RANSOM TRACING LOOMS AS VITAL HAUPTMANN LINK

Records Show Carpenter Had Plenty of Money After April 1932

BY JANE DIXON FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 14 (AP)—What became of the \$50,000 ransom money handed by Dr. John P. "Jafar" Condon over the fence of Dr. Raymond's secretary to a mysterious John "Who" had come to Colonel Lindbergh the sleeping child, his baby, as a "stealing of good faith"?

Some fourteen odd-thousand dollars—the ransom—was found hidden in the garage of an unemployed German—a carpenter, Bruno Hauptmann.

Hauptmann was spending three dollars for such luxuries as hunting trips in the Maine woods. The prosecution says it will trace the expenditure of Hauptmann from the night of the ransom payment to the present day, and the sum of their calculations will total within \$100,000.

The German word version, it develops, has not failed the mission to pursue his desire since April, 1932.

After coming to the United States Hauptmann worked at his trade of carpentry and made fairs.

His wife's Next-Egg He had accumulated his money and piled up the nest-egg which enabled him to live through the winter of 1932-33, and even to "enter the stock market as a trader."

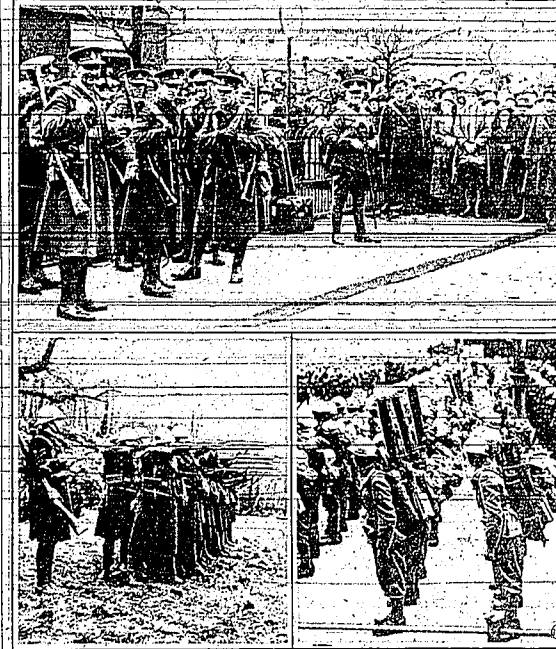

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Senate Approves Delinquent Tax Relief Measure

Rass Signature Tonight Will Convert Bill into Idaho Law

Upper Chamber's Opposition to Program Collapses at Session Today

BOISE, Jan. 14 (AP)—The Senate has passed H. B. 2, thereby giving it effect to the measure which will relieve delinquent taxpayers.

Prayers of the opposition in the morning session today automatically gave the president permission to sign the bill and return it to the house.

Moratorium Provisions

House Bill No. 2, covering \$18,000,000 in delinquencies has the following provisions:

Will cancel all penalties and interest for taxes during the years 1928 to 1933.

Each six months there after you must pay at least 10 per cent of the total with interest due.

Delinquency entry will be made if any two semi-annual installments are not paid and property will be sold to pay the balance.

Property taken by deed prior to 1928, shall be deemed any time up to July 1, 1933 by payment of all delinquent taxes, penalties and interest.

Payment of the entire amount of plus interest to the end of the month, can be made at any time.

Any time before the fourth Monday of next June a full year's tax for any year in the moratorium may be paid without interest.

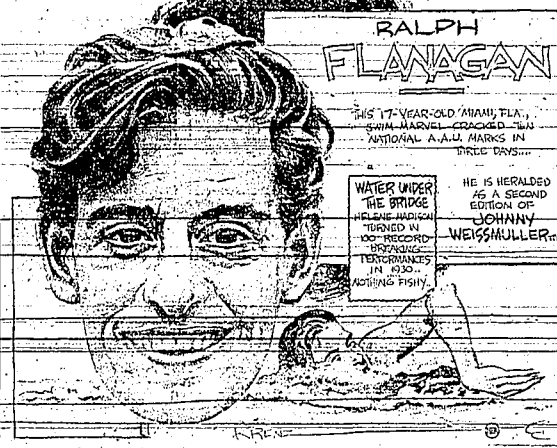

There are but two new incumbents in county elective office. One of these, Edward Bahrman, steps into his first term as county clerk, and the other, L. A.
