



## Giant Air Race Plan Announced

Famous Pilots Will Compete In 20,000-Mile Marathon Around Americas

**By LYLE A. BROOKOVER**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (UPI)—The first "giant" air race in history—a 20,000-mile dash around the Americas—had been revealed today.

The racing pilots of the world have been approached by a group of aviation enthusiasts headed by Elliott Roosevelt, son of the former president, to compete in the race, and many have indicated their intention to compete.

The group—headed by negotiating committee, which includes a leading automobile manufacturer, to secure "sponsorships," prizes averaging \$100,000 or more, are expected.

### 100 Flying Hours

Veteran racing pilots predicted that the race, involving stops along the shores of North, Central and South America would be covered in 100 flying hours—an average of about 200 miles per hour.

The race it was expected, would provide a grueling test for modern airplanes and the skill of the racing pilots. Many kinds of flying conditions would be encountered.

### Over Andes

Leaving Buenos Aires the planes would hug the Andes mountains to the coast, then follow the Pacific commercial air line. They would then head back north, following the west coast of South and Central America.

The flight would continue to Seattle and Vancouver, then down the home stretch through Canada. Elapsed time probably would be about one week, with four days spent in the air.

Land planes of unrestricted types would be used. Cooperation of the Pan-American Air Routes and various government departments along the route will be invaluable. The National American Association and the International Chamber of Commerce, in both of which young Roosevelt is an official, will give active support to the race.

### Airways Mapped

Eugenio Vidal, commercial department manager of the Pan-American Airways, said the air routes would have the advantage of mapped, and lighted airports with radio beacons to Miami, and the finish would be at Rio de Janeiro, Montevideo, and Buenos Aires.

### Flight Details

The route, aviation experts said, would be much less dangerous than the 1933 route, which had 20 entrants. The 1933 flight, in which only nine of the 20 entrants finished, took 100 hours, while the 1934 flight is expected to take 100 hours.


