NEW ORGANIZATIONS

With the reorganization of the county central committees of the Democratic and Republican parties, the decks have been cleared for waging an active political campaign here this fall.

The Democrats have chosen R. G. Wilson, Kimberly, to direct the destinies of the party in this county, and the Republicans have named E. N. Pettygrove, also from the eastern end of the county.

In both organizations recognition has been given the older and the younger elements, as well as the women along with the men.

Party organization, after all, is in direct control of party members, and party officials have important functions to perform, for they are semi-official holders of public office. At the primary elections, the voters in each party are called upon to elect precinct committeemen, who, in turn, name the county central committee officials. Among these are officials who by law are also delegates to the state platform conventions of the parties. They help choose the state party officers, including the national committeemen, and assist in making platforms, and thus influence the party organization nationally as well as in the state and county.

The effectiveness of the work of county political organizations off-times determines who is to be elected, and thus the kind of public officials and the kind of government we have may be laid to political party organizations such as were named here yesterday.

With the state platform conventions set for the latter part of the month, but little will remain excepting a two-months campaign to name officials for the terms commencing the first of the year.

STILL AHEAD OF EUROPE

William Feather, Cleveland business man, returns from a trip to Europe with the remark that, in spite of the depression, "this country is living on a plane that Europe will be lucky to reach in another generation."

Compared with France, Germany and England, he says, the ordinary man in the United States is living, if not a life of luxury, at least a life of comfort.

Conditions in England are better than those on the continent; but even there "the plain people do not know, as they never have known, a living standard comparable to what we find here after five years of devastating depression."

Here is something worth remembering. It does no good, Heaven knows, to try to minimize the effects of the depression, to try to pretend that there has been little real hardship.

But it doesn't hurt to remember that, when all is said and done, we are still luckier than most people. The American standard of living is a heritage which even the depression hasn't wrecked.

AN EXAMPLE FOR AMERICA

Traffic authorities in London have issued a new rule, providing that no automobile horns may be sounded anywhere in the city at night. The period of silence will last, approximately, from 11 p. m. to 6 or 7 in the morning; during that time the sleep of Londoners will be protected, and roving traffic cops will crack down on any driver who touches his klaxon button.

Anyone who has lost sleep—and who hasn't?—because some goof of a motorist is unable to proceed two blocks without sounding his horn lustily, will approve of this regulation. The average motorist uses his horn far too much.

Indeed, traffic might be a good deal safer if drivers generally made a practice of using their brakes instead of their horns when they saw some person or vehicle in the right-of-way ahead of them.

The three high scores of the meet were included in this team, an Clark Wheeler, Jerome, placed second and Howard Rutherford and Robert Lantz (tie) for second. The team of I. E. Stansell, Duhi, placed second and the Twin Falls team, captained by Amil Amis, won third.

Rupert Superior showed a decided superiority to all others in judging all livestock. Their score was 80.5. Receiving a score of 36.25.

Gerard Guston, Rupert, won high individual honors with a score of 1317. Leoni Adly, Hays, won second place, and Jay Olson, Rupert, third.

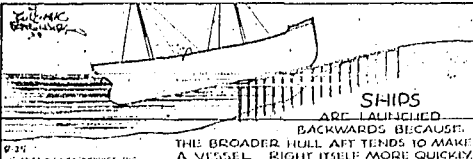

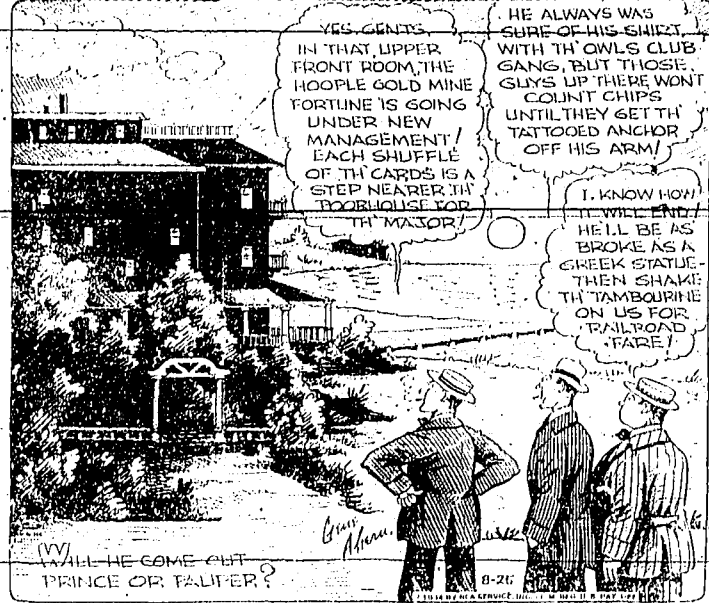
