

NEW FIRM WILL PRODUCE MOVIES

Concern Headed by Easterner Will Spend \$7,000,000 in Features in Color

(Copyright, 1934, United Press) HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 2 (UPI)—Pioneer Pictures, headed by John Hay Whitney, New York financier, who spent \$7,000,000 in the production of nine or more technicolor feature pictures, it was announced today.

Whitney returned to New York last night after completing details of the production program which calls for the first picture going into rehearsal Nov. 28 with Miriam Hopkins in the leading role.

This studio announced that Marlin Cooper, upon completing his current two pictures at RKO, will join Pioneer as vice president in charge of production.

Holton Hayes, whose "Act of God" baby-made theatrical history three years ago, is expecting a second child, according to reports circulated in the movie colony today.

The reports were brutalized about immediately after Miss Hayes, wife of Charles MacArthur, playwright and screenwriter, arrived from New York by plane and within the hour started work on a new picture, *Venus*.

Necessity of rewriting the scenario caused a 60-day postponement today in the production schedule of Max Baer's latest film enterprise.

BUSINESS READY FOR NEW GAINS

Dun & Bradstreet Point Out Factors Looking Toward Upward Surge

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (UPI)—Increasing evidence is appearing that the nation's business level has been checked with preparations completed for a concerted forward surge, Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., reported today.

A general hesitant attitude is restricting progress at the moment, the review said, but added:

"With the best sales period of the year immediately ahead, the multiplied demands incident to Christmas shopping are mounted up to give the final impetus to the movement of any weighty merchandise accumulations, and the business situation—marked and bring a more general improvement to industrial centers by the full impact of spring replenishment requirements."

Pay Will Ease

Announcements of pay increases are forthcoming, the review said, and more are planned to offset the imminent advance of living costs.

"With the emphasis of coercion replaced swiftly by an understanding spirit of sympathetic co-operation, and a speedy elimination of harshness and unfair trade practices, the attitude of business is leaning more strongly on the support of the NRA as a productive medium of a steadier trend, both in the manufacturing and distribution branches," the review said.

LEGION LEADER FIRM ON BONUS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (UPI)—National Commander Frank N. Belgrave, head of the American Legion, today emphasized the veterans stand in behalf of immediate payment of the bonus.

"His statement came in answer to that of Veterans' Administrator Frank T. Hines who suggested to President Roosevelt the hope that the Legion would revise its demand for immediate payment.

"I want it to be known," Belgrave said, "that no action taken by the convention will be relegated to the background, and probably not one of what the Legion has expressed itself so emphatically as 'adjusted compensation.'
