PWA Leader Says Speculators Are Retarding Government Slum Clearance

20 CITIES WILL BE AIDED

Program in Large Communities 'Only Scratches Surface,' Atlanta Hears

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 28 (AP)—PWA Administrator Harold L. Tokes today cracked down on land sharks and unscrupulous politicians at the dedication of two large federal slum clearance projects.

Tokes unleashed a tongue lashing at enemies of recovery such as he has seldom delivered before.

He referred to real estate speculators, who have actually retarded the government's \$100,000,000 housing and slum clearance program.

"In search of our cities," said he, "we literally have to go on tiptoes through the various cities, holding our breath and hoping against hope that we will be able to take an option or buy the property desired, or at least start condemnation proceedings before these speculators know what we are about."

"Our inability to announce our plans, because to do so would be to make it impossible to put these plans into effect, has had the result of encouraging criticism that has been both ill-timed and unfounded."

WAGE REDUCTION CAMPAIGN FACES NEW NRA BOARD

Wage Boost Problem Grets Members as First Worry

BY LYLE A. BROOKOVER WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (AP)—A general drive to reduce working hours to 36 a week and increase wages of skilled workers greeted the new national industrial recovery board today as one of the first and most difficult problems.

The first test of the hourly reduction probably will come in the cotton ginning industry, the industry was granted a stay until Oct. 15 of an order of President Roosevelt reducing hours 10 per cent, increasing piece workers' wages and maintaining regular wage scales.

The President directed that study be made prior to the effective date of the order, with the provision that both sides be permitted to present evidence.

With heavy emphasis on reassurance to industry, the board, already organized by long distance telephone, is prepared to launch its administration early next week.

The unemployment situation was seen as one of the most pressing tasks before the new board. Under Gen. Hugh S. Johnson about 3,000,000 persons were estimated to have been put back to work. Ten million more are idle.

Quickest Method The quickest method of putting men to work—by reducing working hours under the codes—appears likely to receive no attention.

Two industries employing about 30,000 workers have provided the proving ground for the experiment, according to Col. George F. Brady, assistant administrative officer, board, in charge of the early next month.

A man with a high school education has no incentive to go into either of the two industries, though both art and skill are necessary, and four years' apprentice training after high school, the young mechanic is likely to be offered a wage of \$1.50.

NEWEST RANSOM SUSPECT LAUGHS AT CHICAGO QUIZ

Ex-Convict, Yield as Possible 'John' of Jalsie Story, Grins at Probers

CHICAGO, Sept. 28 (AP)—John Bowman, 29-year-old ex-convict arrested for the Lindbergh ransom, laughed today at the idea that he may be the man who collected \$50,000 ransom for the infant son of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh.

"I don't know Bruno Hauptmann and I don't know anything about the Lindbergh case except what I read in the papers," Bowman said in good-natured reply to questions.

Thinker Quiz Bowman as a youth served a prison term for interstate transportation of a stolen motor car. Through hours of questioning by police and federal agents he persisted in treating his connection with the Lindbergh case as a joke.

Police arrested Bowman and his wife on the strength of a tip variably reported to have originated in Chicago and Washington, D. C. "Resembles 'John'."

Deputy Detective Chief Walter Stornum said Bowman "looks like the 'John' described by Dr. John E. Condon (Jalsie) as the man to whom he paid the ransom."

At the time of the Lindbergh kidnaping, Bowman said, he was traveling the south with a stream.

TO DIE IN BRITON RAILROAD WRECK

Added Deaths Feared After Express Crashes Into Slow Train

WRETHWOOD, England, Sept. 28 (AP)—Ten persons were feared dead today as a result of a railroad collision at Wrethwood Junction. One hundred were reported injured, 27 seriously.

The London-Birmingham express crashed last night into the rear of a slow train as it sped along a stretch where the tracks were raised ten feet above the ground level.

Two coaches of the express were derailed, and others were derailed. Stragglers of the crews of the trains were not injured. A call was sent for doctors and ambulances from nearby Lancashire towns.

Surgons at Warrington hospital, where most of the injured were taken, worked throughout the night. They feared some would die.

Wood Expert Aids in Case

Man Who Traced Ladder Used By Kidnapers Will Seek Further Clues

TRIDENTON, N. J., Sept. 28 (UP)—Arthur Koehler, keen-eyed, bald-headed department of agriculture expert who identified the lumber used in the Lindbergh kidnaping as purchased from a Bronx lumber yard, was here today to aid in the case against Bruno Hauptmann.

He took far from completed with the identification of the lumber, Koehler, wood technologist, announced he would establish a laboratory at the state police training school at Wilburham.

Will Examine Wood He will examine fragments of wood from the Hauptmann garage described by investigators searching for Lindbergh ransom money. More than \$14,000 was recovered there.

Koehler will examine all carpenter's tools found on the premises occupied by the unemployed German to determine if any were used in construction of the ladder. It is entirely possible for defects, such as rough or nicked edges in tools, to show on the wood pieces, which are used," the expert explained.

Difficult Trail Koehler has been working on the Lindbergh case since the kidnaping March 1, 1932. He spent four days examining the crudely constructed ladder before he determined that it was Pontiac pine from a wood coast forest. He traced it to a California mill, thence to the National Lumber and Millwork company in "the Bronx." There the trail broke off for the Bronx tracer kept no records of small transactions.

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

In that case the world series could not open at Detroit until Friday or Saturday.




