WIDENING FLOOD WATERS MENACE EXPANDING AREA

Raging Streams Drive 10,000 From Homes in 6 States of Middle West

Widening flood waters already having covered 200,000 acres of the lower Mississippi valley today threaten five states as emergency shelters in five states take the women of thousands of others. Three more Negroes were known to have drowned in the muddy sea centering around the mouth of the Mississippi River, south, Arkansas and Kentucky. Several other persons were missing.

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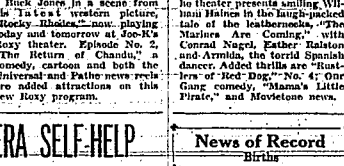

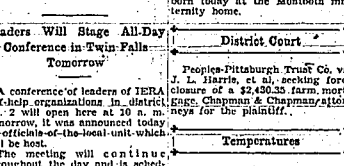

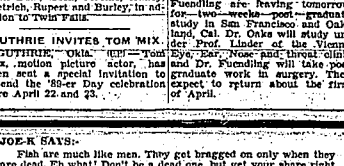

Your Garden

Here is a rock garden in which careful thought has been given to the selection of both plants and their harmonious arrangement. Added interest is given to the rocks if their pockets are filled with a Sempervivum or Live-Forever, as shown above. Note the stately, upright form of the large, bushy plant. The low-growing, feathery patch of bloom in the foreground is Quaker's Lace, Innocence or Bluffs (Houstonia missouriensis).

Rock gardens have become one of the most popular forms of gardening activity. Popularly known as "rock gardens," they are frequently built in a place where the soil is poor and the gardeners who make a rocky yard because his pocket is not deep enough to hold a tree, or because he has a lot of rocks which he does not know how to dispose of.

For ideal results, due thought must be given to selection of plants and their harmonious arrangement. The rock garden must have a certain amount of shade and a certain amount of sun. The plants should be chosen for their habit of growth and their color.

STAMP DEVOTEES BUY GIFT ISSUES

NOT FOR A DEMOCRACY

Not the least valuable way of sizing up our own re-employment program is to have an occasional look at the things other nations are doing to solve the same problem.

One of the most instructive contrasts is to be found in Germany.

On April 1 the Nazi government begins a new assault on unemployment which will have the result of making every person under 25 a unit in a rigidly state-controlled labor scheme.

All jobs for persons under 25 will be at the disposal of the state. A young person holding a job will be required to "place" his services at the disposal of the state labor service. This organization will have the power to send him to work on a farm, to toil on a construction project, or to enroll in a labor camp.

Thus the young worker is to pass under the sway of a centralized, disciplined authority quite as rigid and strict as that of military conscription. He will not try to start his career as soon as he gets out of school; instead, he must work at jobs someone else picks for him until he is halfway through his 20's, and not until then can he choose his own employment.

Now the reason for examining that scheme in such detail here is not to find a new basis for criticism of Herr Hitler, but simply to point out that control of this kind is the logical result of any nation-wide, authoritarian control of the labor market by the central government.

Once you depart from a free, fluid labor market you are headed, ultimately, toward this or something like it.

Our own re-employment program has manifold imperfections, certainly. Some of these are inherent in any attempt to put people back to work before the slow processes of recovery can get uncoiled, and others arise from the fact that we are seeking to do the job through voluntary means.

But it is worth remembering that to give up this voluntary system in favor of something quicker, and more efficient is a first step on the road to a despotic regime like this one in Germany.

A certain amount of inefficiency is the price of democratic government. By trying to build re-employment around our existing industrial framework, we are preserving our political freedom.

If the job seems to be moving slowly, it is helpful to remember the alternatives.

THAT LIFE-SAVING COMMA

Nearly four years ago, three officials of a defunct mortgage company in Cleveland were convicted of fraud charges in connection with their company's sale of partial payment gold trust bonds.

The conviction didn't end the matter. It went to the state supreme court, which ordered a new trial on the ground that the judge erred in his charge to the jury. The other day the retrial finally began.

The defense attorneys argued that the indictment in the case was faulty—because of a misplaced comma. They argued so well that the trial judge was obliged to agree with them and the men were freed.

Addressing the jury, the judge remarked that "this should illustrate the fallacy of making a criminal case a game instead of a method of arriving at justice."

That's putting it mildly. Here we have a criminal case that had dragged out for four years—and it is finally disposed of because some typist put a comma in the wrong place! Is it any wonder that laymen grow impatient with the technicalities of the law?

When Huey Long threatens to "rock the capital from end to end," does he mean with laughter?

MILLIONS FOR RELIEF

At the height of the Civil War, northern citizens learned with a shock of dismay that their government was spending \$2,000,000 a day to carry on the fight. Such expenditures, in that period, seemed astronomical—too big for the mind to grasp.

One wonders what those startled citizens would have thought if they had been told that eventually their government would spend two and one-half times that much merely to take care of the victims of unemployment. They would have looked, probably, for the speedy end of the world.

Yet that is just what is happening. Relief Administrator Hopkins reveals that federal relief rolls are now carrying 22,000,000 persons, with daily expenditures for food and clothing of \$5,000,000.

It is a tremendous, unheard-of load, this relief bill. It can't be carried—but it is terribly obvious that it can't be carried over.

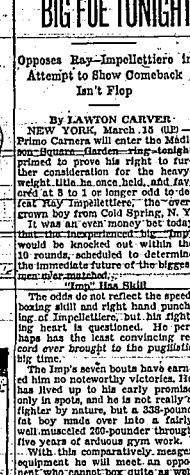

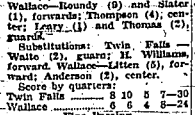

SOVIET PAPERS CHANGING TREND

Moscow Press Finally Forced To Print Police News For Variety

By JOSEPH M. BAIRD MOSCOW (U.P.)—One never sees in the Soviet Press first headlines such as "Breaker and Chorus Girl Shot in Love Nest." In the first place there are no breakers here.

Secondly, Soviet papers would not print such a story. For the first time in many years, Moscow papers have started carrying some stories of accidents, burglaries and other forms of "police news" which previously have been absent.

Such items, however, are not displayed under strainer headlines, but are inconspicuously lumped together under the general heading of "Events." No "crimes of passion" are chronicled and, at least, are not reported. The Moscow papers give preference to stories in which some political significance may be seen. Thus, looking over "Pravda" column of "Events" one finds these items:

1. Several Soviet workers have been arrested for "idleness"—a broad term which may mean anything from drunken binging to smoking a store window.

2. A man has been arrested for forging a government bond and another for being drunk. Thus other "idiotic" counterfeits are named.

A gang of thieves have been arrested for stealing 100 kilograms of butter. Theft of state property may be punished by shooting.

A man has been put in jail for attempting to obtain a job by means of a forged passport. So the public is warned not to forge passports.

Despite the heavy political coating applied to these items, however, they are welcomed by a reading public which for years has found almost entirely a diet of political essays, confessions of laborers, economic statistics and occasional railroad wrecks.

(By NEA Service) SAN DIEGO, Calif.—Chicago's Century of Progress exposition being given, this city is preparing to give Chicago three better by celebrating four centuries of progress in California. The International Exposition, scheduled to open here in Balboa Park May 29, is now just 400 days since Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo sailed into and discovered San Diego Bay.

This summer's west coast exposition is to show to 4,000,000 visitors the progress made in agriculture, science, commerce and industry since that day; and indicate developments and progress that lie in the near future.

More than 40 foreign countries plan to be represented by exhibits as well as each of the 48 states of the Union. So the national and international aspects of the exposition seem assured.

Other Nations To Help Construction of Exposition are also expected to take a prominent part in 1935—marking the 40th anniversary of King George's reign, and special events and celebrations are planned at the exposition.

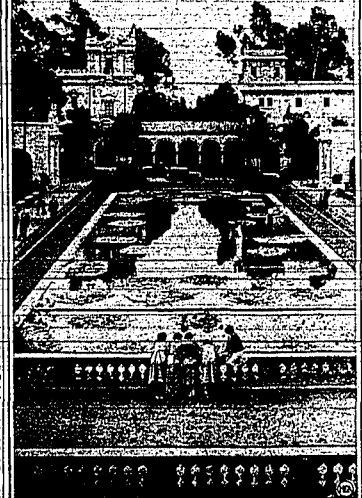

CLAIM TORTURE IN PRISON CAMP

North Carolina Investigation Reveals Secret Burial, Committee Says

RALEIGH, N. C., March 15 (U.P.)—Charges that Negro convicts have been tortured, starved to death and buried in unmarked graves today prompted a legislative investigating committee to consider charges in punitive measures at state prison camps.

The committee returned from Charlotte, where they questioned witnesses of alleged cruelty in camp No. 413. Disclosures at the investigation led committee members to assert a return to the (last) as a corrective measure would be more humane than present "torture methods."

Report—Negro Death The investigators learned of the death of a sick negro last August in one of the dreaded "dark cells," used for solitary confinement. Witnesses described the victim as two or three years ago. Tortures and secret burials late at night were described.

The investigation was prompted after two young Negro convicts at Camp 413 had their feet amputated recently. Robert Barnes and Woodrow Wilson Burroughs, the Negroes, and their feet froze while they were chained in solitary "dark cells."

Although camp officials have contended that the men received "human" food and attention, investigation and testimony of other prisoners indicated "that adequate food was withheld" from them at least three weeks.

Washington Will Stage Big Celebration For June Convention



Washington (U.P.)—Washington is planning one of the greatest celebrations in its history in connection with the Imperial Shrine Convention to be held here the week of June 9-11.

It is anticipated that the number of visitors attending the celebration will rival the throng that came here for the inauguration of President Roosevelt.

Washington was host to the Shrine in 1923. At that time the parade which marched down historic Pennsylvania avenue lasted six hours.
