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SCREEN ACTORS WORK ON ROLES

Film Players Rehearse Long Hours Before Start of Actual Scenes

HOLLYWOOD (U)—Acting before the camera is not at all the matter of improvisation that it appears on the screen. Every gesture and every line is the result of hours of study, preparation and practice to insure the smoothness and continuity that mark a story as revealed before an audience.

Lionel Barrymore, for instance, may rehearse a scene only once before the actual "take," but he already has been working on it for hours. In his dressing room he reads the scene, fits gestures, "business" and expressions into the story. After several of these private rehearsals, a director, or an accompanying business man indelicately associated, he is ready.

Careful Methods
 Charles Laughton uses the same careful method and novel method of building up characterization. He is a stickler for realism. If called upon to handle a gold pan-holder, he wants a gold pan-holder, not a pretty imitation. In "Payment Deferred" he was required to drink a high-ball with Verree Teasdale.  Jeanette MacDonald rehearsed her songs for hours with her teacher or before she sings any number before the microphone.

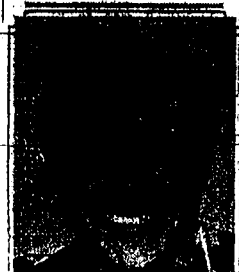

MOVIES ACHIEVE DEPTH ILLUSION

Secret Will Remain in Dark Until Cartoonist Gets His Patents

NEW YORK (U)—The illusion of depth on the picture screen, technically known as third-dimension, is no longer an enigma to the film industry. After scientists and large picture producers have cooperated fully, expecting thousands of dollars in the hunt for a new perspective which would change the movie business as radically as the introduction of talkies, a cartoonist is today actually delivering the coveted illusion in some of his drawings.

How he does it will remain a secret until he gets complete patent protection. His name, incidentally, is Max Fleischer, which means Recognition after another Chapter.

Works Two Years
 For two years Fleischer, who is somewhat of an electrical scientist, and what-not as well as a pioneer of the story cartoon, has been working away on his own third-dimension theory wherein the camera perspective is shortened. Physically, the equipment looks like a lot of metal except into hundreds of small goggles.

Unlike other inventors who claimed they had corralled the movie illusion, this man Fleischer waited until he had tested it out in several cartoons, "Little Dutch Mill," in particular. Now that he is satisfied that it works, Fleischer eagerly reports his process method will show up even better with feature pictures.

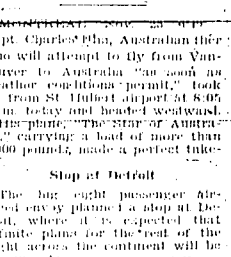

ROYAL MARRIAGE PLANS COMPLETE

Distinguished Guest List for British Wedding Includes 4,000 Names

LONDON (AP)—Plans practically complete for the wedding of the Duke of Kent and Princess Marina of Greece. They became engaged Aug. 28. The wedding, the first royal one held in this country for a century, will be celebrated at Westminster Abbey, with the Prince of Wales, the Duke of Kent's eldest and favorite brother, as best man.

The Archbishop of Canterbury will perform the ceremony, assisted by the Bishop of London, Winchester and Oxford. There will be a state procession, and afterwards the bride and bridegroom will return to Buckingham Palace for the wedding breakfast.

Over 1,000 guests will be invited. They will include many royals. The ex-king and queen of Greece, the ex-king and queen of Spain, and the king and queen of Norway and the king of Denmark are expected.

Princess Marina, following procedure, visited England as the guest of the king and queen in the fall. Their Majesties had met the Princess several times, but she never had visited them before.

The Princess will not return until a few days before the wedding. It is the usual custom to follow. She probably will be the guest of the king and queen at Buckingham Palace, and will drive from there in state to the Abbey.

Not absent from the wedding of the Duke of Albany, fourth son of Queen Victoria, in 1882, was the younger son of the sovereign married a foreign princess.

Home Is Problem.
Finding a home for the royal bride and bridegroom presents considerable difficulties. White Lodge, Richmond Park, the first home of the Duke and Duchess of York, has been suggested. It was there that the two children of Princess Olga of Yugoslavia, Princess Marina's sister, were born. Frogmore, near Windsor Castle, also is a possibility.

It is most probable, however, that with their love of dancing and society, the young couple will set up home in London. In this connection, Marlborough House is mentioned.

It was refurbished and renovated at the Queen's orders for the Prince of Wales, who hoped that he would settle down and take a life there. Work is still being done on a huge building on Pall Mall is well-known, however. He prefers his bachelor quarters in York House, a palace at James' Palace, hitherto shared by the Duke of Kent.

PRINCE WILL GET SALARY INCREASE
Boost of \$75,000 Each Year Will Be State's Present To Duke of Kent

LONDON (AP)—A salary raise of \$75,000 a year will be the state's present to the Duke of Kent when he marries Princess Marina of Greece Nov. 28.

According to law, the Duke's present annual allowance, the civil list, is \$50,000. It is automatically raised to \$125,000 when he marries.

Altogether the state pays the royal family \$2,850,000 every year. The main item of this amount is the \$2,850,000 the king receives. The Duke of York and the Duke of Connaught get \$75,000, the Duke of Gloucester and the Duke of Kent get \$50,000, the Princess Royal \$30,000, and Princess Victoria, Princess Louise, and Princess Beatrice get \$30,000 each.

Not an Exit
The Prince of Wales' income is not included in the civil list. It is over \$1,250,000 a year, and is derived principally from the wealthy Duchy of Cornwall.

The King's income is appropriated as follows: their Majesties' private purse, \$650,000; salaries of the household, \$325,000; expenses of the household, \$1,000,000; \$100,000, and royal bounty, \$25,000. This leaves \$41,000 unappropriated for emergencies. The king augments his private allowance with revenues from the Duchy of Lancaster. These average about \$300,000 annually.

AUTO DEATHS AT 28,400 IN U. S.
HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 23 (AP)—Automobile accidents in the United States for the first 10 months of this year have taken a toll of 28,400 lives and brought a July to 144,000 persons, according to statistics compiled by the Travelers Insurance company.

Increase in fatalities amounts to about 10 per cent over the corresponding period for 1933 and indicates the accident death toll this year may reach 36,000.

WEDDING BOOSTS LONDON'S TRADE

Half Million People Expected to Thrill into City for Royal Nuptials

LONDON (AP)—London is preparing feverishly for the wedding of the Duke of Kent (Prince George) and Princess Marina of Greece, Nov. 28.

More than half a million visitors are expected during the wedding week which starts Nov. 28, and will continue for as much as two weeks.

Millions of dollars will be spent in shops and hotels as a result. London hotels already are putting out the "home" call signs. Some have to accommodate the overflow of the twenty, or more, foreign royal guests who cannot be cared for at Buckingham Palace.

Wedding Party Route
A two-mile route covering the wedding party route, from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey, is undergoing a thorough cleaning. The ornate lamp-posts are being washed and resplendored in silvery gray. Even in the Abbey the dust of ages is being removed from thrones and royal pews.

All along the Mall and other routes by which the bride and groom will travel, huge wooden stands are being erected.

Losses of buildings along the route are making and getting from \$50 to \$200 for standing room in the windows overlooking the route. Other stands are reaping similar fortunes.

Only specially invited guests will be allowed inside the Abbey. There will be about 4,000 of these, including over a hundred newspapermen, members of the government, and a vast array of relatives of both families.

Wedding Extraneous
The railway companies are arranging special cheap "excursion" tickets during "wedding week." There will be gala performances at the theaters, and gala nights at the hotels and restaurants. At night a vast scheme of flood lighting is being prepared.

There is no unemployment in the nuptial trade at the moment. A vast army of sweepers and busily stitching literally hundreds of miles of material for flags and decorations.

The predominant colors are the red, gold and blue of the British royal house, and the blue and white of the Greek royal house.

Never since the wedding of the Duke and Duchess of York, in 1923, will London have had such a free show on such lavish lines.

TEACHER CLEARED

Flood of Charges in Finding Of Babies in Trunk

NEW YORK, Nov. 23 (AP)—RUBY CLARKE, 36-year-old school teacher of Nyack, N. Y., was freed today of all charges in connection with the finding of the bodies of three infants in a trunk she put into storage more than two years ago.

Miss Clarke convinced Magistrate David Hirshfield, upon arraignment today, that she knew nothing about the babies and that her trunk had been filled with her own clothing when she placed it in a Brooklyn warehouse in July, 1932.

Warehouse representatives admitted that some employees might have opened the trunk.

GIFTS POUR IN ON ROYAL PAIR

Dolphins of Presents Flow to Prince George and Bride from Greece

LONDON (AP)—A deluge of wedding gifts is pouring in on the Duke of Kent (Prince George) and his bride-to-be, Princess Marina of Greece.

Gifts are arriving from all parts of the world. Practically every town in Britain intends to make a present, but at the expense of the royal couple, this will, in most cases, take the form of a donation to some needy hospital.

Wedding gifts beyond price eventually became the property of a British princess if she should become the Queen Consort. By her marriage to an heir presumptive a royal bride becomes heir to the famous Koh-i-noor diamond.

Curious Legend
The Koh-i-noor is a curious legend, this diamond is not a part of the regalia, but a personal ornament which descends from queen to queen.

According to the legend, should the Koh-i-noor ever be worn by a British king, India will be lost to the Empire. For this reason, Queen Victoria, who first received it, arranged that the gem should be handed down from the consort of each reigning monarch to the next queen.

LONDON (AP)—Princess Marina of Greece chose for her wedding gown nearly two months before her marriage to the Duke of Kent, Nov. 28.

Paris is making the gown, but she selected a British firm to create it.

Captain Molynous, said to be the only British dress designer in Paris, was entrusted with the task of making a gown.

The gown is to be of silver lame with an English rose woven through the design. It will be an ankle-length dress with a train length in an otherwise modest. It will have long, and rather full, sleeves, a break from the present high-cutting fashion.

The gown, measuring about six yards, also will be of silver lame, lined with the same material, and woven in Lyons, France. Matching shoes will complete the ensemble.

Princess Marina will wear the veil of antique lace which belongs to her family, and which was worn by her mother, Princess Nicholas of Greece, and her sister, Princess Olga, at their wedding. A diamond tiara will crown her head.

Hunt Stone
LEITHBRIDGE, Ont. (AP)—Indiana has announced a new search for a myrtle stone which might be a battle near here long ago.

As Indians and Greeks were battling the Bluefoot, Blacks and Polynesians with the latter getting the worst of the fight when a large pinkish stone suddenly appeared from the rocks. From that moment the Bluefoot and their allies gained the upper hand. It was made a shrine. In time, the stone was covered with earth and its story almost forgotten. Local historians and Indians are planning to unearth and mark the old-time shrine.

ROYAL WEDDING DETAILS ISSUED

Route from Palace to Abbey Changed to Permit Visit Through to Watch

LONDON (AP)—Preliminary official details of the wedding of the Duke of Kent and Princess Marina of Greece, have been issued.

They reveal that at the expense of King George, the usual route from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey has been considerably extended so that as many people as possible may see the procession.

The route from Buckingham Palace and St. James' Palace will be through the Mall, the Horse Guards' Parade, Whitehall, and Parliament Street. The same route will be traversed on the return, except that the bride and groom will leave the Mall and proceed through St. James' street, Piccadilly, Hyde

Park Corner, and Constitution Hill, to Buckingham Palace. Arrangements for the wedding follow almost exactly those for the wedding of the Duke of York and Lady Elizabeth Bowen-Lyon, in 1923.

It is expected that there will be three processions: firstly, the King and Queen in full state from Buckingham Palace; secondly, the bride and her parents, who will be met at Buckingham Palace by guests of the King and Queen; and thirdly, the Duke of Kent, from York House, St. James' Palace, with probably, the Prince of Wales.

PROBERS DEPART FOR ISLAND QUIZ

Party Sails from Los Angeles To Investigate Mysterious Castaway Deaths

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 23 (AP).—A party of 10 scientists and their assistants will depart today for an expedition to solve not only the mysterious deaths of castaways but also surrounding the death of two castaways on a lonely island in the south Pacific.

The expedition was under the command of Capt. G. Allan Hancock, a Los Angeles resident, who is not a direct cause for the deaths of the two bodies were found last week by a passing tourist.

Sperdy Center

Before leaving in his specially powered cutter Valera III, Hancock hopes to reach the island within 10 days. There he will attempt to ascertain if the castaways were Alfred Lorenz, an inventor, and a New Zealand yachting captain, named Nigger, who were left on the island by the time, after it had sailed by the way to port of San Francisco, the party will proceed to Charles Island, across the equator, in an effort to unravel the entire mystery that envelops the life of the castaways.

The expedition will be supported by the University of California, the south Pacific college, Lorenz, an inhabitant, was believed to have fled out for another island with Nigger, when they were beached on Matsua, near to the island of Atafu and Taha'a.

Will Trace "Empress"

Hancock will attempt to verify information that the "Empress" had been captured by the Austrian, a schooner, which he called "Empress" of the colony, left Charles Island for the South Sea last summer with Robert Phillipson after capturing Lorenz and Nigger.

Officially the cruise was chartered in the interest of discovering strange microscopic parasites that live in the gills of certain tropical fish. Dr. Walter L. Schmidt, of the Smithsonian Institution, who heads the staff of scientists, said they hoped also to capture a Gorgonian porcupine off the coast of Columbia. The power engine was equipped with storage facilities for large mammals they expect to seize at sea.

The expedition will return in about three months.

The company is charged with violating the Clayton anti-trust act through sale of \$100,340,484 worth of tires to Sears at alleged discriminatory prices, thus allegedly tending to restrain trade and create a monopoly.

Defense attorneys sought to show that Sears' competition with independent dealers has been diminishing since 1922, while major oil companies became a "more serious" factor in the tire market in 1933.
