14 Additional Deaths Caused By Attempts to Fly City Heat

MANY SECTIONS OUT OF COMMUNICATIONS

Disrupted by 60 Mile Winds; Damages Near \$1,000,000.

CHICAGO, June 25 (AP)—Death toll of two smashing summer storms rose to 12 today with addition of six fatalities in a week-end gale which swept three states. Property loss was estimated at close to \$1,000,000.

Small buildings were wrecked, growing crops beaten into the mud and hundreds of trees and power poles snapped. In Illinois, which chased each other across Minnesota, Wisconsin and Illinois, many communities were isolated from communication. Workmen struggled to repair dozens of broken wires.

# FAMED PILOTS SKILLED IN CRASH

### Jimmy Wedell Dies as Plane Drops; European Craft Hits Ground

# 'Central' Faces Manifold Tasks On Phone Calls

### 'Hello Central'—146-35

The "Hello Central" operator, this picking up a telephone, calling a number, and speaking to anyone in the office, is a very important job. It's not so easy for "central," who has to perform or check on calls, as they might appear.

Here's what happens. You take up the receiver, and a light flashes on the board which indicates the number of the call that you're called to attend to in the office.

**WAR ISN'T INEVITABLE**

War talk has deluged the world during the last year in a rising flood. That fact in itself is probably a greater factor in the possibility of war than any other thing.

The professional observer, the political adventurer, the armament manufacturer, the propagandist, all these thrive on war talk. You would think, to read their outpourings, that there was no escape from another world war.

It is perfectly true that war again is greater than it was before the World war. It is perfectly true that the government of states like Russia, Italy, France, and Germany consider it good policy to foment war talk because it helps to unite their peoples politically.

But underneath it all there is a growing conviction on the part of the martiale millions that it is all needless, useless, that it must not be. And, further, that there is nothing to be gained by it.

Because they speak for a growing number of people in every country in the world, the still small voices of a few who speak of peace and hope should get a wider hearing than they do. For instance, Frank B. Kellogg, former secretary of state, now nearly 80, doesn't believe at all that war on a world scale must come.

"I see no probability of a World war again," the co-author of the Kellogg-Briand anti-war pact says. "Nations and peoples have come to their senses, and have not forgotten and will not soon forget the awful horror, misery, and beastliness of the last conflict, which still has the world prostrate. . . There has been a lot of war scare talk, but we haven't war yet."

"I came home from Europe a year ago to hear people predicting war within 30, 60 or 90 days. There is no war yet. . . Every year that passes without war brings the world closer to the ultimate goal—universal peace."

Thomas Mann, distinguished German novelist, also believes war will not come inevitably. He believes its consequences are so unpredictable that even governments which rattle the sword freely will hesitate long and gravely before going in.

There is no use in sticking our heads in the sand, in kidding ourselves that war can be no more, it can, and it may. But it is equally silly, and far more dangerous, to let go unchallenged the talk that it must come.

The prophets of peace deserve their hearing no less than the prophets of war, that the people may decide which are the true prophets.

**AS WE GROW OLDER**

In more senses than one, the United States is growing up.

Statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company reveal that the United States now ranks fifth in national "youthfulness"—that is, in the percentage of its population which is below 20 years of age.

Russia is the youngest of all nations, with 49 per cent of its entire population under the 20 mark.

Back in 1850, the United States was in that position. Now, however, we are getting older. Less than 39 per cent of us, now, are below 20. We are getting older, growing more stable; and while the adventurous, pioneering spirit of the land has not by any means vanished, this change in the complexion of our people is bound to have an important effect on our outlook, our ambitions, and our way of doing things.
