



SAVANTS MAKING GOLTER ADVANCE

Experiments at Cleveland May Eliminate Necessity for Operations

CLEVELAND, Nov. 23 (UPI) — Operations for enlarged prostate gland and goiter may soon be things of the past if the promise contained in researches now under way at Cleveland Clinic materializes.

The new researches, which represent work of Dr. D. R. McCullough, Dr. Eugene Cutuly and Dr. Benjamin Blumlein, were revealed at the close of the three day session of the National Academy of Sciences. Work carried on with much justified optimism, experts said, and greatest care under carefully controlled conditions are planned.

The work which may lead to elimination of the operation for goiter began in the clinic where Dr. George Crile and his associates have performed thousands of such operations.

Plod New Hormone

Dr. McCullough and his aides have discovered a new hormone, as the chemical substance manufactured by the ductless glands are called.

This hormone, manufactured by the male sex gland, is called "inhibit."

Purpose of this hormone, the scientists found, seems to be to slow up action of the pituitary gland. This, in turn, seems to have an effect upon both the thyroid (golter) and the prostate gland.

Experiments with rats have demonstrated that inhibit will greatly decrease the size of the prostate gland in rats. When inhibit was given in rat-sized laboratory conditions which otherwise would have led to development of enlarged prostate, it had the effect of preventing the enlargement.

Blocked Sex Cycle

Inhibit also depressed the pituitary gland of female rats with the result that there was an interference with the sexual cycle," Dr. McCullough said.

"Having successfully completed these extensive laboratory researches, it is our hope that this substance may be of considerable therapeutic value in treatment of enlarged prostate," it had the effect of preventing the enlargement.

Probably Won't Happen Again For 30 Years Weather Experts Say

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (UPI) — Last summer's drought in nothing to worry about, climatologically speaking, the weather bureau reported today. They probably won't be another dry spell like it for 30 or 40 years, the bureau indicated.

The climate really hasn't changed much for years, W. B. Gregg, chief of the bureau, wrote Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace in his annual report.

He said that while rainfall has shown a "decided tendency" to be lighter in the north, thin condition has been counterbalanced by heavy rain in the south.

CASTLEFORD LIGHT "TIPPLER" DRIVING MENACE

Even Moderate Drinker Called Dangerous To Traffic On Highways

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Even the moderate drinker is a menace on the highways according to Dr. Evert Kendig of the school of pharmacy of Temple university.

Dr. Kendig offers scientific proof that his contention is right. "Laboratory experiments show," Dr. Kendig asserts, "that from the time the eye begins to record an object until the impulse is transferred to the brain and thence to the nerves and muscles, such as applying the brakes, or turning an automobile— one-fifth of a second, under normal conditions, has elapsed."

A drink of liquor or beer according to Dr. Kendig will increase the lag of time, "which means the driver who has had a drink is much more likely to have the brief time required to affect the reaction."

- Never read in glare or in your own shadow. Have all lamp globes shaded. For portables, a shade which is light in color, wide in spread, and open at top.
- Make an inspection of your lighting fixtures and bring them up to date. This means eye conservators now—eyesight protection later.
- See if you have sufficient floor and table lamps for proper illumination, and if they are properly placed.
- Make certain that the paint and wallpaper in your rooms are in colors that reflect light—not ones that absorb the light.
- Have the eyes of every member of your family examined by a competent eye specialist at regular intervals.


