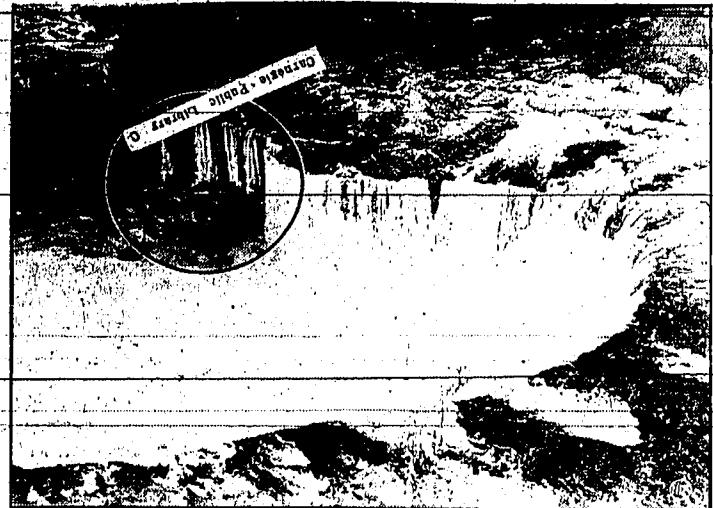
She started to testify in a calm, matter-of-fact manner that she had brought a revolver from San Jose at her father's request "because he wanted to kill himself."

IDAHO'S POTATO ESTIMATE DROPS

Forecast for Gem State Two Million Bushels Under Last Year

In contrast with the balance of the country, the Idaho potato crop this year will be less than last, according to present estimates of the U. S. department of agriculture.

Figures compiled by John Johnson, federal crop estimator at Twin Falls, after the crop was pronounced, as of Aug. 1, at 19,010,000 bushels in comparison with 21,850,000 bushels in 1933, and a five-year average of 22,388,000 bushels. Production declined in July due to extreme heat and failure of water supplies in some areas, he says.

Yield and quality of the early crop in western counties were satisfactory, but the late crop in some of the main commercial counties may suffer if rains do not occur to supplement late irrigation water supplies.

Above 1933

For the country as a whole, the crop reporting service has divided the producing areas by districts to permit a closer analysis of the forecast, which is for 327,281,000 bushels, compared with a July forecast of 344,000,000, a production last year of 330,000,000 bushels, and a five-year average of 335,550,000 bushels.
