

WHAT ROOSEVELT WANTS

Three underlying policies have been attempted by the Roosevelt administration, it is pointed out in a searching analysis of the government by Collier's magazine, as the President concludes his second

magazine, as the President concuraces has accomb bout with Congress.

These policies, according to the President, in his book, "On Our Way," are:

1. The elimination of special privilege by drastic governmental measures.

2. A war on crime and graft and an effort to build

2. A war on crime and grait and an error to build up moral values.

3. A reversal of the trend of the past three generations by swinging back in the direction of a wider distribution of the wealth and property of the

nation.

To be sure, there can be no defense of special privilege, and crime and graft have no advocates. It is the third policy which will cause controversy, the magazine points out.

To accomplish its purposes Mr. Roosevelt has in-

To accomplish its purposes Mr. Roosevelt has in-augurated a tariff program looking to a resumption of world trade; a wider distribution of the fruits of large-scale industry, a fairer division between the owners, workers and consumers. Whis is a third ap-proach, different in spirit and industory from any-thing done in Europe." says the magazine, which concludes with the statement:

"The success which President Roosevelt will have in bringing about the New Deal will depend wholly upon the degree of popular support he is able to muster.

muster.
"His popularity will depend upon the rapidity and the permanence of recovery. Business generally is now vastly better than it was a year ago. Given a continuate-of present improvement, wide public support will be accorded to the President.
"The ideal he seeks is not new. During thousands of years other men, as far back as Plato, have laid plans to bring about a better state. The New Deal is Mr. Roosevelt's effort, here and now, to make actual this ancient dream."

There are 64,000 men, women, and children in the United States who never have seen a daily news-

United States who never have seen a dairy seen paper.

They are 6,000 blind whose reading is limited to books and magazines published in braille and whose knowledge of day by day happenings in the world depends on what they are told or what others

world depends on what they are told or what others read to them.

A young New Yorker has announced that next fall he will establish a daily newspaper for the blind. The young man himself is blind; has been sightless since he was 9 years old. With the assistance of charitable organizations, he continued his schooling, won scholastic honors and a college degree.

degree.

The proposed newspaper will be published in braille. It will contain advertising as well as news and will be issued five days a week free to 5,000 blind in the middle Atlantic states. Later it is hoped to extend this number so that the newspaper will reach blind persons everywhere in the United states and Canada.
