SENATORS AMEND RELIEF BILL TO INCREASE SCALE

'Prevailing Wage' Inserted In
\$4,880,000 Measure By
Committee

NO BOOST IN EARNINGS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The administration's \$4,880,000 work-relief bill was amended today by the senate appropriations committee to provide that "prevailing wages" must be paid on all work done under the measure.

Other changes were made in the bill but it still was a far cry from the "prevailing wage" amendment which was proposed by the American Federation of Labor as a means of preventing an adverse effect on wage rates for private employment which might result from payment of a low subsistence rate on public work.

EXPERT ADVISES TICK PRECAUTION

University Entomologist Urges
Early Steps to Prevent
Spotted Fever

MOSCOW (Special).—The season is approaching when Idaho citizens should take precautions to avoid spotted fever, warns Dr. Claude Wakeland, entomologist for the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station and extension division. Wood ticks carry this dread disease, and with the advent of the first warm spring days they become active in their efforts to spread—and human hosts. Danger lurks on the trail for everyone who travels the brush-covered infested areas of Idaho.

Ticks are widely distributed in the state, according to Dr. Wakeland, and in many localities they carry the spotted fever disease. They are most numerous and dangerous in March, April and May, he adds, but during an early spring protection from them often may be sought as early as February.

Little can be done to prevent contracting spotted fever once a person who has failed to take precautionary measures is bitten. The time to take steps which usually give immunity to the disease is before going into tick-infested country.

"Until recently, we have known no method of preventing spotted fever in humans bitten by infected ticks," Dr. Wakeland explains, "but now it is possible for anyone in tick-infested territory to safeguard himself by being vaccinated beforehand. Through long years of experiment and at the cost of several human lives, the U. S. public health service has perfected a vaccine which establishes complete immunity in most of the milder cases of spotted fever, and a sufficient degree of protection against the violent types of the disease to assure recovery."

"Vaccine is furnished free to physicians and the only charge is the nominal fee of the physician for its administration. It is advisable to be vaccinated each spring for protection by vaccination, rarely lasts more than one year."

"When working in tick country, examine your clothing frequently and remove ticks crawling upon it. Change your clothes as soon as you are in from the field and destroy all ticks you find on your body or apparel. If a tick attaches itself to your skin, simply pull it off and wash the wound with cool water. Do not use the danger of secondary infection. Do not use tick repellents, kerosene or other medicinal oils, and there is practically no danger of infection of tick bite if the above precautions are observed."

Mr. Carver, chief of the administration, detailed an account of title 1 and title 2 of the national housing program. It was his opinion that the program was of sound economic theory and would aid in the general betterment of conditions.

At the present time 91 per cent of the banks are qualified to make loans, either for rebuilding or remodeling, and for new home construction, he said. Already 25,000 loans have been made aggregating more than \$32,000,000.

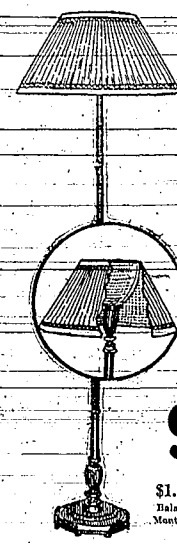

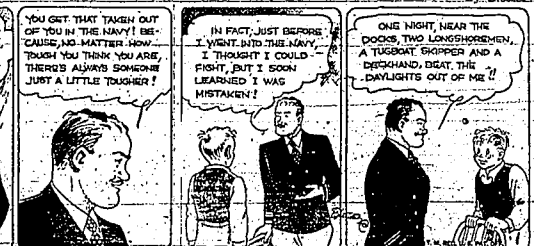
