily Mail correspondent reported.

He started out by discussing his own position and that of Germany. "The German people turned me out and if they want me back they will have to come and fetch me," he said.

"I have done much harmfully in putting new ideas into the German people. I ever they felt it right that his emperors should be restored to the throne of constitutional monarchy I am glad my family would not fall in."

Wilhelm expressed amazement and horror at what he called the folly of the world in attempting to restore peace by destroying goods, the correspondent said, and "first, large acreage in wheat is deliberately destroyed in such a way as to make it impossible to grow, and coffee is sent to sea and sunk by Brazil. Now a world which is so foolish threatens us with famine."

"I always remember," he told the correspondent, "how one of my greatest friends, the Duke of Hamilton, described it as a smoking glub which meets in a powder."

He said that the world is "merely talking ill-considered when they talk of restoring peace by merely ransacking, the correspondent said, Wilhelm commented.

Germany has done nothing but bring international cooperation to failure. He said that there are plenty of politicians but no statesmen.

KILLER'S SINS 'TUBED' AWAY RULER OF SIAM COMING TO U.S.

LONDON (U.P.)—King Prajadibok of Siam intends to sail for America in a motor launch on his way to the United States, repeating his journey of 1931.

President Roosevelt already has invited the king to visit the White House, or alternatively at his summer residence in Hyde Park, N. Y.

King Prajadibok plans to include a visit to Washington with him as headquarters. Before his holiday, the king proposed to undergo an eye operation at a New York hospital.

During his stay here recently he met General A. H. Quinlan, who was negotiating a British loan for the purpose of expanding his country.

Inquiry revealed that such a loan has not been under discussion for some time. The king is said to have been in London, where he will meet with the king's family.

Another rumor suggested that Japan has been contemplating the construction of a canal between London and New York, which would be a continuation of the big British fortifications of Singapore.
