Maybe Rippey Martin, the irrepressible hitter who came from nowhere to be the hero of the 1931 series, will again take the headlines for the Cards, but the base hitting ace probably will be a player no one figures on.
The series starts here tomorrow. A second game will be played on Thursday. Then the series shifts to St. Louis where the third and fourth games are booked for Friday and Saturday, with the fifth, if needed, on Sunday. Sixth and seventh games, if necessary to decide, would be played here Monday and Tuesday.
