STRIKERS RENEW GUERRILLA DRIVE AT MINNEAPOLIS

Trucks Overturned, Drivers Beaten by Elusive Bands of Terrorists

PICKETS DEFY TROOPERS

Hit-Run Tactics Enrage Head of Minnesota Guardsmen Ruling City

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 2 (AP)—Guerrilla warfare flared anew in Minneapolis streets today as striking truck drivers renewed attacks on commercial vehicles. Trucks overturned, automobiles damaged and drivers beaten.

Terrorists Elusive Pickets struck simultaneously in many parts of the city. Most of the violence was in the outlying sections. Military patrol cars chased the elusive terrorists.

Gov. Floyd B. Olson, who declared martial law and placed 61,000 inhabitants of Hennepin county under a military "dictator" a week ago, was a leading figure in the new peace move.

Leaders Jailed While the strikers watched hopefully for the release of their leaders from the military blockade, the continuing military campaign of terrorism.

Pickets were renewed yesterday after an interruption of five days. Guardsmen responded with the use of rifles and clubs.

TREASURY PLANS SILVER CURRENCY

Issuance of \$50,000,000 in Certificates Promised by Morgenthau

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—Immediate issuance of \$50,000,000 in new silver certificates against free silver in the treasury was promised today by Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau, jr.

First Bills Printed Secretary Morgenthau displayed the first certificates rolled off the press today. The \$10,000,000 figure would begin around September 1 and \$100 million silver certificates would be ready by October 1.

(Continued From Page One) of the father. Hitler would resign supreme and that there could be little upon opposition to his assumption of a post which kaisers alone have held in the past.

There seemed not a thought for old Hindenburg, who ordered that the German army while Hitler was lunging war paper twenty years ago.

If it were a routine affair, the law passed by the cabinet, making Hitler a parallel in office to the President of the United States, was promulgated. It said:

"Article I.—The office of Reich president will be united with that of chancellor. In consequence the previous prerogatives of the president are transferred to the chancellor, Adolf Hitler, who will appoint his deputy."

"Article II.—This law is effective with the death of President von Hindenburg."

By that law Hitler became head of the entire state and commander in chief of the army and navy.

Army Control Vital  
It seemed likely to overwhelm emphasize his new control over the army. There was some criticism by higher officers of the manner in which the June 30 Sturm Troop revolt was suppressed and of the (vulgar outbreaks of the Nazi radicals whom the suppression of the revolt quieted. But the new turn of events put Hitler on top, it was believed. There were two main reasons:

1.—Hitler moved closer to an alliance with the Reichwehr as a body.

2.—There is a perilous foreign situation which forbids thought of internal strife among men as traditionally loyal to the country as army men.

Even those who expect pressure from Reichwehr officers believe that the present would be an ill chosen time for settling domestic accounts.

Foreign Goals  
Italian troops, concentrated on the Austrian frontier, are looking over at Germany.

The outside world is hostile and is forming the Nazi blockade behind its only leader, Hitler.

Thus the real effect of Hindenburg's death may be to make Hitler unrivaled head of the nation and to make the Reichwehr into the force on which his power rests.

It was nowhere believed that Hindenburg's passing would bring a new era in the Nazi program. The Sturm Troop revolt was a grave orator.

Hitler then proved himself as strong a check on radicalism as Hindenburg ever was. He relied on the army. So now, does Hitler.

### HITLER ASSUMES CHARGE OF ARMY

#### German Troops Take Oath of Fidelity to Chancellor as Commander

(Continued From Page One) Hitler was presented to the German army as its leader today a few hours after his old leader, President Paul von Hindenburg, died.

General Werner von Hindenburg, minister of defense, proclaimed an order that each soldier must pledge absolute loyalty to the death, to Hitler, who first time came into command of Germany's armed forces.

The text of the oath is: "I swear by God this holy oath: that I will give unconditional obedience to the leader of the German government and the German people, Adolf Hitler, as commander in chief of the army, and that in a emergency I will be ready at any time to place my life at stake for this oath."

Cheer Hitler  
After the oath was taken, Hindenburg ordered a "hurrah" for Hitler should be given, and then the band should play Deutschland über Alles and the Nazi Horst Wessel anthem.

Hindenburg, minister, chief of the SS picked Nazi bodyguards, issued the following:

"President von Hindenburg has departed this life and gone to the hereafter. We are all in mourning for him and at the same time remember all our comrades who during and after the war died for German liberty. We honor his memory according to the fashion of German men—through fulfilling our duty to the last, for the leader, for the nation and for freedom."

Great Example  
Franz Seidel, chief of the Front Fighters organization (the former Steel Helmet war veterans) issued the following:

"If we now bid farewell to that immortal German soldier, Von Hindenburg, we do so with the realization that his great personality and his future influence will direct and bind to duty every fighter of the German nation."

### KAISER MOURNS FOR HINDENBURG

#### Former Emperor Sends Family Condolences on Death of World War Hero

(Copyright, 1934, United Press) DORTMUND, HOLLAND, Aug. 2 (UP)—Former Kaiser Wilhelm II, who 20 years ago today watched from a palace window German troops marching to death or glory, sent from his place of exile at Doorn House today condolences to President Paul von Hindenburg's wife.

The \$50,000 house, originally built by Pauline Frederick, stage and screen star, brought only \$15,000—exactly \$10 more than mortgage on the property. The bid, made by Robert M. Love, later was not made because a proper down payment could not be made.

The New York team seemed paralyzed. Six Boston Braves pitchers held them to thirty hits in three innings, with one out.

The second-place Cubs meanwhile enjoyed a 4-0 shutout at the hands of Paul Dean of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Brooklyn staged an uprising in the eighth, beating Philadelphia 4-1. Ray Benge was credited with the win.

Chicago's rejuvenated Cincinnati Reds took advantage of Gusie Sub's fumble and wild throw in the sixth to run over four runs and beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-6.

Detroit bounced the Yankees out of the American league lead after a one-day stopover, beating Cleveland 10-7.

The Yankees lost to Boston, 7-4. The Red Sox gang on Johnny Bronco for a homer, two singles and two doubles in the ninth.

Chicago tumbled—the St. Louis Browns bucked into the lead—2-0 against the Yankees in the eighth.
