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China Banks Pool Silver Under Crisis

The two banks which closed their doors were the first members of the Shanghai Native Banks association to fail.

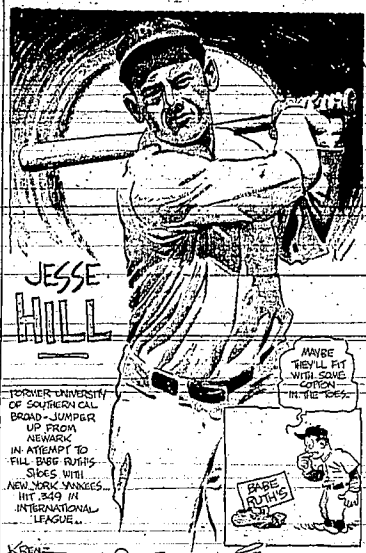

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CANZONERI WINS

IN RODAK MATCH

Former Champion Takes Wide Margin in Bopping Young Chicago Fighter

CHICAGO, Feb. 1 (AP)—Tony Canzoneri of New York and New Orleans, former featherweight lightweight and junior welterweight champion, today blasted 19-year-old Rodak in the Chicago stadium last night before the biggest boxing crowd of the year since 1927.

Canzoneri's victory probably will enable him to get another crack at Barney Ross, lightweight title holder, who he defeated in June, 1933, but competent ring critics believe it will be folly for him to get in the ring again with Ross.

ENEMIES PONDER UPSET FOR HUEY

Means of Disposing of State
Dictator Looms Improbable,
Foes Discover

By HAROLD H. TURNER
NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 31.—(U.P.)—Ways and means of disposing of Huey Long are a current subject of speculation by his enemies in the state of Louisiana.

It has become a contest, grim at times and open baffle at others, as state parliamentarians hold secret caucuses, citizens drill with shotguns, politicians intrigue, newspapers attack, telegrams are dispatched, mass meetings are called, resolutions are passed and a wave of revolution seems or later involves Huey and what to do about him.

Enemies are vocal. That does not mean a majority of the population are plotting for the removal of Long, but his enemies are the most vocal. When the preliminaries are exhausted and the realities admitted, the possible methods of removing Senator Long are generally narrowed down to three:

1. An armed insurrection or rebellion, or possibly a long siege of guerrilla warfare. Something, in any event, involving mass attack.

2. Federal intervention, viewed at present as a remote possibility. 3. Assassination, which is the most now charged was plotted.

The actual term "assassination" is employed rarely. But Long himself made a public charge of the alleged murder plot and now, whether you are talking to taxi drivers, waitresses or prominent citizens, the talk almost invariably turns to whether someone planned to "kill" Long.

Dr. Long's enemies are Long because he believes he is a menace to the state, do not sponsor the homicide solution. They deplore his expressions. The possibility of military defeat is remote. The Long regime probably will be subjected for a long time to a form of civil war, but so long as the kingfish can command a national guard of 2,000 armed men, he will not have difficulty in withstanding any revolutionary, unorganized, uncoordinated movement.
