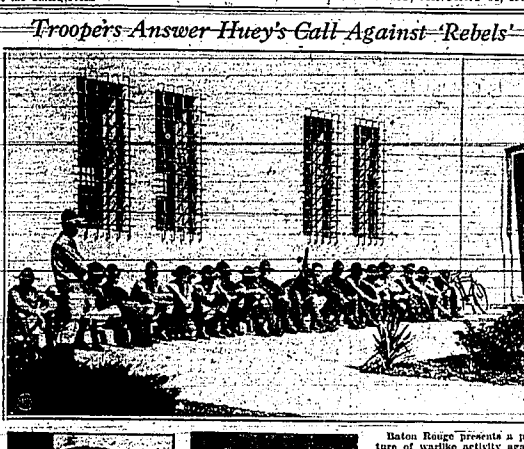

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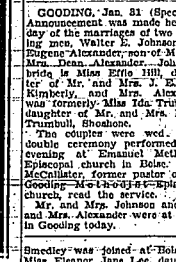

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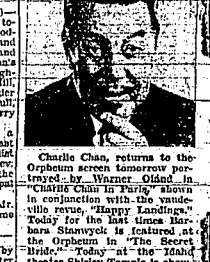

# CHICAGO BATTLE TONIGHT PICKS ROSS CHALLENGER

## YOUTHFUL COMET FIGHTS VETERAN

Rodak, Despite Great Record, On Short End of Betting Against Cannonier

CHICAGO, Jan. 31 (UP)—Two fighters are going and the other coming—reach the pugilistic arena simultaneously tonight in the Chicago stadium.

Younger of the two is the veteran of three titles and veteran of 27 fights, Leo Rodak, 21, Chicago's newest title comet, who has won 21 straight matches and never known defeat in 18 months of professional boxing.

His challenger, Cannonier, a crowd of 16,000 is expected to see him in his 10th round, a 16-round bout at 137½ pounds, which seems likely to produce the most exciting fight of the night. Cannonier rules an 8-8 betting favorite.

With two fives left by Ross back in the ring against him to force the lightweight champion to give him another bout before the summer, Cannonier is expected to fight for Cannonier may mean retirement for one of the greatest title fighters of the past.

Nearing Twilight  
Despite Cannonier's great comeback since he lost his title to Ross, the little Italian battler is making the twilight of his career. He won recognition as feather-weight champion when Rodak was only 13. Rodak still was in the amateurs when Cannonier lost the lightweight and junior welterweight titles to Ross.

Rodak remains a question-mark despite his perfect professional record. His outstanding victories were over Patsy Hayes, Tommy Fenech, Paul De Fennech and George Hanford, all featherweights. As an amateur, Rodak, who is of Italian descent, proved his stamina and courage by winning the 1927 world lightweight championship and featherweight, in as many years as a left never accomplished by any other Golden Glove amateur.

Good Straight Left  
A good straight left is Rodak's best weapon. Cannonier has been known as a fighter for a straight left. That's how Ross beat him. Cannonier's smelly left foot has caused him to resolve to hit Cannonier. In many previous bouts Cannonier has been known for his flailing punch when called on for his best. He won the lightweight title by knocking out Jimmy Braddock. He defended it by stopping Jack and Billy Braddock.

# ROOSEVELT ASKS CENTRAL AGENCY

### Seeks General Transportation Control; Rejects Separate Aviation Commission

(Continued From Page One) of reports to congress on problems of all forms of transportation. Coordinator Joseph B. Eastman says this week advised congress of railroad and highway problems, urging much more stringent federal regulation and creation of a centralized transport authority.

Mr. Roosevelt suggested that the congress consider these various reports together. He said it is necessary for the development of integrated planning of our national transportation system. Mr. Roosevelt wrote:

**Will Ask Legislation**  
At a later date I shall ask the congress for general legislation centralizing the supervision of air and water and highway transportation with adjustments of our present methods of organization as a matter of national responsibility.

Indicating he believed the permanent body should be built around the T. O. C., the president said that the committee should be for the administration of executive functions by those administrative departments or agencies which have functioned satisfactorily in the past.

# BAILEY AWARDED COURT VICTORY

### Producer, Dealer Given \$1,600 In Damage Case Against Blacktin Firm

Judgment for Thayer E. Bailey, plaintiff, in his suit for damages from the "Blacktin" company of Twin Falls, in the amount of \$1,600, has been awarded today by a jury in district court following trial which consumed three days before Judge Adam B. Barclay. Damages were sought by Bailey, a produce dealer, on grounds that the defendant company had failed to make delivery of contracted potato bags during the fall of 1933, and that he thereby suffered loss of profits. It was the second trial of the case, a jury having awarded Bailey a judgment for \$750 in March, after which a new trial was granted.

The case went to the jury late yesterday afternoon and a unanimous verdict was rendered at 8:40 p. m. awarding \$1,600 to Bailey, who was represented by the law firm of Chapman & Chapman.

# Board Report Offers Program For Civil, Military Aviation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—Creation of a super joint-civil-military aviation commission, with power to control and supervise development of the nation's aviation transportation system was recommended today by the federal aviation commission.

The report, containing more than 100 recommendations for improving and correcting the entire aviation industry, both military and civilian, the commission, headed by Clark Howell, Atlanta publisher, urged:

**Centralized Control**  
1. That the post office department pay normal salaries to lines only on the basis of mail actually carried to prevent a deficit.

**Emergency Legislation**  
2. Emergency legislation empowering the post office department to revise existing air mail rates upward or downward in multiple cases.

**Emergency Postponement**  
3. Emergency postponement from March 1, 1935 until Jan. 1, 1937, of expiration of the air mail act regarding designation of primary and secondary routes so that the transportation commission "carry on" until there has been some application of a permanent policy.

**Trans-oceanic Flying**  
4. Development of flying boat and dirigible service for trans-Pacific and trans-Atlantic flying on a commercial basis. The government should construct a giant dirigible and base for this service and provide airship to replace the 10-year-old Los Angeles.

Speaking of near development of trans-oceanic flying, the report said: "America should participate in such services with flying boats and rigid airships. "Flying boat service would be developed along the same lines as domestic air transport, with direct financial aid as necessary allocated to the operation by the proposed civil commerce commission.

**Airship Service**  
"Airship service would be provided through construction by the government of a large airship and suitable base with provisions made for its maintenance and operation."

The new commerce commission, the report said, should have full power to issue operating certificates to air transport companies, control schedules, working conditions, subsidies, and supervise financial structures and relations of companies.

**National Defense**  
"Regarding national defense, the commission believes we are rapidly advancing and war-time navy policies should be revised from time to time to meet the changes."

The commission asserted that it felt "grave concern" over the apparent lack of adequate agencies of co-ordination between the army and navy.

As a result, the commission recommended the creation of a military organization and inter-service relationship be "made the subject of an extended examination by some appropriate agency in the near future."

**Lack of Co-ordination**  
"Though we appreciate efforts now made for co-ordination," it felt, "grave concern" was left with the feeling that the present degree of mutual understanding between the army and navy is less than might be desired. . . . and that the arrangements for joint operations in the field notified of their respective responsibilities in joint operations "are strikingly inadequate."

The commission asserted that the criticism, however, of alleged inefficiency of the navy, while flying the air mail in 1934, was "exaggerated in all respects" and most of it "unjustified."

In praising the military pilots, the commission asserted that the criticism was "essentially similar" to complaints by other aircraft producing countries.

Future military aircraft development, the commission said, should be aimed to hasten progress through promotion of Diesel engines and military engines of 1,200 h. p. or more.

As a result of recent changes in methods of purchasing military equipment, great confusion has arisen, the report said. It added:
