



ENEMIES PONDER UPSET FOR HUEY

Means of Disposing of State Dictator Loom Improbable, Foes Discover

By HAROLD H. TURNER
NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 31 (AP)—Ways and means of disposing of Huey Long are a current subject of consideration by his enemies in the state of Louisiana.

It has become a contest, from at times and open bouts of either state parliament or local co-cloves, citizens drill with slogans, political intrigues, newspapers attack, telegrams are sent, parades, mass meetings are called, resolutions are passed and conversations sooner or later involve Huey and what to do about him.

Enemies Are Vocal

That does not mean a majority of the population are plotting for the ruination of Long, but his enemies are the most vocal.

When the preliminaries are exhausted and the realities admitted, the possibilities of disposing of Senator Long are generally narrowed down to three:

1. An armed insurrection or rebellion, or possibly a long siege of Shreveport. Something in this nature involving mass attacks.
2. Federal intervention, viewed at present as a remote possibility.
3. Assassination, such as Long now charges was plotted.

The actual term "assassination" is employed rarely. But Long himself made a public charge of the alleged murder plot and now, whether you are talking to taxi drivers, waitresses or prominent citizens, the title almost invariably turns to whether someone planned to or eventually will discharge a lethal weapon at Huey Long.

Deputies Homeless Talk

The more substantial enemies of Long persons who oppose him because they believe he is a menace to the state, do not sponsor the homicide solution. They deplore his expressions.

The possibility of military defeat is remote. The Long regime probably will be subjected for a long time to a form of civil war, but so long as the Kingfish can command a national guard of 2,000 armed men, he will not have difficulty in withstanding the inevitable revolutionary, unorganized
