BOARD PONDER'S LATAH PROJECT

State, Federal Groups Plan Conservation Program in Northern Area

BOISE, Idaho, June 20 (AP) — A project to conserve the natural resources of the Moscow mountains and Latah county was developed here yesterday by the Idaho state planning board.

It is designed for timber crop production, grazing, recreational, watershed production and game preserve areas.

Working with the board in developing the project are the United States forest service, the University of Idaho board of regents and the department of interior erosion service.
