POPE BILL ASKS AID FOR MINERS

Measure Urging U. S. Bureau
To Locate on Claims Is
Entered in Senate

By RALPH W. OLNEY, STADT,
WASHINGTON.—(Special)—In
the legislative hopper, other-
wise known as the file of the sen-
ate, is a bill introduced by Pope's
mining ruler Bill. Consider-
ably broadened since first an-
nounced, it provides for surveys of
mineral resources wherever neces-
sary.

Bureau of mines director, Idaho
Rep. John W. Cunningham, filed, will
have authority to locate on
public lands which have been
occupied on the public do-
main or on privately owned claims
under the "control" of the owners.
The bill also authorizes the bureau
privately owned claims will prob-
