#### General Still Dynamic Leader As NRA Marks Initial Anniversary

fluence government in any such way as our country needs certain increases in employment and purchasing power in exchange for increased production and efficiency. Outstanding labor leaders felt that labor has gained at least as much as it has lost in the NRA as any weak labor movement could reasonably expect.

His most important enemies concede him a rugged honesty and dynamism. NRA aims to keep all false starts, over-ambitious hopes and failures. He is a tremendous success as a promoter, organizer, and of unquenchable zeal, drive and enthusiasm.

Chief Weakness  
Granted that he would rather run around John D. Rockefeller than really crack down on any industry and precipitate an NRA court test and that codification of 500 industries has shown him to be such a master compromiser that many folks have been disappointed, Johnson's chief weakness according to associates arises from the name quality as his greatest strength.

He has the best in enormous terms. He can go strong on a national scale, operate the World War drafts and grammar the national science board—as he did—and put over the industrial organization of a nation of 100,000,000.

Under Johnson and Roosevelt, they're loyally devoted to each other. He has managed to keep out of cut-throat competition, sweatshops and starvation wages, and has kept the NRA out of the chaos into something else. No one can get to what extent the NRA has business importance in its first year. But nearly 300,000 members were put to work again, and industrial production will be increased and latent capacity created that increases in the average worker's standard of living to an approach that in the cost of living.

WHAT ROOSEVELT WANTS

Three underlying policies have been attempted by the Roosevelt administration, it is pointed out in a searching analysis of the government by Collier's magazine, as the President concludes his second bout with Congress.

These policies, according to the President, in his book, "On Our Way," are: 1. The elimination of special privilege by drastic governmental measures. 2. A war on crime and graft and an effort to build up moral values.

To accomplish his purposes Mr. Roosevelt has inaugurated a tariff program looking to a resumption of world trade; a wider distribution of the fruits of large-scale industry, a fairer division between the owners, workers and consumers. This is a third approach, different in spirit and in history from anything done in Europe.

"The success which President Roosevelt will have in bringing about the New Deal will depend wholly upon the degree of popular support he is able to muster. His popularity will depend upon the rapidity and the permanence of recovery. Business generally is now vastly better than it was a year ago. Given a continuance of present improvement, wide public support will be accorded to the President.

BLESSING TO THE BLIND

There are 64,000 men, women, and children in the United States who never have seen a daily newspaper. They are 6,000 blind whose reading is limited to books and magazines published in braille and whose knowledge of day by day happenings in the world depends on what they are told or what others read to them.

A young New Yorker has announced that next fall he will establish a daily newspaper for the blind. The young man himself is blind; has been sightless since he was 9 years old. With the assistance of charitable organizations, he continued his schooling, won scholastic honors and a college degree.

The proposed newspaper will be published in braille. It will contain advertising as well as news and will be issued five days a week for 5,000 blind in the middle Atlantic states. Later it is hoped to extend this number so that the newspaper will reach blind persons everywhere in the United States and Canada.

There is something singularly appealing about this effort of the blind to aid the blind. To those less handicapped it brings renewed realization of the thousands of blessings and advantages so commonly accepted as to be forgotten.
