FOR HUMANITY'S SAKE

The significant message of President Roosevelt to the Congress and to the American people is evident for it is another step in the progress of the New Deal of inestimable importance to the present and future generations.

The President visualized legislation which will hasten economic security through unemployment compensation, old age benefits, federal aid to dependent children and additional federal aid to state and local public health agencies.

Outstanding is the statement on the part of the chief executive that the amount necessary to initiate these benefits is approximately one hundred billion dollars and that the plans safeguard the national welfare.

Furthermore, the President has not merely theoreticized the need, he has taken to bring about the benefits and effects of his plan. It is important that the federal government proceed speedily. He pointed out that since the programs would have to be shared by states, and that the legislatures of most commonwealths are meeting or will meet soon, congressional action must be taken promptly.

Proof of the desire to speed the legislation is seen in the immediate introduction of bills in congress yesterday.

That is the kind of action which the people have come to expect from the present administration.

What remains now is for the states to cooperate fully in the preparation of cooperative legislation, for this is equally important as the initiation of the program by the federal government.

Thus the country moves into the second phase of the recovery program, with a definite course charted and a future which not only provides security but makes for confidence, happiness and human welfare.

CLOSED DOWN IS UNWELCOME

Closing down of IDRA activities here yesterday demonstrated the hardship which he created were there no such emergency program prepared to provide work and jobs for the unemployed.

There is no minimizing the effect of the surprise order which could not have been made if there was any way to avoid it. That is why the action may cause no little misapprehension, which must be dissipated at the earliest possible moment.

WE GROW OLDER

Some of the influences that are affecting the future of the country are plain and on the surface. But some are hidden, and move onward unseen.

One of the latter is this fact: We're getting older, not only as a nation, but as a mass of individuals. A recent report to the Association of Life Insurance Presidents indicates that the present expectation of life in 60 years, that is 15 years or so more than it used to be.

From this President Thomas L. Parkinson, of the Equitable Life Assurance Society, drew this conclusion: "grave consequences involving the relation of the individual to society may follow the transfer of the bulk of visible power from those under 40 to those over 50." This tendency is likely to be reflected in changed attitudes toward spending and saving, and, indeed, toward individualism as distinguished from collectivism."

Already such a change is seen. The wide-spread agitation for the Townsend old age pension plan is certainly the greatest political demonstration of old people in such that the equality has ever seen.


