Administration Compromise on Allocations Breaks Long Deadlock

EIGHT PURPOSES LISTED

Committee Reports Plan Mims Controversial McGarran Amendment

WASHINGTON, March 5 (UP)—The administration compromise on the work bill, which was sent back to the floor for another session today, was a result of the \$4,880,000,000 measure would require the government to "quit" before the end of the year.

3. Defeated, without a record vote, the effort of Sen. A. W. Adams, D. Cal., to have the appropriation reduced to \$2,880,000,000.

4. Defeated, also without a record vote, an effort by Sen. Fred Vinson, R. Ky., to have the appropriation reduced to \$1,000,000,000.

5. Rejected, without a record vote, a proposal by Sen. John G. Townsend, R. Pa., to require that the bill be passed by a two-thirds vote.

6. Struck out a previously adopted amendment by Sen. William C. Clegg, D. Md., relating to requirements for the bill.

7. Adopted an amendment providing for a 12 and 12 days of delay when it was adopted in the Senate Feb. 21.

When it was discovered that the firm, soft threads of wool erupted by Milwaukee, Wis., would be useful commercial scientists created an artificial volcano. # BURLEY, EDEN CLASH HERE SATURDAY IN PLAYOFF

## Bobcats Triumph Over Hornets In 33-32 Final Tilt

### Capture District Class A Championship In Hectic Fray; Meet Class B Victors at Bruin Gym

Burley high school's Bobcats held the 1935 Class A championship trophy today after a hectic 33-32 victory here last night over the Hornets of Oakley in the titular game.

Burley will clash against Eden, champion of the Class B tournament, at 8 p. m. here Saturday night in the Twin Falls gymnasium for the right to represent the south central district in the state tourney March 14, 15 and 16. Selection of the Twin Falls floor for the playoff was made by the two schools immediately after last night's Class A final.

The starting of a swift pace that both teams held throughout the game was the feature. The Bobcats made a substantial crowd frantically cheering from opening to closing bell. Floor play moved so rapidly that intercepted passes offered a continuous thrill, and they were on an ever offensive drive as the score fluctuated a bare point each way.

The Hornets climbed to a 26-24 advantage as the third quarter ended, and they went on to outpace the Bobcats and boost the margin to 30-27 on Corning's attempt with three minutes remaining in the final cant.

Daves, Burley's well-acknowledged center with a field goal and a gift lay-up, drove into the lighting horns and collected five field goals and three foul shots for 30 points, to pace Coach A. C. Conroy's team. Freeman's four field goals and five free throws added up to 25 and high class forward, Ed Lewis, the tall center won tournament high score with 23 points. Lewis was second in the scoring department with three field goals and a gift lay-up.

Supt. W. B. Smith, Twin Falls, lauded the sportsmanship of both teams in presenting the championship cup to Ken C. Conroy, who graciously awarded the runner-up trophy to Oakley. The trophy was for the victors, and Lewis accepted the Oakley award.

LEGISLATIVE HANDICAPS

The marvel is that state legislators do not make more down-right mistakes than they do that they mess through the 60 days which constitute a regular session without committing more mischief and passing more fool laws than can be credited to them.

Senators and representatives are handicapped at the very outset. Actually they have less than 60 days to prepare for their jobs and then are given another 60 days in which to perform.

They are elected the forepart of November and commence their terms the following January. While it is true that they are elected for two-year terms, their actual period of service is no longer than two months—excepting on those infrequent occasions when they are summoned into special session.

In addition they are underpaid—as officials go. They draw \$6 a day, which, except in rare instances, no more than pays their living expenses while in Boise, and makes it difficult for men with businesses, or professions or large land and livestock interests to absent themselves for two months running.

If legislators, or at least senators, were elected for longer terms, they would be better prepared for their second terms. If the legislative terms were more remote from the time of election, there would be sufficient time for new officials, both state and legislative, to prepare themselves for their tasks.

But the present system is the one which has always been in vogue, and, for that reason, it would be difficult to change. Despite all the changes which come in the workaday world, the American people are slow to accept the need for changes in the operation of their government.

The good part of it all is that our form of government has been able to meet the changing complexion of civilization, and, as in the case of the legislature, that it functions as successfully as it does with the handicaps under which it operates.

HEAVY SNOWS WELCOME

Judging by news dispatches from various parts of the country, the United States as a whole is suffering a much more severe winter than it had a year ago.

The destructive drought of last summer was not simply a matter of deficient summer rainfall; deficient winter snows also have a part in it.

The mountain ranges for our streams, depending on heavy blankets of melting snow, were not properly filled during the cold months. Water levels everywhere were lowered as a result.

The heavy snows that are reported all over the United States right now should at least relieve us of that difficulty this year.

LET CABINET SPEAK UP

Representative Byron B. Harlan of Ohio has introduced a bill which would require cabinet members to appear regularly on the floor of house and senate to answer questions about pending legislation.

Such arrangement would draw us a step closer to the English parliamentary system, under which cabinet members are closely involved in the legislative process.

It is not clear, of course, that we should go all the way in copying the good points of this system, but to subject federal department heads to congressional quizzing at regular intervals might be an exceedingly wholesome reform.

Under Representative Harlan's plan, a cabinet member would appear on the senate floor each Tuesday and on the house floor each Thursday.

He would be entitled to participate in the debates, and he would be required to answer such questions as the members might put to him.
