### NEW FIRM WILL PRODUCE MOVIES

Concern Headed by Easterner Will Spend \$7,000,000 in Features in Color

(Copyright, 1934, United Press) HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 2 (AP)—Pioneer Pictures, headed by John Hay Whitney, New York financier, will spend \$7,000,000 in the production of nine or more technicolor feature pictures, it was announced today.

Whitney returned to New York last night after completing details of the production program which calls for the first picture going into rehearsal Nov. 28 with Miriam Hopkins in the leading role.

### LEGION LEADER FIRM ON BONUS

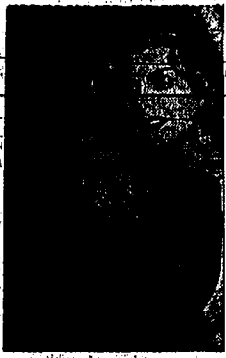

### COURT APPROVES MUNICIPAL LOANS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—The U. S. Supreme Court today approved the plan of the city of Twin Falls to issue municipal bonds for the purpose of financing a new water supply system.

### 30-HOUR WEEKLY PLANS ATTACKED

#### Cotton Textile Institute Head Sees Arbitrary Action as Recovery Threat

BALTIMORE, Nov. 2 (Special)—Arbitrary adoption of the 30-hour week would defeat the very purpose of the government's economic program, George A. Sloan, president of the Cotton Textile Institute told the Baltimore Association of Commerce today.

An increase of one-third labor costs, he indicated, would be passed on to the consumer, and, he doubtedly would produce a new buyers' strike which in turn would result in decreased production.

"The government," he said, "has adopted a policy of increasing the price of the farmer's products to give him a relatively higher purchasing power of manufactured products. To make a blanket increase in the cost of manufactured products would directly defeat the objective of the government and put the farmer back where he was before."

Sloan said that under its code the cotton textile industry was employing 104,000 more workers, and average hourly wage rates were 76 per cent higher during this year's summer slump than they were in March, 1933, despite a decline of production.

REGISTER TODAY, WHELAN ADVISES

Bourbon Headquarters Chief Urges Action to Assure Right of Voting

An appeal to all citizens to register this week for the election Tuesday, was issued today by James D. Whelan, in charge of Democratic headquarters.

Whelan pointed out that the registration books close Saturday at 9 p. m., making it necessary to register either today or tomorrow.

Whelan issued the following statement: "If you registered and voted at the general election of 1932 and have not moved from your precinct, or if you have registered this year and voted at the primary, you need not register again. Otherwise you must and should either register in your new home or get a transfer from your old precinct to the new."

"The silly season around Halloween has produced nothing more absurd than the plea of Senator Borah that we should vote against congressional and state nominees in Idaho who favor presidential politics, in which farmers and workers benefit, in order to elect Republican nominees who oppose such policies. Senator Borah says we have too many congressmen, who back the President in policies which Borah opposes, and which cause a loss of income to farmers and workers. Of course, similar arguments are being made by Republican politicians in every state in the union, and if friends of the President should heed these pleas in order to 'vote with their political antagonists, we would have no congressmen except critics and intimidators of president or gubernatorial policies."

"Of course, if you are opposed to the New Deal, you should vote the Republican ticket. We do not doubt the personal honesty of those who would the New Deal frankly and cheerfully as 'The New Deal.' They have that right if they believe that way. But they must think believers in a general way of the New Deal policy, are awful fools, when they appeal to them for an anti-New Deal policy, congress and state administration and legislation."

"Discredit Himself" The above statement may be subjected to the whimsy of a change in the mind of Senator Borah. The senator discredits himself when, with all his ingenuity, he can find no better argument than the one he advances for electing a Republican national house of representatives or G. O. P. state officials.

"There is only one way to elect those who will back the President in the policy which farmers and workers need now, that is to elect those who favor his plans. There is only one way to elect those that will vote for them. You cannot vote for them unless you register. Therefore, register."

REPEAL LEADERS WIDEN EFFORTS Campaign in Idaho Will Be Intensified as Means of Aiding Revenue

HOISE, Idaho, Nov. 2 (Special) — A campaign to end Idaho as an island of prohibition in the sea of wet states will be intensified during the remaining days before election, it was announced here today.

Idaho state law prohibits sale of liquors of more than 3.2 alcoholic content. Utah is its nearest "dry" neighbor.

An amendment to the state constitution making Idaho "just like other states" in respect to liquor sales will be offered voters at the Nov. 6 election.

President Arthur D. Wilson, Twin Falls, of the repeal league, called attention to amendment which has been heretofore somewhat overlooked in the pre-election campaign.

He declared that Idaho citizens are spending thousands of dollars in wet state and made a plea the state law be repealed in order that Idaho may benefit by added taxation on liquor sales.
