GUARDSMEN RULE MINNEAPOLIS IN TRUCK DEADLOCK

Tension Lightens as Mediators Seek New Formula for Ending Strike

OLSON RAFFS EMPLOYERS Governor Attacks Contention That Communists Lead Union Men

MINNEAPOLIS, July 27 (AP)—National guardsmen ruling Minneapolis during the paralyzing strike of truck drivers today asked two Communist editors, James P. Cannon of "The Militant" and Max Schachtman of "The Internationalist."

The guardsmen said the editors, both of New York, were held "as suspicious characters." The editors were arrested despite a district court habeas corpus writ setting them free.

Meanwhile, the city took on the aspect of an armed camp as employers voted to stand pat on their refusal to accept a peace proposal drafted by mediators.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 27 (AP)—A half million Minneapolis residents went quietly and almost normally about their affairs today under martial law.

Soldiers with fixed bayonets brusquely forbade parking of automobiles in the business district and guarded milk, ice and grocery trucks. They streamed in and out of national guard headquarters almost within a stone's throw of the spot where 50 men were shot in a riot early in the week.

COAST SHIPPERS RESUME ACTIVITY

Pacific Ports Hum as Firms Return to Schedules After Strike

(AP)—President Roosevelt's national labor-shoremen board announced today that the question of hiring halls—bitterest angle to the Pacific coast longshore strike—had been settled in a manner satisfactory to the workers.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 27 (AP)—Pacific coast shipping quickly returned to normal today as ship-owners resumed schedules and shippers again turned to water transportation.

The waterfront here was congested. Seventeen sailings and 14 arrivals were on the overnight schedule. Two dozen ships lay in the bay awaiting pier space. One vessel sent its passengers ashore on lighters. There were 65 ships in the docks.

The Matson liner Lurline was due in from Honolulu today, the first visit to its home port since the early days of the strike.

Full Operation
The McCormick Steamship Co. announced full operation of its 23 vessels. The company's container ship, the Yuma, will return to service Tuesday, operating between Los Angeles and the local port after a two-month idleness.

The vessels American Eagle and American Oriole sailed for Puget Sound to take aboard 6,000,000 feet of lumber, the first lumber shipments in months.

Strikers continued to work the ships and unload the cargo.

MERCURY CLIMBS PAST 104 HERE

Heat records of the season topped here today when the mercury climbed to 104 at 2:30 p. m. and persisted with a few indications that the temperature would continue to mount during the latter part of the afternoon.

The thermometer at the bureau of meteorology today hit 98 degrees just before noon, and shortly after that hour went to 99 degrees, equalling the record last year of the bureau.

Maximum temperature here yesterday, according to the bureau's figures, was 98 degrees.

\$20,282 Cache Unearthed On Dead Rancher's Farm

ABOVE: A cache of cash and securities totaling \$20,282.75, from a wheat ship on the ranch of Chris Coulson, Murfreesboro, had been found today by Sheriff E. F. Prater.

Coulson's body was found in a field near his home Sunday. The man is believed to have died from natural causes three or four days previous to that. It was known that he had hidden a large amount of valuables on the place, and a casual inspection by Prater the day the body was found yielded \$1,000 in cash.

Found in Granary
Since then the search was continued, and yesterday there was unearthed in a quantity of wheat stored in a small granary, a large amount of bonds, notes, certificates, stocks, cash and currency.

Among these were seven \$1,000 U. S. treasury notes, two \$500 gold bonds, 21 \$100 treasury notes, 100 \$10 bonds, Twin Falls county tax anticipation notes, Idaho Power company stock, \$36 in silver, and \$225 in currency.

The money was also certificates of deposit in two banks and in postal savings accounts, and several personal notes, as well as uncashed checks on the Idaho Power company and on the U. S. treasury.

Prater said today that in addition, there was some \$2,000 in other securities not listed in the \$20,282 total.

Lived in Shack
Coulson was a bachelor, living for the past quarter of a century on his Murfreesboro ranch in a 10x12 foot shack. He owned a 40-acre farm and had his bean crop for several seasons back, totaling 30,000 pounds.

CONFIRMATION LEAPS DEFENSE LINES TO INVADAR ARROYO SCOR CAMP

PASADENA, Calif., July 27 (AP)—A sweeping brush blaze was rushed into the Arroyo Seco mountains today to replace a worned army of firefighters, battling a mile-long brush fire that was racing steadily toward the city of Pasadena.

Approximately two-score fire fighters were burned, several seriously. Homes were evacuated in the Upper Arroyo Seco, suburban area. Crews fought to save the residences.

The fire at 8 a. m. was within a mile and a half of Mt. Lowe, occupied by summer homes, the Pacific and Electric Electric railway and a large resort town. Pasadena officials believed the mountain would be encompassed unless the fire is controlled by tonight.

Wide Front
The east line of the blaze extended between San Gabriel peak and Brown mountain, an uninhabited area, stretched a mile west to the Arroyo Seco, where it burned within a few feet of the bottom of the canyon.

Although the fire was controlled for a time on the western extremity, it created a new emergency shortly before noon by jumping fire lines into public camp in Arroyo Seco. Fire crews were concentrated there in an effort to stamp out the blaze. The camp is operated by the county as a recreational center and a camping ground for tourists. It was promptly evacuated.

Start Backfire
A backfire was started in the hope that, added by a favorable wind, it would sweep the blaze back to the Arroyo Seco.

8 CHILDREN DIE IN RAIL TRAGEDY

AUSTRIA BALKS NEW MOVE BY NAZIS TO SEIZE GOVERNMENT

European Hopes For Peace Rest With Four Men

By RALPH HENZEN
PARIS, July 27 (AP)—Twenty years ago today a few old men who had read about war in books prepared the ultimatum from Austria to Berlin which, delivered next day, plunged the world into its greatest conflict.

Today the peace of Europe, if not the world, centered round four men, the oldest 55, all of whom fought in that war and two of whom served all through it.

The Vital Four
They are: Franz von Papen of Germany, 55, military attaché at Washington until 1916, then assigned to the French army.

Adolf Hitler of Germany, 44, chancellor of the Reich, a soldier of the trenches.

Benito Mussolini of Italy, 50, premier and Fascist leader, a soldier of the trenches.

Prince Ernst Rüdiger von Starhemberg of Austria, 33, acting chancellor, who joined the army at 17 and became a lieutenant.

Papen was appointed today to the most important diplomatic post in the world at the moment—special minister to Austria.

Important Task
The task is to win Austria's friendship for Nazi Germany, allies 20 years ago, the countries' governments now are enemies.

Hitler and Mussolini are well known to each other, their common language is that of the people who, disgusted with post-war conditions, rallied political armies to war for power, bit by bit.

MUSSOLINI BANS VERBAL PROTEST

11 Duce Will Act with Army If Intervention Proves Need in Austria

ROME, July 27 (AP)—Premier Benito Mussolini believes any diplomatic action in the Austrian crisis would be futile and if he acts at all it will be with his army. It was said authoritatively today.

"Furthermore, it was said Mussolini will not participate in any diplomatic action between France and England may decide upon."

11 Duce, the informant explained, clearly demonstrated his attitude by sending 40,000 men to the Austrian frontier, ready to cross over if necessary, to preserve Austrian independence.

Will Act Alone
The statement was made in discussion of the Paris announcement that France, England and Italy were in accord and that France and England would be taking any diplomatic initiative.

Italy will take part in no such action, much less lead it, it was said. Italy was expected to remain neutral, working for peace, as the central foreign figure in the crisis, and will move only when he feels it necessary and when he knows he is right.

GRAHAM, M'KAY JURY DEADLOCKS

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Smashes Second Attempt To Capture Chancellor

Desperate Fighting Spreads Through Wide Area of Southern Provinces in Effort at Suppression

VIENNA, July 27 (AP)—The Austrian government today smashed another bold attempt by Nazi plotters, who had planned to seize the chancellor and hold the cabinet prisoners. Simultaneously, heavy fighting with large loss of life was reported from the provinces.

Score of arrests were made by police spies, who reported that the Nazis had planned to carry out the desperate pounce this afternoon or evening.

Discovery of the plot brought heavy military reinforcements to the chancellor, and the muzzles of machine guns were trained on the streets from the chancellor's windows.

Every person approaching the government buildings was stopped and searched, and the utmost precautions were taken by the guards.

Wide Fighting
While the government was frantically the new Nazi plot in the capital, its armed forces were engaged in ruthless suppression of Nazi insurgents in the provinces. Desperate fighting spread over a wide area of southern Austria. About 105 to 185 were estimated to have been killed and 260 wounded.

Vienna was wild with rumors during the day. Police denied reports that arrested Nazis already were being hanged, that the railway to Linz had been cut, or that any members of the cabinet had been arrested or wounded. (It had been rumored that Major Emil Fey had been shot.)

Half an hour after the report was circulated, however, the maid at the Fey home said Fey had just had lunch and proceeded to a cabinet meeting.

Shooting in Vienna
Shooting broke out this afternoon in Melting street in the 12th ward and Schoenbrunn street in the 5th ward of Vienna.

Witnesses from Feldkirchen indicated that fighting still was in progress after the Nazis had been driven out of the city. Police said shooting was going on in the nearby villages of Gnanau and Himmelsberg. Feldkirchen is the chief Nazi stronghold in Carinthia.

Police said the casualties comprised six soldiers and two Nazis killed and 85 soldiers and four Nazis wounded. They believed four others may have been killed in the outskirts as troops chased the Nazis heading from the city.

Each of the six trucks in which the Nazis retreated carried about 30 men. An army company was in possession of the city at latest reports.

Papers Confiscated
Police confiscated Vienna newspapers which commented on the appointment of Vice-Chancellor Franz von Papen as new minister to Vienna as a Hitler peace overture.

Heimwehr, 50,000 men and troops captured 500 Nazis near Hintersieben in upper Austria after a short fight. The Nazis were surprised before they could organize for action.

Several persons were killed, according to reliable reports, in an exchange of shots between police and a mixed crowd of Nazis. (Continued on Page 2, Column 1)

AUSTRIAN DEATH TOLL NEARS 200

Casualties in Nazi Fighting Estimated Between 165 and 185 Killed

VIENNA, July 27 (AP)—The death toll in the Nazi fighting now in progress in Austria was estimated by the United Press today, from official and private sources, at between 165 and 185 killed on both sides. The wounded up to 3 p. m. today were estimated at 250.

The tabulation includes 68 killed in Styria, where the fighting was heaviest.

Of the total dead, perhaps 100 were among the government forces, who were more exposed than the Nazis. The latter fought from buildings and usually fled before the heavy firing started.

Speculative Estimate
All estimates are more or less speculative. The number might be reduced somewhat by duplication of reports, or it might be increased through scattered engagements in Carinthia this morning.

The number of Nazis arrested throughout Austria is possibly 1,200, with perhaps 600 Socialists also taken into custody.

It was roughly estimated there are 2,500,000 Nazi sympathizers in the country. But the militant ones number only a few thousands, and perhaps two or three thousand took part in the fighting. The clashes have affected some 40 towns.

Fighting in Province
The fighting in the provinces of Styria and Carinthia, the latter lying along the Italian border, across which Premier Benito Mussolini's troops are stationed.

Aton-Ludwig from Carinthia indicated the situation might be serious, despite the government's assurance that it was in control. As fast as the Nazis were driven from one town or village, they would move into another.

Quincy Town
Word from the town of Wolfberg, on the main railway line in upper Carinthia, said it was occupied by Nazis at present. The town made a stand against the government. All communications were cut. Trains through Carinthia were rerouted.

Fighting was reported to have broken out this afternoon in Laseg, a town in the province of Salzburg, which extends on the north of Carinthia down to the Italian Alps.

The pass, which is near the frontier of Bavaria in the north of the province, was reported to be in possession of the Nazis, who were receiving reinforcements.

Two Sentenced
The Vienna military court, under the emergency laws of 1933, sentenced two Nazis, Leopold Mitterlechner and Oskar Briel, to five years, at hard labor, today, and another Otto Kuhn, to six years on a charge of dynamiting.

Three others were bound over to the ordinary courts. (The July 18 courts are distinct from the special military tribunal decreed by the cabinet yesterday for trial of the Nazis who assassinated Chancellor Engelbert Dollfuss.)

Chancellery Guarded
The chancellery was cordoned heavily by Heimwehr troops, who allowed no one but officials to approach. Although the chancellery is in the building, journalists were barred. Guards halted an automobile containing a man and a woman and examined their credentials before allowing them to enter.

I beg you to undertake
I beg you to undertake this important task, especially since during our cooperation in the cabinet you have enjoyed and you still enjoy, my fullest, unlimited confidence.

Special Mission
Therefore, I have suggested to President von Hindenburg that you resign from the cabinet and be appointed for a limited period, and for a special mission, as German minister to Vienna.

Permit me to thank you again
Permit me to thank you again for everything you once did in bringing together the government in the national uprising, and in the cabinet which you have since then, with us, for Germany.

NEW YORK, July 27 (AP)—Characterizing that portion of Gov. Floyd B. Olson's martial law proclamation relating to the Minneapolis strike as a "sweeping legislation in defiance of the federal constitution," the American Civil Liberties Union today offered to defend without compensation all newspaper or people charged with violating that section.

The United States supreme court has but recently decided that the efforts of the Minnesota legislature to suppress undesirable newspapers, "run counter to the federal constitution," a statement by the union said.

Tramp's Rights
Now comes Governor Olson trying to accomplish what the legislature of Minnesota was unable to secure and, by a stroke of his pen, seeks to muzzle the press and stamp upon the people's constitutional right to freedom of speech, freedom of assembly and freedom of the press.

The governor of Minnesota is not above the constitution. The American Civil Liberties Union offers its services to defend without compensation all newspapers and all persons charged with a violation of that portion of Governor Olson's proclamation which is in defiance of the constitution.

At the same time, the Civil Liberties Union said it had authorized Arthur Leary, its legal representative in Minneapolis to offer his services in defense of newspapers or persons charged with violation of the governor's press edit.

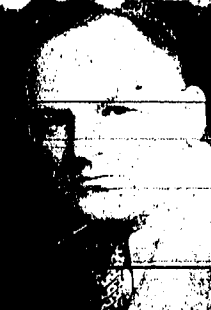

PROBLEMS WAIT FOR MORGENTHAU

Pressing Decision Must Come From Treasury Head After Vacation Ends

By RICHARD L. GRIDLEY WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP) — New problems pending for early solution will confront Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., when he returns to his desk Monday after a month's vacation in the Montana wilds. After the difficult 30 day period in the treasury department since the new administration took office, important problems likely to be taken up first are:

- 1. Government steps to promote increased business activity after Labor day following the current summer slump.
- 2. New moves in the silver purchase plan whereby the government is trying to boost commodity prices by raising silver prices and increasing production of silver.
- 3. Refunding of lower interest rates \$224,748,000 of 4 1/2 per cent treasury certificates falling due Sept. 15 and \$1,200,000,000 of fourth Liberty bond 4 1/2 per cent bonds falling due Oct. 15.
- 4. Calling for redemption on Dec. 15 of the \$1,033,210,300 of 4 1/2 and 4 1/4 per cent first Liberty loan bonds and their refunding with lower interest bearing securities.

Smuggling Drive

5. Strengthening of government forces in combating a fresh threat of liquor smuggling into the United States by a growing "rum row" off the north Atlantic coast. Decision in most of these problems have been reserved by acting Secretary of Treasury Thomas Jefferson Coolidge until the return of Morgenthau. Treasury economists and officials have been assembling extensive data in order that Morgenthau can formulate policies.

Current government spending, while nearly double that of a year ago, is not likely to exceed \$200,000,000 this month, compared with the peak of nearly \$1,000,000,000 last January. About \$2,000,000,000 is still available for spending over the next 11 months of the fiscal year and it is possible that an early increase will be seen in the rate of outflow of these funds.
