**Street Car Rioters Battle with Police**

**Mob Stones Trolleys, Beats Operators In Milwaukee**  
**Police Rescue Cat; Firemen Are Downcast**

 MILWAUKEE, June 27 (UP)—Ten men were arrested and nine treated in hospitals today after a mob of Socialist rioters had battled two hours to start a rioting mob of striking street-car operators and sympathizers.

Police estimated that 5,000 men took part in forcibly halting about 100 street cars at a central side intersection where five riotous men, while another six or seven thousand persons cheered them on.

Motorman beaten  
 Rioters were pulled from overhead wires and motormen who attempted to replace them were beaten. Two car operators were among those taken to hospitals.

Firemen in crowd  
 Firemen in a crowd of rioters were panicked in the street as a barrage of stones and bricks slammed through the "window" windows covered with heavy wire netting before the strike began.

Police in square  
 A police square was struck by the miles of bits of flying glass. None was hurt seriously.

Planned in Advance  
 Authorities said that the riot planning was financed by a group of about 2,000 persons over an hour when the first street car was stopped by a group of rioters who yanked its trolley from the wire.

Motorman, Frank Franklin, who had been beaten to the ground, attempted to replace it. Witnesses said, however, that the strike mobbers used no weapons but their fists.

**C.C.C. EXPANDED AS MEASURE FOR HELP ON DROUTH**

Additional 50,000 Men Will Be Signed From Stricken Arid Territory  
**MOVE INCLUDES IDAHO**

Twenty-Two States Share in Enrollment; New Camps Are Planned

WASHINGTON, June 27 (UP)—The civilian conservation corps will enroll 50,000 men from 22 states in drought-stricken areas in a further effort to relieve suffering. Director Robert Fechner announced today that the new contingent will include Idaho.

A total of 45,000 of those expected will be between the ages of 18 and 25 and will be men who have served in the military or in the navy. The men will be selected in 22 states ranging from California to Indiana.

Only youth living in cities in the drought area will be eligible for selection, and approximately 100 and 200 new camps are to be established in the area.

The men are to be selected from the newly in Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

**TREASURY PICKS ROOSEVELT CALLS ON**

**Brain Trust to Map New Laws**  
**Will Propose Changes Expected to Help on Necessary Long-Time Planning**

 WASHINGTON, June 27 (UP)—President Roosevelt today authorized a special job of "brain trust" to help map the Pacific coast longshoremen's strike.

His action forecast new national labor conciliation machinery to pacify industrial unrest during for weeks in all parts of the country.

The "brain trust" act-up, to be announced today or tomorrow, is expected to apply to the de-facto disputes of steel companies and their workers, and similar stubborn labor situations. The plan will carry into practice the special labor dispute legislation passed in the closing days of congress.

Coast Melitars  
 In the longshoremen's strike, the President, acting under authority of the National Labor Relations Act, has named a three-man board to arbitrate an reports of a dangerously tense situation in the Pacific coast.

The executive order was seen as a model of future industrial peace plans. The outline is broadly similar to that adopted in the automobile strike this spring.

In the organization of the President is expected to name a key arbitration board of three members from each of the groups of the national labor board. This board would be empowered to settle all cases of longshoremen.

Sets Precedent  
 On the basis of his action in the case of the longshoremen, it was considered likely that in major conflicts such as the steel case, a special three-man board would be named.

The key board then would be in a position to coordinate the settlement of labor situations while (Continued on Page 2, Column 4).

Norris, independent Republican without any party commitments whatever, has been through a strenuous year of congress. He is tired. But he is permitting himself only a short rest before plunging into the next session.

Norris revealed his beliefs: "That the United States was on the verge of a political crisis when this country faced 'after talk' when Mr. Roosevelt was elected.

"Mr. Roosevelt provided a sound leadership, that will be recalled, although the President could have been more radical in some policies and has made none since."

**IDAHO PRESSING DROUTH RELIEF**

Rains Fall to Halt Mopping of State Program for Water Aid

BOISE, Idaho, June 27 (UP)—Idaho has not had its drought relief plans into the discard because of recent rains. Gov. C. Ben Ross said today.

### Milton C. Work, Celebrated Master of Cards, Passes After Heart Attack

PHILADELPHIA, June 27 (Special)—Milton C. Work, celebrated master of whist and auction and bridge, died in a Philadelphia hospital early today. He had been ill a week of heart disease. He was 69.

Work was America's oldest bridge expert both in age and length of tenure in the public eye. Until he was surpassed by the young and colorful Ely Culbertson he was the best known of the men who changed a nation of poker players to the more effete and involved game of bridge.

Regua With Whist

He began his experting back in 1881 with whist, then the game of society and upper crust generally. He survived as an expert when whist was supplanted by auction bridge and when auction bridge merged into contract.

Work's health first became impaired during a bridge tournament at Reading, Pa., last October when he suffered a heart attack. He had a relapse last week. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. M. C. Work, and two step-children, Mrs. William W. Harber, Jr. of South Borough, Maine, and Henry H. Patton, Philadelphia.

In 1881 while a student at the University of Pennsylvania, Work got together eight friends and formed a team to challenge the city's original whist club, the Sunday Nighters. The youngsters decisively won.

After graduation, Work practiced law for 20 years but kept abreast of whist and family game law to devote himself to writing.

His first book was "Whist of Today," published in 1902. He wrote 23 books in all and his work on auction and contract bridge have had a large sale throughout the world.

Work was originator of the "official" system of contract bridge, which is the two club forcing convention.

He was an officer of the United States Bridge association, an organization formed by Culbertson.

NAVY PLANNING ALASKA FLIGHT

Coastwise Hop Along Pacific Scheduled as Training Measure

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Twelve navy planes will start a 17,000-mile coastwise flight from San Diego, Calif., to Dutch Harbor, Alaska, and return, July 17, the navy department has announced for the flight, scheduled as a training measure.

Two patrol squadrons of the albatross force are being prepared for the flight, scheduled as a training measure. According to present plans, the planes will return to the flight school at the U. S. S. Wright, flagship of Rear Admiral Alfred W. Johnson, at the flight school at the aircraft base force, and the U. S. S. Sandpiper, U. S. S. Swan, and U. S. S. The longest hop will be between Seattle, Wash., and Ketchikan, Alaska, 700 miles. Other hops to be included are San Francisco, Astoria, Vancouver, Portland, and several Alaskan hops, including Ketchikan, Stevia, Seward, Kodiak, Dutch Harbor, Sitka, and Prince Rupert.
