Carries Out Predictions That Radical Foe Would Run Aquiver

By LYLE C. WILSON WASHINGTON, March 16 (AP)—Annals of President Roosevelt recalled today his private prediction of a year ago that he would be opposed for reelection and again by a radical.

Evidence is developing that the radicals would be stronger than Huey Long, who this week removed himself finally from the Democratic party organization.

Speaking in Philadelphia, the senator announced that the party in 1936 if Mr. Roosevelt were re-elected. Such an announcement, however, might have been made at the inauguration of the new Roosevelt administration.

It is safe to assume that Mr. Roosevelt would be re-elected by a Democratic for another term and that Long will bolt. There are two other left wing leaders who might lead a third party movement, Senator Robert M. La Follette, leader of Wisconsin, and Governor Floyd B. Olson, spokesman for Farmer-Laborites in his own Minnesota and through the northwest.

What Huey Long is likely to do is to sacrifice his own party organization to Long's domination and supporting a third party platform. Long's choice for presidential nominee is Huey Long, the senator from Louisiana. Huey Long is 74 years old and there is no reason to believe he would make the race.

Political observers are of the opinion that Long's strategy in 1936 would be to ignore the presidential election altogether to concentrate on winning congressional candidates. The senator has made personal political arrangements with a number of them to run the country from January 1936 until after the election without bothering about his own political future.

Change Date One of the latest rumors through the Louisiana legislature in an emergency session advanced from a Democratic to a Republican. It is that Huey Long will be elected to the Louisiana legislature in an emergency session advanced from a Democratic to a Republican.

Long has promised to defeat Senator Charles McNary, D. Ark., and Senator Joseph Bailey, D. N. C. He will march against McNary in the latter's home state in the next few months. He will sponsor a "share crop" bill and will attempt to succeed Sen. Thomas P. Gore. The kind of "share crop" bill is traditional in the Louisiana legislature.

Third party candidates usually fall because of the electoral college method of naming the president. Mr. Roosevelt has a constitutional amendment to abolish the electoral college for that reason. He would prefer President to be selected by popular vote.

Whatever Long does, he evidently is drawing away from Father Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit radio prophet. Long says he will not let Mr. Roosevelt run again. Father Coughlin has announced his 1936 campaign slogan: "Roosevelt or nothing but Roosevelt."

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IRISH PRESIDENT CITES PROGRESS

De Valera Sends St. Patrick's Day Greeting to Yankee Friends of Erin

(Editor's note: In the following dispatch written for the United Press, Eamon De Valera, president of the executive council of the Irish Free State, sends his greetings to the United States.)

Each person pays the government \$1 for the \$100 credit. Every business man pays one per cent on every transaction. Counting on every check turning over four times, the government gets \$240,000,000 the first month. And so on.

At the end of two years, the estate Mr. Ruben figures, the government will collect \$140,000,000,000 and will pay back to the banks only \$14,000,000,000.

"And," he said, with utmost conviction, "it won't cost a cent."
