



# THE PRIMARY

Memory is short, especially as regards election figures, and the individuals who are defeated are forgotten more often than they are remembered.

With a primary and general election again looming, and because there are prospects of many candidates, especially for the nomination as congressman, some statistics are supplied here, so readers man make their own analyses.

In the second congressional district at the primaries two years ago, according to figures from the office of the secretary of state, there were 52,893 votes cast for congressman. Of this number Addison T. Smith, Republican, polled more bailots than the five Democratic nominees. Smith received 27,094 votes, the Democratic spring to the general electron, mounted from 52,893, to 105,610, or nearly double, and there were presidential and senatorial contests to attract. It must be remembered that these figures are for only one congressional district. In the state the total primary wote was 86,698, while the total vote in the general election, was 189,000. It is to be expected that there will be a larger vote in the primaries this time than two years ago when approximately 25,000 votes were east by each of the two major parties in the second congressional district, but when this is to be divided among about 10 candidates on each ticket, then the race becomes interesting. If the primary vote is doubled, which is not to be expected, it would feave an average of 5000 votes for each congressional nominee.

The conclusion is inescapable then, that a very few thousand votes will decide the nominee of each party for such offices as congressman, where there are a large number of aspirants, Perhaps not all of

those who have announced will get into the race. On the other hand, there may be more candidates in the offing.

The primary system makes it possible for anyone having the legal qualifications and the necessary filing fee, to enter the race.

Before it is over the large number of candidates may discredit the primary system. At any rate, the filing period is still open. As Frank Burroughs says in his Idaho Pioneer: "Come on in, the water's lukewarm."

The statistics of this primary campaign may be forgotten after it is all over, but the memory of it doubtlessly, will be indelible.




