Your Garden

A loose, friable soil that will not tend to harden in a good medium in which to place soil has, having, a covering of "transplants." A mixture of one or more other kind of covering which will be "The Parent-Teacher one-third manure, one-third grass, one-third soil and one-third sand."

A cold frame will be found of great assistance in cultivating hardy vegetable plants. It offers protection from cold weather, starts things quicker, and finally gives a place in which to acclimatize plants grown under controlled conditions to outdoor environment preparatory to garden transplanting.

It may be constructed at very little cost, using one and a quarter inch by 12-inch cyprus, spruce, or rough hewn boards from 14 to 20 feet long, placed parallel to each other 6 feet apart. They should run east and west. The frame will provide a means of carrying off excess rain water. The cot frame should be protected against extreme cold weather by at least 24 to 30 hours, if the day is warm. It should be properly anchored.

NEW GENERATOR HELP TO SCIENCE

Ohio State U. Laboratories Develop Machine Valuable for Study of Atom

COLUMBUS, O. (U.P.)—Development of a new type million-volt generator for use in the study of nuclear disintegration has been announced by Ohio State university's department of physics.

Inventor of the machine and less costly than the models previously used for the same voltage, the new generator is expected by its designer, Dr. William H. Bennett, to greatly increase the possibilities for study of the atom and its nucleus.

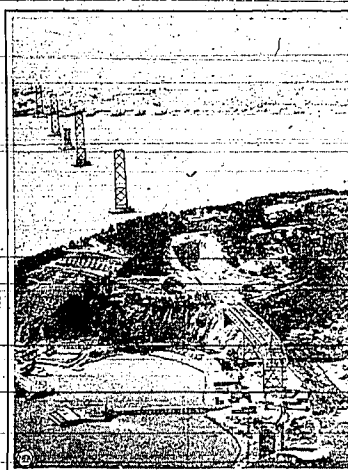
High Vacuum Tube The generator will be used in operating a high vacuum tube to produce high speed electrons to disintegrate nuclei of atoms; and change the chemical elements.

Since it was shown at Cambridge, England, about two years ago, that the elements could be changed, scientific interest in this kind of research has been growing tremendously, Dr. Bennett said.

The Ohio State generator, in addition to the advantages of former equipment, the various stages of lighting.

Since 1925, scientists in increasing numbers have been attempting to study the behavior and structure of the various stages of particles of matter, most of which are combined to form atomic nuclei. These particles have been described as "the building blocks of the universe."

STUDENT FOOLS U. S. EXAMINERS

Iowa U. Grad Gives Replies To Questions Viewed as "Stumpers"

OMAHA, Neb. (U.P.)—An Iowa university graduate has forced farm credit personnel officials to think up some new questions for their application examinations.

All applicants for farm loans must pass the intelligence examination, which heretofore included two "unanswerable" questions:

Applicants were supposed to mark "no answer" to each of the questions. Not so with the bright young man from the U. of I.

Q. "If I gave a mortgage on a mule to H and the mule had a like another surplus problem for the AAA," Hubbard asks.

A. "A mule can't have a colt."

GIRL WILL SEEK ESKIMOS' ORIGIN

California U. Graduate Will Conduct Study of Far Northern Tribes

EDMONTON, Alta. (U.P.)—An intensive study of the origin of the Eskimo tribes in Canada's northern Arctic territories will be undertaken by a young anthropologist, Miss Thorn, graduate in anthropology of the University of California. Miss Thorn is at present in Edmonton laying plans for an extended stay in the Arctic.

The Eskimo language, anthropology, customs and folklore will be studied by the young California scientist with a view to disproving the theory that the Eskimo race originally came from the Orient via the Bering Straits. She plans to go north to Alaklavik, on the Mackenzie Delta, early in the summer.

First Trip North Although this is her first trip north, Miss Thorn has spent considerable time studying Eskimo life—language and customs and the confident she will have little difficulty in facing the rigors of the Arctic.

After spending some time in Alaklavik, "becoming acclimatized," she plans to journey east to Victoria Island in Coronation Gulf and possibly go on to Oredonian if she can obtain permission from the Canadian government.

She will be accompanied by a native Eskimo, but will be the sole scientist in the party.

Speaks Language Clues Miss Thorn will learn the Eskimo language thoroughly in an effort to determine the origin of and more isolated members of the Eskimo tribes will be sought as guides and instructors by the scientist in order to obtain native customs and beliefs unobtainable by contact with the white races.

After completing her Arctic research, Miss Thorn will go to the Chicago University, where she studied before graduating—from the University of California, and write a thesis on her findings.

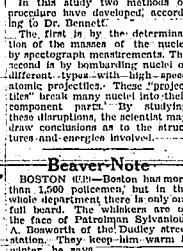

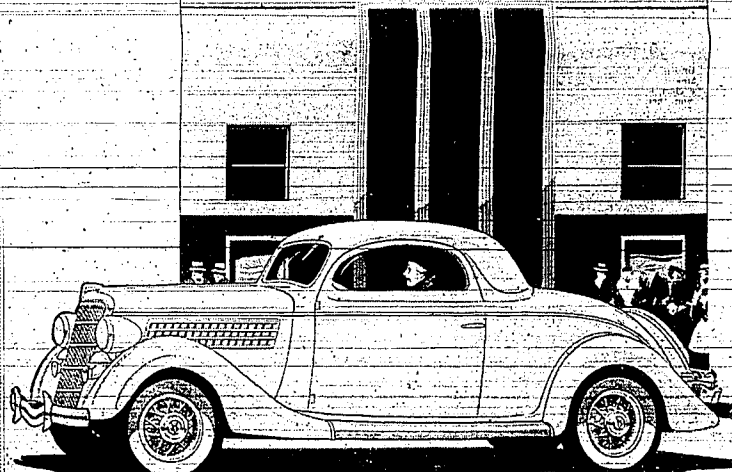

ELECTRIC GENIUS TAKEN BY DEATH

NEW YORK, March 12 (AP)—Prof. Michael I. Pupin, 70, Hungarian peasant boy who came to the United States seeking democracy and remained to revolutionize modern electrical transmission and research, died today at Columbia Presbyterian medical center after an illness of several months.

Professor emeritus of electro-mechanics at Columbia university and internationally known as an inventor in the fields of wireless telephony and the X-ray, Dr. Pupin had been an invalid for the past several years.

Although afflicted with a kidney ailment that made walking difficult, he continued his research activities. His last efforts were in the theory of electric circuits as applied to submarine transmission.

Last spring Pupin retired to his country estate near Canaan, Conn. He was stricken with influenza upon his return to New York in December.
