TAX BILLS OFFERED
BOISE, Feb. 21 (UP)—Tax measures rained upon the house of representatives Thursday with the introduction of the "piggy" bill and the intangible property tax measure of Attorney General Bert H. Miller.

The house has already been presented with part of the administration measures, including the sales, slot machines and tobacco tax bills.

Chairman of the administration committee will introduce the bill and the intangible property tax measure.

The "piggy" bill proposes to raise revenue by imposing a tax upon the privilege of doing business in the state. It calls for an appropriation of \$25,000 to put it in effect.

WHEAT FREIGHT RATES SLASHED

Idaho Shippers to Drouth States Included in New Reduction Order

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—The interstate commerce commission has authorized freight rate reductions, effective immediately, which the AAA said today would reduce the wheat freight in the Pacific northwest and alleviate seed shortage in four northern drouth states.

Railroads granted a 25 per cent rate reduction "on carloads of cracked or white wheat in sacks or on whole or split wheat to be cracked and sacked in transit, moving from Idaho, Oregon and Washington to California, Nevada, Wyoming and the Dakotas."

The reduced rates apply only to shipments contracted by the North Pacific Emergency Export association or similar non-profit organizations acting under an agreement with the department of agriculture. Membership in the export associations is open to growers and handlers who want to take advantage of the opportunity to move wheat into the designated states for feeding purposes.

The reduced rates are applicable only to shipments leaving by April 30. When the shipments are made for cracking and sacking they must be forwarded not later than May 15. All certificates for reduced rates must be surrendered by May 15.

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MOISTURE GAINS ON UPPER SNAKE

Slight Increase Observed for Past Week, Watermaster's Report Shows

Moisture conditions in the upper Snake river watershed for the week ending Feb. 16 improved only slightly, according to the report of Lynn S. Crandall, watermaster.

Precipitation at Moran for the season is 108 per cent of normal; at Ashton, 90 per cent; at Snake river ranger station, 85 per cent; at American Falls, 80 per cent; at Teton, 75 per cent; at Twin Falls, 70 per cent.

In the Twin Falls country, moisture conditions at present are poor, ranging from 70 to 80 per cent of normal, compared with the 90 per cent normal condition prevailing last season.

Inflow at the three large reservoirs on Snake river for the week ended Feb. 16, 1935, was 4,500 acre feet, compared with 4,000 acre feet for the same week in 1934, Crandall's figures revealed.
