### ADMINISTRATION FORCES PREDICT 7,000,000 JOBS

New Dealers Hope Roosevelt  
4-Billion Program Will  
Boost Employment

WALL STREET, Jan. 8.—New Dealers are hopeful that  
President Roosevelt's \$1,000,000,000 recovery and relief program will bring about employment for at least 7,000,000 individuals this year.

That appears to be the minimum estimate of the public works plan if it operates in practice as well as it looks on paper. The employment aggregate would be as follows:

1. 3,000,000 persons shifted from the dole to public works.

2. From 3,600,000 re-employed privately. (Tentative estimate.)

Great concern

Of greatest concern is this unanticipated proposal is based on the assumption that many may not be able to absorb the 1,500,000 dole recipients who are to be withdrawn from federal relief rolls. This is due to the fiscal anxiety over government's

ability to provide work for 3,000,000 or so unemployed persons now receiving relief.

Mr. Roosevelt's two measures to the 74th congress avoided any estimate of the number of employed persons that could be absorbed. He estimated, merely, that 4,000,000 persons had been re-employed since he came to power last May.

The American Federation of Labor estimated in excess of 11,000,000 persons were employed. If administration hopes are realized this number will be reduced by the end of this year to 4,000,000 or less.

April 1 is the deadline for the start of federal public works under the new program. Some 200,000 men are to be given storm clearance, grade crossing elimination, highway building, rural electrification and related projects which are destined to be generally under way.

### SURPRISE MOVES ADD TO CASE FOR STATE

### Identifications Come As Surprises at Flemington

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 8 (UPI)—John Lindbergh, who today took his son, Bruno, to meet Hauptmann with the kidnapping and murder of the Lindbergh baby.

Marius Högberg, 87-year-old peasant, returned yesterday from Hopewell, placed his hand on Hauptmann's knee and swore he saw him near the Lindbergh home.

Joseph Perrone, a New York lawyer, who had been a close friend of Hauptmann, and the man who gave him a note to deliver to Dr. John F. Condon, intermediary in the negotiations with the kidnappers, also arrived on the day of the kidnapping.

Three identifications  
Three persons have now identified Hauptmann as being implicated in the kidnapping.

Col. Charles A. Lindbergh already has testified that Hauptmann's voice is the one he heard in the "Lindbergh" general call, "Hey, Doctor," to Condon. Lindbergh said he believed Hauptmann and Perrone came as surprising surprises, and defense counsel vigorously attacked the New Jersey state police.

Charles Stronger

As compared to evidence previously disclosed in the Hauptmann case by New York and by police investigators, the state's case now seemed much stronger than could have been expected.

"Is that man here in court?" asked Attorney General David W. Dickey.



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


