## CREW—HEROISM AVERTS TRAGEDY IN SHIP WRECK

Ward Line's Officers Declare  
All Passengers Safe in  
Reef Pile-Up

TO ATTEMPT REFLOATING

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 7.—Thirty-eight passengers from the wrecked Ward liner, Havana, were rescued here today. The kind of remarkable heroism by the Havana's crew, many of whom were aboard the ill-fated Moore Castle, after the New York-Havana liner pulled up on Manzanilla shoals, 60 miles east of Fort Pierce, Fla., threatening another ship disaster. One passenger and one member of the crew remained unaccounted for, but Ward-line officials indicated that all passengers and all crew were safe.

Eleven passengers were aboard the United Fruit liner Peter when it was wrecked at Havana. The survivors, however, were picked up from Hebeon by the Moran, Richard E. O'Connell.

Crew Praised  
Fifty of the 124 members of the Havana's crew were members of the crew of the Moore Castle, also a Ward liner, which burned off the New Jersey coast with a loss of 124 lives. The crew of the Moore Castle was accused of cowardice by many passengers, but the crew of the Havana received high praise for its conduct.

Seaman Steve Paustica, in charge of one of the lifeboats, kept the raft single-handed. In a hour after it had been swept by a huge wave, he was rescued by the New York, a passenger, said he planned to ask a Carnegie medal for Paustica.

Mother Is Hero  
But the greatest act of heroism was done by the mother of the crew, Mrs. S. J. London, of Mexico City, and her two children. Mrs. London and her two children were swept out of a lifeboat by a wave, too far from rescue.

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## Offers Budget ROOSEVELT ASKS FOUR BILLION TO AID WORK-RELIEF

Budget Highlights  
In Message Today

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Major provisions of the 1935 budget and recommendations of the President in transmitting it to Congress.

1.—I recommend that \$4,000,000,000 be appropriated by the Congress in one sum, subject to allocation by the executive principally for giving work for those unemployed on the relief rolls.

2.—National defense outlay for fiscal year 1935, beginning July 1, 1935, is jumped to approximately \$300,000,000, an increase of \$150,000,000 over the current year and \$120,000,000 over the 1934 fiscal year.

3.—President recommended continuation of three-cent postage rate and extension of "nuisance" taxes which would expire June 30, but said "I do not consider it advisable at this time to propose any new or additional taxes for the fiscal year of 1935."

4.—It is evident that we have not yet reached a point at which a complete balance of the budget can be obtained. I am, therefore, submitting to the Congress a budget which for the fiscal year 1935 balances, except for expenditures for work relief to the unemployed. Such deficit as occurs will be due to the unemployment. It is expected to decline as rapidly as private industry is able to reemploy those who go out without work.

5.—Congress is asked to authorize use of about \$900,000,000 of unexpended balances to provide direct relief beginning February and continuing until new work can be started.

6.—The broad obligation of the Government to use all proper efforts to prevent destitution can be maintained under the present law, and the excellent credit of the Government will be maintained for the coming year.

7.—Budget provides for restoring government salaries to 100 per cent July 1, 1935, at a cost of \$400,000,000. Contemplated number of federal employees during 1935 fiscal year will be 820,000, compared with 927,230 this year; and total salaries \$1,130,000,000 against \$1,160,174,519.

8.—FURTHER GOVERNMENT DEBT OF \$1,250,000,000 FOR FISCAL YEAR 1935. This would increase national debt to \$31,250,000,000.

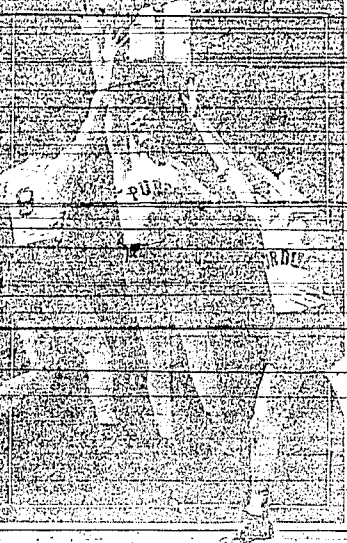

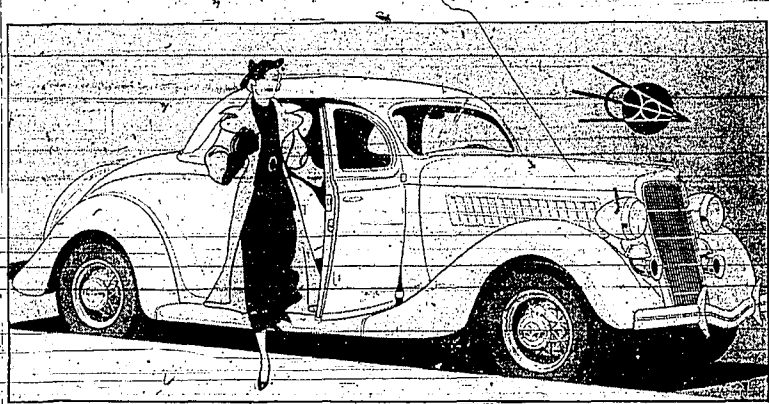
