San Francisco and New York post office buildings were cited by Taylor as scenes for several kickback incidents.

Some of the alleged instances were listed as follows:

Charles and G. J. Terranova, San Francisco post office, alleged to have collected from planters and hod carriers.

Half Tack Back

Eleven planters were said to have repaid \$4,202.16 white wage on the U. S. parcel post building in New York during 1928. They were said to have paid, least, almost half of their daily wage to a planters contractor.

Then planters were paying back \$2.50 each per day, were reported to have repaid to Joseph S. Fulton Co. another sub-contractor on the same building, a total of \$853.16.

The firm of David Sibley and son allegedly collected \$4 per day from each of seven planters on the post office building at Flushing and Jamaica, N. Y. This was half of the daily wage and allegedly amounting to \$1,000.

"Martin Corry and Son allegedly by collect \$2.00 Stevens has paid at least one planter on the Hempstead, N. Y., post office project.

The Jerome Construction Co. allegedly paid its carpenters only 10 cents an hour instead of the stipulated rate of \$1.25 on a project at Mitchell Field, N. Y.

As to whether the 4,000,000 in unemployment in the United States is a "realistic" figure, the recovery agency of the government would put one man back to work.

dark trousers, he walked out of the twilight into the building in which he was to die.

Gov. Bruce Wood, his spiritual adviser, and the Rev. L. A. Crittendon, prison chaplain, spoke to him of the eternal life beyond the grave, he stepped to a pair of white linen shorts.

No prayer, no hymn, no still calm, but mumbling almost incoherent prayers as he walked into the little, sealed, metal gas chamber in which he was to die.

An heavy strain was bound around his head and chest, he sat immobile. No word came, but despite escaped his lips as a black blindfold muffled his eyes.

A guard stepped quietly into the chamber, carrying a broad pan containing two quarts of sulphuric acid, and placed it beneath the doomed man's chair.

The guard withdrew, the door of the chamber was closed and sealed, and William Coby Kelly, in full view of more than a hundred men, sat alone in a chamber of death.

At 7:54 p. m., just three minutes after he had entered the chamber of death, someone present in the chamber, and beyond the pan of acid a dozen tiny eggs of potassium cyanide.

Instantly a light gray smoke rose about the silent figure in the chair.

Fifteen seconds after that fatal lever had been pressed, his head rolled backward and his straining body, every muscle tense, leaped forward against the straps that bound him.

William Coby Kelly had paid in full the debt to society he contracted one night last October when he drank too deeply, and started out, with a companion, on an excursion which ended in robbery and murder.

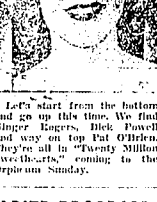

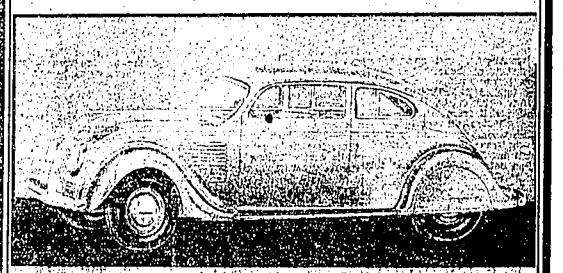

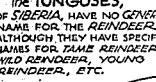
