Military Aviators Will Make Spectacular Manned Hop Into Alaska

AIMED TO SHOW ABILITY Project Intended to Confound Denunciations Raised by Airmail Accidents

GOVERNMENT STARTS PURCHASE OF SILVER

Seeks "Healthy Rise" in General Level of Metal

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—The United States government has begun to carry out provisions of the silver purchase act which provides for an eventual 25 per cent silver base for the country's metallic monetary silver.

Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., said today. Substantial silver purchases both in London and New York have been made for the account of the government's \$2,000,000,000 stabilization fund and also out of the general fund of the treasury.

Declaring that he intended to carry out the provisions of the bill "unhitchhikedly," Morgenthau said "we want a healthy rise in silver prices but not a sensational one that occurring last summer when speculation swept through the markets."

Morgenthau officially continued reports over the past few weeks that the giant stabilization fund had been a huge of silver both in New York and London. He refused to reveal the amount, but unofficially it was estimated at about \$500,000,000. This metal was being purchased with about \$250,000,000 worth of gold which mysteriously disappeared from the government's monetary stocks.

Treasury Purchases Silver purchases by the stabilization fund, he said, continued up to Tuesday night and yesterday purchases were on a grand scale. Out of the treasury's general fund, Morgenthau said the rate of purchases, which are discretionary under the silver bill, would largely depend on the market.

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### MILL READY FOR START AT MINE

Wallace Newspaper Declares Idaho Mother Lode Due For Production
