WAGNER OFFERS LABOR DISPUTES BILL IN SENATE

Rescues Seeks Recovery Help
Improving Relations of Labor and Capital

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—A new labor disputes bill was introduced in congress today by Senator Robert F. Wagner, D. N. Y. It is an enactment which "stabilizes and improves business by laying the foundations of the industry and labor relations which permanent peace and stability can be maintained."

The measure does not have an administration support. It is a bill which would give the federal government the power to mediate in labor disputes. Wagner told the senate the temporary labor relations board set up during the recent strike, but which has not yet been reauthorized, is unable to enforce its decisions. He proposed to make the board permanent, with unquestionable powers to settle labor disputes.



PILOT EXPLAINS DEATH OF GIRLS

Asserts Sisters Jumped from Plane as Ship Frenzied—Thunderstorm

LONDON, Feb. 21 (AP)—Pilot Horton made the following statement here today to investigators probing the mid-air collision last night of the British airliner, the *Empress of Britain*, and the American *Waco*, which resulted in the death from the plane piloted by Horton.

The girls were dependent over death of two British aviator friends in a crash in Sicily last week.

The pilot said:

"In 'Bumpy' Air. The girls were jumped during the time I was climbing at about 85 miles an hour through heavy fog because if it had happened while I was flying in calmer air, I probably would have felt it in my controls."

"After emerging from a thunderstorm—over the channel—I opened the cabin door, which had been closed because the girls complained that the storm was over, they were gone."

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WOMAN DIRECTS HEALTH SERVICE

Josephine Roche, Dynamic and Vivacious, Hopes to Cut Annual Losses

By MARG JOHNSON
(Copyright, 1935, United Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—A dynamic little woman, whose hair is just graying, has abandoned the hard-fought task of saving \$2,000,000 annually in wages lost through illness and preventing needless deaths of 250,000 persons yearly.

She is Miss Josephine Roche, who came out of the West to become the first assistant secretary of treasury and the second woman in a "big job" in the city. The chief was Isabel Walter Whitehall, of California, assistant attorney general in the Housing Council and an administrative officer. Miss Roche is 45, vivacious and speaks with a western twang. Her office is in blue.

Colwyn Wiste
Miss Roche told the United Press: "We must do something to stop this colossal economic and human waste."

President Roosevelt's plan for lack of supervising the public health service and the welfare of the treasury's 50,000 employees. Before she was president and general manager of the Rocky Mountain Fuel Co., Colorado, she had a job to do. "I'm new to my job to talk, I am observing and studying. Later I will speak."

Annual Program
She has before congress as part of the New Deal's security bill, a proposal to spend \$10,000,000 every year in a cooperative program between federal, state and local governments to wipe out preventable diseases and reduce high mortality rates.

Miss Roche inherited her father's interest in the health care of the party and purchased the controlling interest when opposition sprang up to her views. She understood the company and was the miners' support.

"Of course," she added, "my business experience will be tremendously valuable in meeting this public health problem. The things that I have done and public health is my goal, just now, I will fight for it."

Principles Endorsed
When I offered my ideas on the security bill before the house ways and means committee, there was a unanimity of endorsement of my principles.

Under Miss Roche's plan, \$8,000,000 of the \$10,000,000 would be allotted by the public health service annually to states for training personnel, and to assist in the maintenance of health, health programs.

The remainder would go for such research work as stress pollution, sewage, waste disposal, malaria, tuberculosis, cancer, various fevers and infantile paralysis.

Miss Roche estimates that not less than \$120,000,000 is necessary for public health work.

Not Enough
"Research," Miss Roche said, "is the result of a decline in the general health but this is far from the whole picture."

In 1933, there were 1,342,073 deaths, approximately 250,000 from preventable causes, and \$2,400,000,000 was lost in pay checks through illness.

The investigation showed that illness suffered greater from economic losses during the depression also had a 60 per cent higher illness rate than those whose economic status was not reduced.

The first public health county health unit was established 20 years ago. Today, there are fewer than 600 counties with full-time health service, while 2,000 counties, embracing 70 per cent of our total rural population, are without adequate service, Miss Roche said.


Dedication Held for Gooding Parsonage

Someone in Annapolis, however, became skeptical of the painting and it never was mounted at the academy. An investigation which it is said is now being conducted by the admirals.
