BOISE, Feb. 6 (UPI)—President M. G. Neale of the University of Idaho was put "on the spot" by the house of representatives today. Forty-five members backed Harrington up.


POPE MARKS ANNIVERSARY

Richberg Action on Code Irks Perkins

Labor Secretary Out "In Cold" During Negotiations

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (UPI)—Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins was again bluntly repudiated yesterday by the administration's chief negotiator in labor-management talks.

Rep. George H. Richberg, recovery co-ordinator, in negotiations with the miners' labor committee, charged that the miners' demands were completely ignored during the negotiations.

Wells and water holes constructed on public camping grounds and on livestock ranges total 518, of which 446 were in Idaho.

Fires fighting took a total of 1,000 acres in the four states. Idaho led with 43,365 man days, and Wyoming was second with 10,000 man days.
