PAROLED CONVICT BLAMED IN BOLD PRISON DELIVERY

Helper Outside, Walls Torn - Ringleader in Startling San Quentin Break

TRIO RETAKEN, ONE SLAIN

Warden in Serious Condition - Today After Stugging Fractures Skull

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Cal.

Jan. 17 (AP)—A paroled convict anxious to help his friends still within the gray walls of San Quentin prison plotted the most amazing jailbreak in California prison history, officials charged today. The story of the delivery was pieced together from fragments of news writing from three convicts recaptured after two hours of freedom, and fatally wounded a fourth member of the ruffian band.

Two "Hagglers"

The stolen names Clyde Stevens, 28, a paroled convict and Rudolph Straight, 31, the dead convict, are the brains of the plan. Stevens, who was in the prison for a year, was found hiding in a river bank early today, slipping four revolvers into a prison on a sack of flour, the confessions said.

Hidden under the cover of the truck, the weapons were in and out of the prison for several days before the plotters had a chance to remove them and carry them into the prison carpenter shop. There two of the guns were placed in a box of nails and the other two were hidden under a hand saw to await the day the state board of prison lets the paroled convict out of the prison.

Planned Capture

The plan was to have James B. Holohan, warden, and Frank C. Sykes, president of the board, and other men in the prison, force their way from the prison. Memorial to Congress Urges Immediate Passage for New Legislation

PROTESTS: HAY EMBARGO

Document Will Ask 24 States to Abandon Barriers on Cem State Fee

BOISE, Jan. 17 (AP)—The consent of the senate today stamped approval on a bill to urge congress to take immediate passage of an old age pension measure.

The senators also approved, under suspended rules, a memorial to congress for the removal of 23 states asking that the hay ban covering Idaho alfalfa be lifted.

The memorial was introduced in the senate and passed with suspension of the rules. It is identical with the hay memorial introduced in the house.

The memorial is directed to the United States secretary of agriculture.

Offers Reasons

The memorial presents several reasons why the hay should be lifted against Idaho alfalfa. It states that the introduction of certain parasites, the alfalfa weevil, the alfalfa moth, and the alfalfa fly, have done much damage to the alfalfa crop.

More than 50,000 tons of surplus alfalfa are being produced in Idaho each year, but there is no market. Lowering of Canadian tariff would open a market for the alfalfa.

The old age pension memorial was returned to the house and now awaits action.



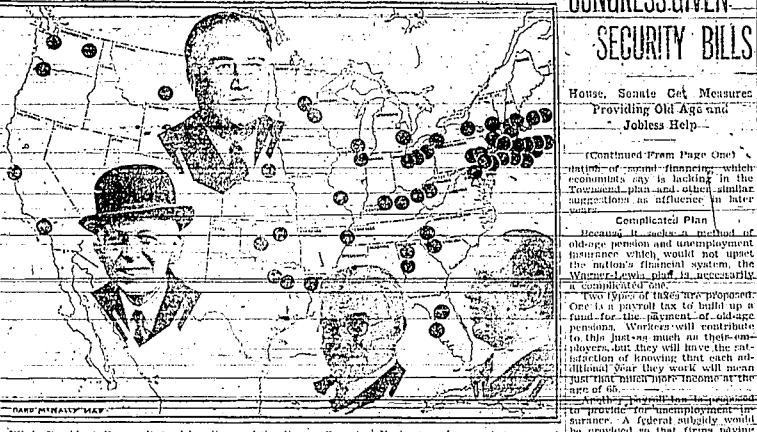

Detective Head Says Criminal Frightened by Spotlight—On Movie Group

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The greatest ally of Hollywood police in protecting film stars from criminals is publicity.

There are other reasons why stars prove difficult for criminals, but this is the most formidable one, according to Capt. Tom Carman, head of the Hollywood detective bureau, who has been guarding the cinema center's peace for the past six years.

"Criminals think twice before they plot against a man like Bing Crosby," for example, Captain Carman said. "I don't mean to say that Bing Crosby is immune to criminality. No one is. But if a gang has two persons in mind as prospective victims, one of them a screen star and the other a comparatively unknown citizen, the gang will select the second man."
