War Holocaust Dims As City Observes "Vidov Dan"

By RALPH HEINZEN SARAJEVO, June 28 (UP)—Twenty years ago today a pistol cracked twice in a Sarajevo street. Fifteen years had passed eight million men lay dead as a consequence.

At 11:15 a. m., June 28, 1914, a 19-year-old Bosnian schoolboy, Gavrilo Princip, shot twice at the occupants of an automobile. Before noon, Archduke Franz Ferdinand, innard of Austria and his bride, Countess Sophie of Hohenberg, were without regaining consciousness.

Emperor's Ultimatum London, June 28 (UP)—Francis-Joseph, emperor of the Austro-Hungarian empire sent an ultimatum to Belgrade. It demanded that war be hung over Europe until the first shot was fired on August 1.

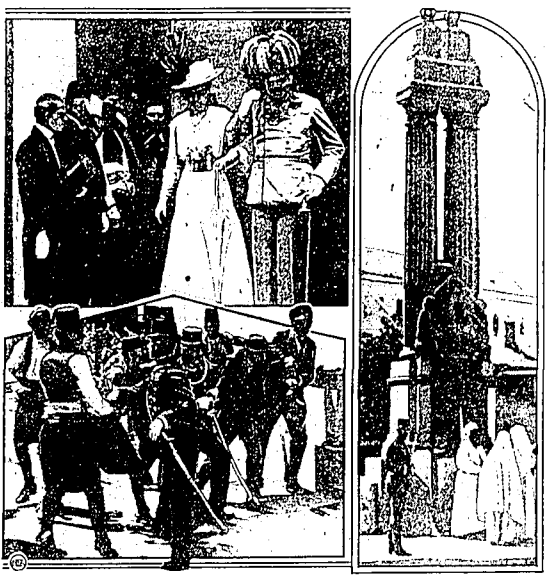
In the 60 months which followed, 65,038,000 troops were armed, 42,158,000 Allies against 23,880,000 men of the Central Powers. Before the Armistice of 1918 ended hostilities five thousand had fallen. Over a million had been killed; 97 per cent of 420 troops engaged had been either killed or wounded.

Empire Collapses The Austro-Hungarian empire, colonized by Serbs, Croats, Slovenes, and Montenegrins in a new union, Yugoslavia. That, after all, was the only aim of Gavrilo Princip and his two chief fellow-plotters, Nedjko Cabrinovic and Trifko Kravich.

Victor Dan—St. Vitus' Day—the great national feast mourning anniversary of the death of the medieval Serbian empire at the Battle of Kosovo, in 1389, was being observed today in Sarajevo. Franz Ferdinand, the emperor's son-in-law, was visiting Sarajevo, the Bosnian capital, during the 20th anniversary of two Austrian army corps.

National Birthday The day has an added significance, for the fête now not only is the anniversary of the collapse of the Serbian empire when the conquering Turk/overlord the Balkans, but also the 10th anniversary of the new Yugoslav nation.



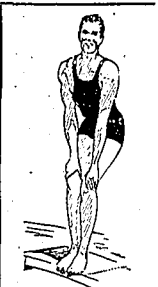
